SUBJECT City Council Proposition Funding Amounts for the 2024 Bond

Background

During the City Council Briefing on January 19, 2024, City Council provided direction to move forward with a May 2024 election and an overall bond value of \$1.25B. Staff provided an amendment form to City Council ahead of the special called January 31, 2024, briefing to provide feedback at the allocation level for the 2024 Bond Program.

Preparation for the January 31, 2024, Briefing

To keep the bond process on schedule, City Council will need to provide direction on the proposition allocations at the January 31 briefing. Staff will use that feedback to finalize the Bond Ordinance which will include:

- Proposition language,
- Proposition allocation amounts,
- Payback amounts of bonds issued.

The proposition language and allocations will also be reviewed at the City Council Briefing on February 7th with a call for the May 2024 Bond election scheduled for the February 14th City Council meeting.

At the briefing on January 31st, staff recommends following the budget amendment process. Amendments will be provided in the order in which they were received for consideration. As in the budget process, it is the discretion of the presiding officer to determine the order in which the City Council will discuss the amendments. The proposition allocation amendments, provided by City Council Members, for the 2024 Bond Program are included as an appendix to this memorandum.

Next Steps

Following City Council direction for a May election and a \$1.25B 2024 Bond Program, the next step in the bond process will be to have City Council provide funding allocations at the proposition level, which will enable City departments to develop project listings within the approved allocation amounts.

If City Council should approve discretionary funding, those funds will need to be assigned to a specific proposition, preferably at the January 31 meeting, but no later than the end of business, 5:00 P.M. on Thursday February 1st to remain on schedule.

SUBJECT Office of Homeless Solutions - Update on Activation of Temporary Inclement Weather Shelters

The Office of Homeless Solutions (OHS) activated the opening of temporary inclement weathershelters (TIWS) in the City of Dallas on Friday, January 12, 2024, based on the National Oceanic and Atmospheric forecast, in accordance with Chapter 45 of the City Code. TIWS remained open from January 12, 2024, through the following days 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, and 20, with closure on Sunday, January 21, at 11 a.m. In total 2,231 unique individuals were served throughout the duration of the activation.

Those experiencing homelessness were directed to the Fair Park, Grand Place building, also accessed by multiple transportation zones across the City. These zones were continually maintained by multiple transportation providers, including the Dallas Connector, OHS Street Outreach, and Dallas Fire Rescue (map of transportation zones attached below). Individuals refusing shelter were given cold-weather kits by Street Outreach or were able to pick up kits at recreation centers located in each district of the City. Individuals and residents were directed to submit transportation Service Requests (SR) to a special 311, Inclement Weather alert, monitored by OHS Street Outreach for immediate attention and dispatch of City and partner vehicles. Below is a list of 311 Service Requests broken out by type from this time period:

- 311 Service Requests Received (IWS Transportation) 166
 - Individuals Transported 173
 - Individuals who refused transport (warming kits given) 150
 - Individuals who refused transport (coats given) 22
 - o Individuals who were not present at location indicated by SR 44

Shelter Stays

As highlighted in the larger Inclement Weather Shelter plan, OHS' external partner, Austin Street Center, stood up TIWS upon activation by OHS. Fair Park was used as the primary lead activation site due to the projected, multi-day activation window of this cold weather incident. We are grateful to Fair Park for continuing this partnership and accommodating us at Grand Place, as the larger buildings were occupied by other vendors. Due to the slightly smaller capacity, the TIWS capacity overflow plan was implemented after reaching 75% site capacity on January 14, 2024. At this time, the Austin Street #2 building at 2929 Hickory Street and Oak Lawn United Methodist Church were activated. Intake hours at all locations were between 3:00 p.m. - 10:00 p.m., with a skeleton intake staff operating overnight.

The total number of shelters stays for duration of the activation is as follows:

- Fair Park 1,651
- Austin Street Shelter 533
- Oak Lawn UMC 47

A further breakdown of the demographic makeup of individuals served is attached.

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Volunteers/Donations

The OHS Friends Group actively recruited volunteers through e-mail and social media. responding quickly to all inquiries through the TIWS activation period. As shelters opened and closed, the public was informed of volunteer and donation opportunities. Approximately 25 individuals were added to the Friends Group membership roster and several expressed an interest in participating in other group projects. Cash donations, totaling \$187, were donated to the Office of Homeless Solutions Fund at the Communities Foundation of Texas.

