# REDISTRICTING COMMISSION RULES FOR PUBLIC FORUM SATURDAY, AUGUST 20, 2011

The Redistricting Commission is anxious to hear from as many Dallas residents as possible to learn about concerns and issues with the existing City Council districts and with the proposed final plans remaining in consideration by the Commission for redrawing the districts. To insure fairness to all interested residents and to conduct an orderly public forum, the Commission has adopted the following rules, as well as the rules of courtesy based upon the Dallas City Council Rules of Courtesy and the Code of Conduct. These procedures provide:

- That no one shall delay or interrupt the proceedings, or refuse to obey the orders of the presiding officer.
- All persons should refrain from private conversation in the Meeting Room while the Commission is in session.
- Posters and placards must remain outside the Meeting Room.
- Cellular phones or audible beepers must be turned to vibrate or turned off while the Commission is in session.

### Rules for Speakers:

- 1. For each plan under final consideration by the Redistricting Commission, those speaking for the adoption of the plan will be allotted a total of 30 minutes and those speaking against the adoption of the plan will be allotted a total of 30 minutes. The speakers should coordinate with others for or against a plan to work out how the time period will be utilized to address all of the concerns and attributes of the plan. If the speakers fail to do so, the Chair will divide the 30 minutes by the number of speakers signed up, divide the time and allot the same time to each speaker who has signed up to speak. There will also be a general discussion session of no more than 30 minutes at the end of the Public Forum where those speakers who did not wish to address a specific plan can make their concerns or accolades known. That time will be handled among speakers in the same way as the specific item speakers, except that no speaker may speak for longer than 3 minutes.
- 2. All persons wishing to speak for or against a specific plan may sign up in person with the Redistricting Staff on the appropriate sheet at the entrance to the meeting room by no later than 1:50 pm on the date of the. Forum. Speakers may also sign up for the public speaker list by contacting the Redistricting office via telephone at (214) 670-5735, fax at (214) 659-7097, or email at <a href="mailto:reDallas11@dallascityhall.com">reDallas11@dallascityhall.com</a> no later than 5:00 pm on Friday, August 19, 2011, specifying the plan on which the speaker wishes to speak and whether the speaker wishes to speak for or against the plan. Each speaker must provide the requested sign-in information prior to the meeting. No person can speak more than one time during the Forum.

- 3. Each speaker must address the Chair, provide his/her name and address for the record, and state the district in which he/she lives or works.
- 4. The chair will notify speakers when there are five minutes for the group and one minute left of the allotted speaking time in favor or against a proposed plan. The speaker will also be notified when there is 30 seconds left in the speaking time and must close his/her comments within the time period. Since the purpose of this Public Forum is solely to listen to members of the public, members of the Redistricting Commission will not ask questions of any speaker, nor will they answer questions asked by any speaker.
- 5. Each speaker must keep his/her comments on the topic of redistricting or will be ruled out of order by the Chair.
- 6. Speakers shall observe the same rules of propriety, decorum and good conduct applicable to members of the Commission. Any speaker making personal, impertinent, profane, or slanderous remarks or who becomes boisterous while addressing the Commission will be removed from the room, if the security officer is so directed by the Chair. If the Chair fails to act, any member of the Commission may move to require enforcement of the rules, and the affirmative vote of a majority of the Commission shall require the Chair to



### REDISTRICTING GUIDELINES 2011

Approved by the Redistricting Commission: March 1, 2011 with Final Edits March 8, 2011, To Be Submitted to City Council for Final Adoption: April 13, 2011

The Redistricting Commission intends to apply the following guidelines as consistently as possible and to the greatest extent possible, in the drawing of city council district boundaries that are in the best interests of the residents and the City of Dallas. The Redistricting Commission acknowledges, however, that on some occasions these redistricting guidelines may conflict with one another.

A. The following guidelines regarding Population Equality, Minority Representation and Contiguity and Compactness shall be applied as required by the U.S. Constitution, the Voting Rights Act. and other federal and state laws.

# 1. Population Equality.

The districts should be drawn so that they are substantially equal in population according to the total count as presented in the 2010 census data. The total deviation between the largest and the smallest district must be as small as possible, but in all cases must be less than ten percent.

