Bond Program Timeline



2017-2022 Bond Program Propositions



1,322 projects:

A. Streets: 1,027 projects

B. Parks: 163 projects

C. Fair Park: 12 projects

D. Flood Control: 85 projects

E. Libraries: 3 projects

F. Cultural Arts: 9 projects

G. Public Safety: 16 projects

H. City Facilities: 7 projects

I. Economic Development: TBD

Proposition A: Streets and Transportation

\$533,981,000 for 1,027 projects to construct or improve streets, sidewalks, and multimodal facilities in coordination with established transportation plans and other agencies.

- Traffic signal system upgrades
- Installation of warranted traffic signals at 63 locations citywide
- Street reconstruction and resurfacing
- Sidewalk replacement
- Critical bridge repair



Proposition B: Park and Recreation

\$261,807,000 for **163** projects to acquire, develop or renovate parks and park facilities and amenities.

- Aquatics Master Plan Phase 1 and 2A
- Southern Gateway Public Green
- Dallas Zoo, Dallas Arboretum and Klyde Warren Park expansions
- 38 miles of trail improvements
- Rehabilitation and expansion of multiple recreation centers



Proposition C: Fair Park

\$50,000,000 to rehabilitate 12 historical facilities, including roof repairs, HVAC replacements, plumbing improvements, security system upgrades and facade repair.

- Hall of State
- African American Museum
- Coliseum
- Texas Discovery Gardens
- Food and Fiber Building
- Magnolia Lounge
- Tower Building
- Science Place 1
- Aquarium Annex
- Pan American Complex
- Music Hall
- Centennial Building



Proposition D: Flood Control and Storm Drainage

\$48,750,000 for 85 projects to improve or develop stormwater drainage systems, erosion control, and flood management to minimize repetitive flood loss.

- Bank stabilization
- Vinemont Channel improvements
- Drainage flow improvements



Proposition E: Library Facilities

\$15,589,000 for 3 critical projects to improve the City's library system.

- Replace the existing
 Forest Green Branch
 Library with a new facility
- Construct a new library in the Vickery Meadow/Midtown area
- Complete plumbing and roofing improvements at the J. Erik Jonsson Central Library



Proposition F: Cultural & Performing Arts Facilities

\$14,235,000 for the rehabilitation of 9 cultural and performing arts facilities, including waterproofing, roof replacements and security upgrades.

- Dallas Museum of Art
- Bath House Cultural Center
- Kalita Humphreys Theater
- Dallas Black Dance Theatre
- Sammons Center for the Arts
- South Dallas Cultural Center
- Morton H. Meyerson Symphony Center
- Dallas Heritage Village
- Oak Cliff Cultural Center



Proposition G: Public Safety Facilities

\$32,801,000 for 16 projects to design and construct new public safety facilities and rehabilitate existing facilities.

- Security upgrades at the Jack Evans Police Headquarters and 7 police substations
- New fire station at Loop 12 and Jim Miller
- Replace fire stations #36 and #46
- Interior renovations (kitchens, showers and living quarters) at 15 fire stations
- Waterproofing, HVAC replacement, electrical, mechanical and plumbing improvements at 12 fire stations



Proposition H: City Hall & City Service & Administrative Facilities

\$18,157,000 for 7 projects to expand and rehabilitate existing City facilities.

- 8,000 sq. ft. expansion of West Dallas Multipurpose Center
- City Hall renovations
- Replacement of electrical panels at 37 facilities
- Phase 1 renovation of the Oak Cliff Municipal Center



Proposition I: Economic Development & Housing

\$55,400,000 to help facilitate economic development and housing opportunities throughout the City.

- Revitalization of commercial corridors
- Transit-oriented development
- Mixed-income housing
- Mixed-use development
- Neighborhood revitalization



Proposition J: Homeless Assistance Facilities

\$20,000,000 for permanent supportive and transitional housing.

- Permanent supportive housing targeting:
 - Chronic homeless
 - 0-30% Area Median Income (AMI)
- Rapid rehousing addressing:
 - Elderly and disabled
 - Families with children
 - Young adults (ages 18-24)



What's Different from the Past?

- Bond Program to be implemented over a five-year period
- December 2017 Creation of a Bond Program Office
 - Primary responsibility is to implement the 2017 Capital Bond Program to ensure five-year completion
 - Completion of previous bond program projects
- Program Manager Services
 - Horizontal (Propositions A and D)
 - Parks and Fair Park (Propositions B and C)
 - Vertical (Propositions E, F, G and H)

Why a new Bond Program Office?

- Tracks and Accounts for all Bond Program Funding (includes legacy projects

 previous bond programs)
- Tracks the Delivery of Every Bond Program Project
- Ensures a Timely Bond Program Project Delivery All Projects in Five Years
- Ensures Efficiency and Quality Assurance through all Phases of the Bond Program
- Establishes a Mechanism to Track and Display Transparency

Does this by:

- Consolidating responsibility for implementing the bond program into one office - eliminates independent bond program department silos
- Establishing a project accounting system to budget, schedule, track and account for every project — Tririga database
- Establishes roles & responsibilities between the project delivery departments,
 clients and support departments
- Performs regular reporting for status of bond programs
- Maintains a website to allow transparency and public scrutiny (www.dallasbond.com)

Status of the Park and Recreation Facilities

- Proposition B (Park and Recreation Facilities)
 - 163 Total Projects
 - 31 System Wide
 - 132 District Specific
 - Project reprogramming has been ongoing in each Council District and updated lists currently being generated
 - \$261,807,000 Total Authorized
 - \$261,776,093 Total Appropriated*
 - \$146,031,061 Expended/Encumbered*
 - \$32,797,020 Approved Pending Commitments*
 - 86% of Authorization Appropriated
 - 68% of Bond Authorization Committed

Status of the Fair Park Facilities

- Proposition C (Fair Park)
 - 12 System Wide Projects
 - Project reprogramming has been ongoing and updated lists currently being generated
 - Project funds have been shifted to perform additional work within the budgets available
 - \$50,000,000 Total Authorized
 - \$35,854,549 Total Appropriated*
 - \$29,458,915 Expended/Encumbered*
 - \$446,614 Approved Pending Commitments*
 - 84% of Authorization Appropriated
 - 60% of Bond Authorization Committed