Overall

Through a tremendous amount of preparation and planning, this well-organized operationprovided shelter for our unsheltered neighbors last week and is prepared to do so again, should temperatures trigger Chapter 45 of the City Code. This work would not have been possible without support from Austin Street Center, Fair Park, Office of Emergency Management, Dallas Fire-Rescue, Public Works, Dallas 311, Dallas Animal Services, Park & Recreation, Sanitation Services, Mobile Crisis assistance from the Office of Integrated Public Safety Solutions, seamless security coverage via external security, Dallas Police Department, and the Dallas City Marshals Office, Oak Lawn UMC, OurCalling, Stewpot, SPCA, Watermark Health, Parkland, North Texas Behavioral Health, North Texas Food Bank, Texas Baptist Men, and all of the area homeless services providers. Collectively, they provided operations services, security, medical services, meals, pet supplies, and transportation throughout this period.

311 is on the Go in the Community

311's City Hall on the Go is busy in the community with an anticipated 44 events in 29 days for the month of February. In January, 311 representatives collaborated with D.I.S.D., Buckner Family Hope Center, O.E.Q.S., Code Enforcement, and Sanitation, to promote City services. 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Code Compliance and Code Weather Event

As temperatures plummeted, the volume of emergency outage cases at apartments, condominiums, and rental properties city-wide skyrocketed. Since the beginning of the year, Code Compliance staff has investigated 409 emergency outage calls for service. Those calls consisted of 10 Atmos-reported gas outages affecting the entire property with at least one utility. Of these calls, 17 involved properties under Community Prosecution. Code staff operate 7 days a week year-round to respond to these types of emergencies for service including during inclement weather such as the recent freezing conditions. Code staff provides rapid response in contacting afflicted residents and ensuring property managers/ owners are held accountable for making every effort possible for rapid restoration.

Emergency violations investigated this month include:

- Hot water outage (274)
- Heat outage (168)
- Electrical hazard/utility outage (15).

Office of Homeless Solutions Updates

R.E.A.L. Time Rehousing

The R.E.A.L. Time Rehousing (RTR) team of homeless service providers, co-led by the Office of Homeless Solutions (OHS) and Housing Forward <u>has successfully rehoused</u> 2,700 (and counting) unique individuals as of October 17, 2023. The City and its partners now have a new goal of housing 6,000 unique individuals by 2025 across the expanse of the metroplex.

OHS Street Outreach Update

Outreach is currently targeting several encampments, which will result in closure through the housing of those unsheltered individuals throughout the year via RTR. The team will outreach to these sites and meet with various persons experiencing homelessness to assess their needs in preparation for site closure via housing. During this time, the OHS Street Outreach Team will continue to engage with unsheltered residents through normal street outreach, connecting people with the needed resources, such as: getting IDs, working with Community Courts on expunging eligible tickets and offenses from their records, identifying medical needs, and getting them access to the Coordinated Access System (CAS). The RTR Community Dashboard is live and may be found here.

Please see the attached schedule for homeless encampment cleaning the week of January 22 through January 26, 2024. Please note that these will be for debris removal and outreach only. All encampment cleaning requests are being resolved as time and weather allows and are subject to modification in response to special requests by City leadership.

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Give Responsibly Campaign Outreach Update

The Office of Homeless Solutions and Code Compliance work together to promote the Give Responsibly Campaign (GRC). This initiative aims to prevent street charity and illegal solicitation in the community through education and engagement. While providing alternative solutions for our residents experiencing homelessness.

The Office of Homeless Solutions Community Liaison and Code Compliance Neighborhood Code Representatives are partnering to visit businesses in hot spots across all districts. This joint effort aims to address issues related to homelessness and the adverse effects street charity and illegal solicitation have on the community. It will provide education on sustainably supporting those in need while ensuring a safer and more comfortable environment for businesses and their patrons. H.A.R.T/eam Update

The Homeless Action Response Team (H.A.R.T/eam) is led by the Office of Homeless Solutions (OHS) and encompasses four teams comprised of a core team of the following: Crisis Intervention Team (CIT), Dallas Animal Services (DAS), Dallas Marshals, and Code Compliance (Code). This team is supplemented by Parks and Recreation, Dallas Fire & Rescue, and Public Works as needed. The purpose of H.A.R.T/eam. is to provide a quick response to immediate safety concerns around homeless encampments and hot spots. To report a critical issue regarding an encampment or panhandling, please submit a service request to 311 or the OurDallas smartphone app. For any questions or concerns the Supervisor, Anthony please reach out to H.A.R.T. Virgil, at Anthony.Virgil@dallas.gov.

The teams are assigned and respond to time-sensitive, critical issues received via 311 and via email which are defined as:

- Issues raised by City Leadership and members of City Council requests
- Issues presenting an immediate safety concern (the presence of firearms, uncontrolled fires, reports of threatening behavior)
- Any issues which would derail the normal street outreach service resolution process
- Panhandling