Minor population deviations of less than ten percent may be allowed if they are necessary to achieve a good faith, legitimate objective, such as:

- preserving the voting strength of minority populations in compliance with the Voting Rights Act;
- making the districts compact:
- maintaining communities of interest in a single district and avoiding splitting neighborhoods:
- using public school attendance boundaries as defined by the independent school districts in the City of Dallas to assist in defining neighborhoods;
- preserving the cores of existing districts as permitted by case law, meaning to recognize the traditional geographic, economic, cultural or social center of an existing district as supported by public testimony;
- following easily identifiable geographic boundaries and other unique geographical configurations; or
- facilitating responsiveness of elected representatives to their constituents.

# 2. <u>Minority Representation</u>.

As required by the Voting Rights Act, the voting strength of racial, ethnic, and language minorities in the districts should not be diluted by depriving minority voters of an equal opportunity to elect a candidate of their choice, such as by packing or fracturing districts. Race, ethnicity, and language minority consideration, however cannot be the predominant factor to which other districting legal principles are subordinated.

A majority minority district may be created to provide fair representation to the members of racial, ethnic, and language minority populations where compelling justification requires such a district as determined by the following factors:

- a reasonably compact district can be drawn in compliance with the other redistricting guidelines in which voters of the minority group constitute a majority of the electorate and will increase the probability that members of the minority will be elected:
- the minority community is politically cohesive and usually votes together;
- other voters in the area generally vote as a bloc to successfully defeat the minority community's preferred candidates.

# 3. Contiguity and Compactness.

The districts should be geographically compact and composed of contiguous territory. Compactness and contiguity involve both a functional and a geographic aspect. Functional compactness and contiguity include factors such as:

- the availability of transportation and communication:
- the existence of common social, cultural, community, and economic interests:
- the ability of constituents of a council district to relate to each other:
- the existence of shared interests, including a history and tradition of working together:
- the use of public school attendance boundaries as defined by the independent school districts in the City of Dallas to assist in defining neighborhoods; and
- the drawing of district boundaries that facilitate communications between constituents and their elected representatives.
- B. Other guidelines which may be considered include:

# 1. Incumbents.

The configuration of districts shall be neutral as to incumbents. The districts must not be configured for the purpose of either protecting or defeating an incumbent.

# 2. <u>Communities of Interest.</u>

Communities of interest shall be maintained in a single district, where possible; and attempts should be made to avoid splitting neighborhoods. For purposes of this guideline, "communities of interest" include geographic areas where there are people who share clearly recognizable similarities of social, political, cultural, ethnic, religious or economic interests. Factors to be considered in defining "neighborhoods" include homeowner associations, neighborhood associations, crime watch groups, public testimony, census tract information and traditionally recognized areas of Dallas.

# **CHAPTER 4**

# "We RETURN, WE RETURN FROM FIGHTING. WE RETURN FIGHTING." POST-WORLD WAR I FREEDMAN'S TOWN/NORTH DALLAS, 1919–1930

Since slavery the Colored people of this country have made rapid strides. However, the real awakening is dawning on them since the World War and "something" has really touched them. Racial consciousness, race pride, race cooperation are all on the upgrade and their opportunity and powers are being recognized by the race. The day for the Uncle Tom is gone. Carry yourself like one who is conscious that he has a splendid mission, a grand aim in life. Radiate a hopeful, cheerful, atmosphere. The Race is measured by the individual. You are responsible to the race for your actions. Uphold it at any cost.

—"Race Pride," Dallas Express

As America's troops began returning from overseas at the close of World War I, northern and southern African American soldiers carried with them a redefined concept of what was acceptable. After fighting for freedom abroad and supporting the war effort at home, soldiers and other African Americans shared in their expectation for an increased freedom in their own country. African Americans participated in the war with a fervor equal to that of European Americans. Both were soldiers, worked in munitions factories, purchased war bonds, and created organizations to lend support to families with loved ones overseas. Thus, African Americans who invested themselves emotionally and financially in

the nation's war effort felt entitled to equal treatment within the country they supported. However, equal freatment was far from what they were afforded. Statements issued in 1919 by W. E. B. DuBois, editor of the NAACP's *Crisis*: reflected Blacks' postwar sentiments:

For African Americans nationwide, the end of World Wer I stimulated competition for housing and employment with others in southern and northern urban centers. Frustrations were particularly charged in northern cities as the mass influx of African Americans out of the South prior to and during the war years drastically swelled northern urban populations, rendering their presence highly threatening and their urgency for housing and employment ominous. As thousands of soldiers securned to the United States during the early months

population, the board began to search for a park site. The commissioners studied and rejected several locations including acreage in the Trinity River bottoms subject to frequent innundation and tracts not easily accessible by all the Negro population. Finally, in January of 1915, the board found a solution. Two Negro parks were to be provided, one on each side of the Trinity River.

The first Negro park established became Oak Cliff Negro Park near the Trinity River on Sabine and Cliff streets. A payment price of \$8178.30 gave the city four and one-half acres as a playground, although in 1928 the city reduced the park to half its size while following Kessler's suggestion to build levees along the Trinity River to control flooding. The remaining two and one-half acres received considerable improvements during the era of the second world war, and the park became known as simply Oak Cliff Park. 40

The second Negro park developed in old North Dallas on Hall Street where it crossed the Texas Central rail lines. All This park, known as Hall Street Negro Park, became an important center for Negro social life as a field house was built there in 1921, and although it reputedly had most of the facilities provided in other community centers, including free showers and free summer movies, it was of inferior construction. In 1922 a swimming pool increased the recreational capabilities of the park. Negro recreation leaders provided activities for the children, and their park teams competed in tournaments with teams from the other Negro parks. Much later, this park was enlarged and renamed Grigo Park upon the recommendation of E. T. Atwell of the National Recreation Association in his planning report to the park board in the 1940s.

# GRIGGS PARK PROJECT SUMMARY

### <u>Design</u>

- Uptown Public Improvement District (UPID) funded the master plan
- Design team includes Carter & Burgess landscape architects and Freedman's Memorial
- UPID hosted a series of neighborhood meetings within ½ mile radius of service, east and west of Central Expressway, in accordance with approved Park Board procedures, plus special meetings with Black Dallas Remembered and the Freedman's Foundation
- Three conceptual plans produced and reviewed in a second round of neighborhood
- Park Board review deferred until completion of the city-wide park review, by the same Carter & Burgess team used by UPID for Griggs

# Park History & Context

- Originally Hall Street Negro Park
- Renamed in late 1920s for Rev. Henry Griggs, formerly enslaved in Georgia
- Long time center of community life in Freedman's Town, hosting Dallas' first (mobile) library and first swimming pool open to African-Americans

- Observation and interviews showed frequent use of the existing basketball court by people from within the radius of service, leading to the decision subsequent to the neighborhood meetings to retain a basketball court in the master plan
- Strong endorsement of a water element of some sort, especially if it includes the sound of moving water
- "Neighborhood park" designation does not invite regional uses such as ball fields
- With the exception of one resident, support for ball fields came only from interests outside the intended radius of service

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





The city's Redistricting Commission is inching towards putting together a city map it can forward on to the city council, and everyone -- the public and commissioners alike -- is trying to get in a parting shot before then. Last night's meeting was a marathon of speeches, metaphors (map shapes were

variously compared to a sphinx's head, George Washington and, uh, puppies), accusations, hurt feelings, reconciliations and cameo appearances by a certain former mayor.

After reviewing <u>partial plan testimony</u> from commissioner Domingo Garcia and looking at commissioner Hollis Brashear's <u>proposed map</u> on Tuesday, the Redistricting Commission was supposed to meet last night, hear the last batch of submissions from commissioners, review all 15 plans still on the table, then discuss which ones to modify and move forward. That didn't happen, despite nearly four hours up in room 6ES. (Four! Hours! During which I used up an entire notepad and a rather large package of peanut butter crackers. Redistricting is hell on your dinner plans. Anyway.)

After the jump, we've got a few highlights from a very long night.

**Billy Ratcliff Finally Presented His Dwaine Caraway-Backed Plan.** The commission heard first from commissioner Billy Ratcliff, who presented <u>cPlano4</u>, the controversial (<u>according to Sandra Crenshaw</u>) map he's submitting on behalf of former Mayor Dwaine Caraway. The plan keeps Buckner



Terrace intact in District 5 (a point of concern throughout the redistricting process), and has seven total minority districts, four Hispanic and three African-American.

The commission on the whole didn't seem very happy with the plan: Commissioner Daniel "Corky" Sherman criticized the changes Ratcliff had made to Oak Cliff in order to preserve Pleasant Grove, and commissioner Elizabeth Jones told him, "A lot our key neighborhoods have been chopped off" in District 13. Even chair Ruth Morgan chimed in, describing the shape of District 14 as "a noose." "What's the rationale for having that kind of a configuration?" she asked.

The Phrase "Unity Map" Made Its Appearance, Just Like We Predicted. Morgan got a little stern with the next group of presenters -- commissioners Domingo Garcia, Brooks Love and Ratcliff, who presented <u>cPlan16</u>, or what they're referring to as a "Unity Map." "This plan is cPlan16," she said firmly. "It should not be referred to by a nickname."

"Commissioner Garcia prefers to call it the Unity Plan," replied commissioner Garcia. He went on to explain that the plan, whatever you want to call it, has five majority Latino, two African-American and two "coalition" districts.

Commissioner Hollis Brashear wasn't pleased that African-American communities would lose a district. "I maintain there is regression here," he said, adding, "I'm just disappointed."

There was more displeasure from the other commissioners: Jones wasn't happy with the changes made to District 13, and commissioner Donna Halstead was upset that Garcia hadn't solicited her input. "It's a shame you didn't both to respond to my requests to talk to you," she said. That set off a brief, highly awkward bout of bickering between the two during which Halstead accused Garcia of basing his districts "primarily on race," a charge Garcia angrily denied. "Don't put words in my mouth," he told her.

Chair Morgan Had To Tell Everybody To Behave Themselves. <u>Again</u>. The audience wasn't much better behaved than the commissioners. For much of the evening, the room was unusually packed and extremely chatty. There was a lot of debating, commiserating, hand-shaking, brow-furrowing and chair-hopping, to the point where there was practically a parallel meeting going on. Morgan called the audience to order twice during the "Unity Plan" presentation, and at one point threatened to remove everyone who was being "distracting" from the room.

Randall Bryant Lectured the Commission On Being "Biased, Slanderous." Former plan presenter Randall Bryant came back to speak in support of cPlan16. If you don't recall, he's the college student (and, as an Unfair Park commenter pointed out, Kathy Nealy's grandson) who Jones grilled on his educational background and political ties, offending commissioner Mary Hasan, who maintained no other submitter had been made to answer those types of questions.

Last night, Bryant called the commission's questions to him "dogmatic, biased, slanderous, and falsified," adding, "I am not, nor have I ever been, a political consultant. Who would hire a 24-year-old to consult?" He noted that cPlan16 is one of just two plans that would allow African-American council members to retain four seats. "The commission shouldn't consider anything less," he said, before taking his seat to laughter and applause from some commissioners and much of the audience.

**Dwaine Caraway Finally Speaks!** The former mayor, resplendent in a bright red T-shirt with a big yellow school bus on it, also spoke on cPlan16 (and a whole bunch of other things). As you see in the video above, he first thanked all of the commissioners for their time and service. "You're doing a great job," he told them, adding that when a proposal reaches the council level, "we'll be doing the same thing" all over again. Can't wait.

But he also wanted to lecture the commission on the virtues of compromise and ceding ground. "I took a pretty tough step three years ago," he said, by giving up the Lake Highlands area to represent Buckner Terrace. "I do a great job," he said. "They vote for me." He told the commission that everyone would have

to "collectively come together" to avoid stalemate.

Caraway also reiterated the importance of creating better districts in the south. "We in the southern sector for the last 10 to 20 years have endured neighborhoods broken up, communities of interest not kept together," he said, "while North Dallas was always contiguous, fits like a glove." He criticized cPlan16's District 5, saying, "We know this is not a fair representation."

Caraway told the commission that his doors were always open. "We want to make it right," he said, adding, "But frankly, we might lose a few friends. But I'd rather lose a few friends and keep a community together." When he finished speaking, the room emptied almost completely.



The Return of Sandra Crenshaw: After <a href="her promise a week ago">her promise a week ago</a> to shun the commission's meetings, and City Hall entirely, until her demands for justice were met, former council member Sandra Crenshaw was back at the mic. She accused the commission, again, of not using appropriate map-drawing criteria. She said that "the burden would be on the Department of Justice" to prove there was no "discriminatory or criminal intent" behind the commission's various plans. "This is not gonna fly at the Justice Department," she said.

"You've been very good and faithful in your attendance," Morgan replied with what appeared to be total sincerity.

With that, the night was abruptly over, and the commission and the five or so remaining audience members stumbled blearily towards the elevator. Next time: some kind of resolution? Maybe?

What Lake Highlands needs to know is one simple fact: our community is in for a fight over the next few weeks.


We live in a "community of interest" in every sense of the definition, and I for one am strongly opposed to any plan that will divide the take Highlands voice at City Hall.


Frankly, Mr. Garcia's attack on Lake Highlands is insulting and based entirely on race.

### Redistricting: Unity Map splits District 10, Lake Highlands

But if Lake Highlands residents let the redistricting committee know that's not OK, the "radical" proposal could be dropped before it gets too far, say those in the know.

Every ten years or so, following the U.S. Census, municipalities all around undergo redistricting. Census results reveal fluctuation in population over the last ten years, and the main point of redistricting is to ensure that there are about the same amount of residents in each of the city's voting districts. Dallas' criteria also demands minority representation.

Several weeks ago we held a roundtable discussion here at the *Advocate* about <u>Lake Highlands past</u>, <u>present and future</u>. One of our guests was former District 10 councilman Alan Walne, who explained to us that <u>District 10</u> is roughly drawn around the Lake Highlands High School attendance zone.

It makes sense, he says, because the high school (and Richardson ISD schools, for that matter) is a common interest within District 10 that bonds the community. He also points out that District 10, as it is, is a minority-majority district. About 60% minority population, he believes.

Anyone can propose a district map, and about 30 have been submitted, but Walne is concerned about one map in particular, submitted by commissioners Domingo Garcia, Billy Ratcliff and Brooks Love, which proposes drastically splitting up the Lake Highlands area.

According to a <u>CBS story</u>, Garcia "wants to realign sections of Lake Highlands. He said his plan imagines the bigger picture, one that would (also) redefine Pleasant Grove and bring the fractured West Dallas together."

Because it is the work of three commissioners, the map in question (dubbed the Unity Map) could hold some weight, Walne says. Breaking up Lake Highlands would be a "travesty," he says, a claim he explains thoroughly in a note to the redistricting committee, which I have included in full after the jump.

Basically, what the LH community needs to do, he says is let the committee know that this is unacceptable.

"The commission seeks public input," he says. "If they don't hear from us, they will assume its OK and it might be seriously considered." He notes that several public meetings will be held during the process (one tonight); during this stage, it is probably enough to send an e-letter, as he did, to redallas I <u>adallas cityhall.com</u>, or send a letter by fax at 214.670.5798.

Walne was on the council during the last redistricting and he says that traditionally, changes are minor tweaks, not major changes, as proposed in the Unity Map.

"The silly thing about this is the radical nature of it. There has never been anything like it." View Walne's letter to the

commission members after the jump.

Dear Commission Members'

In reviewing the submissions of redistricting maps I have become increasingly alarmed that District 10 is being carved up with no considerations for community of interest or "home town feel". Lake Highlands-virtually all of District 10- is a unique entity within a very large city. We have been able to develop and maintain a hometown feel by bringing the District together in a very complicated but not so complicated way. Lake Highlands High School services almost all residents of District 10. The District is among the most diverse in the city and we make it work because we work together for all in the neighborhood. Audelia Creek and Thurgood Marshall Elementary Schools were created through partnership with the City of Dallas and the Richardson School District achieved by the District 10 council members because of the common interest of the voters of the District.

The Lake Highlands Jr. Women's League has worked with the Dallas Park and Recreation Department to install a pavilion and spray ground with hundreds of thousands of dollars donated privately through the efforts of the council members and voters of the district. The Lake Highlands Exchange Club and Lake Highlands Women's League have awarded over a hundred thousand dollars in scholarships a year for many years now to deserving students from Lake Highlands high School of all backgrounds but predominately at risk children-because there is a strong feel of community and union. We make diversity work.

To carve up Lake Highlands would be a travesty and something that would do irreparable harm. Please keep the Lake Highlands attendance zone in one City Council District.

The "Unity Map" is called cPlan16 on the Dallas City Council Redistricting Commission web site at <a href="http://www.dallascityhall.com/Redistricting/planReview.html">http://www.dallascityhall.com/Redistricting/planReview.html</a>. From that page you can link either the staff analysis of the plan or the map of the plan itself. As is quickly visible on that page, cPlan16 is one of 21 full plans listed for consideration on the Commission web site. The plan chosen will probably be one of these plans, possibly with amendments made to that plan. 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## Dallas City Council Redistricting plan wPlan03: the most compact redistricting plan with the highest minority representation

The comparison of the 21 plans being considered by the Dallas City Council Redistricting Commission clearly shows that only 7 of these 21 plans have both 3 majority. Black districts and 5 majority Hispanic districts. These 7 plans are the original work of only three people. Three of the 7 plans represent commission updates to the original plans. Here is a statistical comparison of these 7 plans, with an 8th plan added. The 8th plan was generated by 12 amendments to wPlan03 following recommendations from many separate sources, including the public and commissioners.

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Seven Best Dallas City Council Redistricting Plans Compared

Click on the above chart to enlarge it.

When the plans are compared relative to compactness, only one plan stands out with both an average district perimeter below 32 miles and an average of the four indexed compactness scores that is above 1.3. This is wPlan03 with an average perimeter of 31.62 miles and an average index score of 1.35. The next closest of these plans by a different author, relative to compactness, has an average district perimeter that is over 10% longer, over 3.5 miles longer, of 36.26 miles, and an average index score of 1.24.

Once wPlan03 is amended with the 12 changes reflected in the maps below, the minority representation rises significantly. Here are the demographics produced:

These improvements from the version of wPlan03 presented to the Redistricting Commission on 7/14/11 will require improvements to be approved on the version of wPlan03 that is now before the commission. All improvements must be approved by the commission to achieve these demographics. Compactness index score average should remain near 1.34 with an average district perimeter of less than 32 miles. 


Demographics produced by most compact Dallas City Council Redistricting plan that also has 8 minority districts



The 12 changes in wPlan03 started with attempts to re-unify the uptown area by the movement of the northern end of District 4 south from Turtle Creek to the State/Thomas area. This moved 8,000 people from District 4 and into District 14. That required a ripple of no fewer than 5 additional changes to accommodate this move of 8,000 residents. One result was that the black voting age population for District 4 went up over 6 percentage points. The western boundaries of District 9 had to be moved west to take up some of that population and the southeast corner of District 10 reached into the apartments on the northern end of District 9 to take in some of that population. The western boundary of District 4 had to be moved to take in some of District 8 to make up some of this population loss for District 4.

The other major change was to move the western boundary of District 13 to Webbs Chapel Road from Forest to Walnut Hill. This led to changes to the southern borders of District 6 which was moved to Medical Center Drive. Other changes were made to the District 11/12 boundary to accommodate an agreed resolution achieved by the Commissioners in that area. Also, three sets of changes were made in District 8 to accommodate population balance with Districts 4 and 5 as well as the wishes of some residents.

Between District 1 and three the boundaries were moved to place Kessler Park and Stevens Park into District 1. The western boundary of District 1 was moved to Westmoreland Road and the northern boundary was moved to Fort Worth Avenue.

Detailed amendments will be submitted to the Commissioners to achieve these needed amendments to produce the above maps.

The best news is there is no need to gerrymander to have strong minority representation on the Dallas City Council! We must demand compact City Council Districts. These amendments, reflected above, should result in a more compact set of City Council Districts. Compact districts help maximize voter turnout! They make it less expensive to campaign for office! They make it easier for citizens to know their representative. It is easier for a council person to know the people they represent in a compact district.

Please tell the Commissioners you support wPlan03. It is the plan designed and amended so as to help the Dallas City Council best reflect the makeup of the City of Dallas, while also having compact districts.

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## Dallas Redistricting 2011

**DALLAS (CBSDFW.COM)** – The city's redistricting committee will review a map Thursday that proposes moving a large swath of the Lake Highlands neighborhood south into District 9 from District 10.

The Dallas City Charter requires a redistricting commission form once every 10 years and submit a new plan based around the changes in Dallas's demographics.

Map 16, designed by the city's redistricting commissioner Domingo Garcia, would affect nearly every district in the city: Garcia calls it the Unity Map, and some in District 10 – sometimes referred to as the Lake Highlands district – are split on the proposed boundaries.

"There are going to be places like Lake Highlands where districts change considerably because there have been demographic changes in Northeast Dallas where Latinos and African-Americans are now a majority," Garcia said.

Residents in Lake Highlands say they enjoy the neighborhood's diversity, saying it's representative of the city as a whole. But it's a collection of neighborhoods built and bolstered by its name.

There's Lake Highlands North and Lake Highlands South. There's even Old Lake Highlands. The Lake Highlands High School is in the Richardson Independent School District. Yet the Lake Highlands Parks and Recreation Center falls under the city of Dallas's responsibility.

But does this collage of communities constitute a distinctive Dallas City Council district? Residents like Alan Walne say yes.

"This is a fairly radical change," said Walne, who opposes Garcia's plan. "It is a community. Why tear apart a community? Yes, we consider, in a lot of ways, ourselves as Lake Highlands, Texas. We look at ourselves as a unique community."

Garcia, a Dallas attorney by day, wants to realign sections of Lake Highlands. He said his plan imagines the bigger picture, one that would redefine Pleasant Grove and bring the fractured West Dallas together.

"This is a unity map that unites the city," he said.

But Lake Highlands advocates say they are a community of consistency and similar interests, and should stay put. Urban policy analysts see it as an area of seismic demographic shift.

"If we're sticking with the racial, ethnic lens, the areas of the city that have seen the most shift in the last ten years with Latino and African American population, those would be the most boundary shifts," said Tim Bray, an Urban Policy Professor at the University of Texas at Dallas.

Alan Walne, who called Lake Highlands a "minority majority district," said those changes are part of the fabric of the community right now, and there's no need to realign the community politically.



# Let's Watch Domingo Garcia, Redistricting Commission Discuss the Future of Dallas

Redistricting Commissioners Elizabeth Jones and Domingo Garcia, who have tough and thankless jobs for which they aren't paid a penny, are displeased with me at the moment for nay-saying their incomplete maps. Garcia chided me in the comments, writing that it appears I've graduated from "the Rupert Murdock school of journalism." He insists that his submission was merely "a demonstration map to show that 5 Hispanic opportunity districts could be drawn [and that] there was no attempt to draw other districts since the plan is for demonstrative purposes only."

Meanwhile, Jones has sent me two emails in which she writes, among other things, that her maps are intended to show only that it's possible to keep intact communities threatened by other submissions – among them, she points out, my beloved District 13, which several proposals threaten to dismantle. "Going back to the earliest Commission meetings, I have been outspoken on the issue of preserving neighborhoods," she writes this morning. "I continue to see that as a most important consideration whether you live in the north or south. We all value community."

Anna went to last night's meeting; I told her not to worry about covering this one, most of which I watched last night. She can recap both Tuesday and Thursday's meetings on Friday. Besides, I just discovered: The city now makes it possible to embed City Hall hearings — and not only that, but allows you to jump straight to a scene, which will come in handy during Dwaine Caraway's impassioned city council monologues. So let's look at Garcia's explanation above, along with accompanying commentary by his fellow commissioners — and, yes, this is *riveting*, better than any network's summer series. Then, on the other side, let's say hi to Sandra Crenshaw, who's also unhappy with me (see the comments).



According to the comparison of the 21 plans that are now before the Redistricting Commission, online at <a href="http://dallasredistricting2011...">http://dallasredistricting2011...</a>, there are only three of the 13 people, and one group, who have submitted plans in which there are 5 Hispanic majority districts and three Black Majority districts combined in the same plan. It seems logical that both these goals for minority representation, with a total of 8 minority districts at a minimum, should be met. Here is the plan, now being considered by the Dallas City Council Redistricting Commissioners, that achieves all these goals, with the most compact plan, and the highest minority representation demographics. # Redistricting 2011: LH on the chopping block

New lines in the definition of Lake Highlands

Since 1991 the community of Lake Highlands has been represented on the Dallas City Council by a sole councilmember.

That councilmember is responsible for working together with the city manager, city attorney, citizen boards, commissions and fellow council representatives on behalf of LH constituents.

Every 10 years, following the national census, the City of Dallas Charter mandates a Redistricting Commission be formed.

Since early February, the Redistricting Commission has held meetings most every Tuesday and Thursday for the purpose of

presenting redistricting plans and maps to members of the commission.

What could this 2011 redistricting process mean to Lake Highlands?

Commissioner Donna Halstead, former District 10 Councilmember, pulls no punches in describing the impact on the Lake Highlands community.

"People have assumed that just because the district [10] is in the northern sector and that we are at or near the optimal size, we are somehow protected from gerrymandering. Nothing could be further from the truth.

"Our neighborhood and its integrity are at risk, and we need to be heard in this process."

In large part, all the maps presented to the Redistricting Commission leave Lake Highlands and District 10 intact.

However, if cPlan16, created by Commissioners Domingo Garcia, Billy Ratcliff and Brooks Love, is adopted the Lake Highlands community will be divided and possibly marginalized at City Hall.

This plan, which Garcia has refers to as the "Unity Map," calls for splitting Lake Highlands into three separate districts.

According to documents available on the City of Dallas website, city staff has noted that this plan meets each of the three review criteria - Population Equality, Minority Representation and Contiguity and Impactness.

However, also taken into consideration is "Communities of Interest" with city documentation making note, "Where possible, communities of interest shall be maintained in a single district."

As for Commissioner Garcia, with respect to District 10, "Communities of Interest" appears to be loosely defined.

When questioned about the boundaries of Lake Highlands, and whether those boundaries constitute a community of interest, Garcia offered the following statement:


"I played football for Berkner and played at Wildcat Ram Stadium. I know the area well. We tried to minimize the impact with this plan. If I remember correctly, we kept similar socio-economic neighborhoods together.'

While Lake Highlands is already considered a Minority Opportunity District, achieving a "strong Minority Opportunity District" is the pronounced goal of Garcia's plan for the current District 10 area,

"Northeast Dallas and the entire city has gone through a very dramatic demographic change over the past decade - especially the dramatic growth of the African-American and Latino populations," Garcia said.







"We thought we could make all the districts more reflective of the diversity of that part of the city with this plan. We want to get the district up to 50% minority voting age population."

"No minority has been elected from District 10 since 14-1 was passed in 1991," Garcia continued.

"This plan will give a minority candidate the opportunity to win as an incumbent by forming coalitions across all these neighborhoods."

When asked how many minorities have actually run for the District 10 council seat since 14-1 passed, Garcia responded by saying, "Probably none. The Anglo voting majority wins every time. It's a self-fulfilling prophecy."

For Commissioner Halstead, Lake Highlands has always been clearly defined and meets every conceivable definition of a Community of Interest.

"We are a united community, based upon our commitment to our public schools. Whether black, brown or white, our schools are what draw people to Lake Highlands and also what draw the people of Lake Highlands together."

"The map put forward by Commissioner Garcia draws boundaries based solely on race and ethnicity and completely ignores the foundation of a strong public education school system which brings us all together," Halstead continued.

"As the commission was informed by the city attorney office, courts have struck down districts being proposed based solely on race as Mr. Garcia's plan clearly is."

New district maps will ultimately be voted on by the Dallas City Council this fall and adopted in 2013.

Residents can voice opinions on the matter by contacting each member of the Redistricting Commission via email, fax or in person at City Hall.

The first opportunity offer opinions in person is Thursday, August 4th, at City Hall where the "Unity Map" is being presented to the Redistricting Commission.

The meeting is set to begin at 6:00 p.m. in Room 6SE.

Residents are encouraged to arrive early enough (no later than 5:55 p.m.) in order to sign-in.



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# Proposed redistricting maps could increase Latino representation on the Dallas City Council

Latinos will probably have a greater chance of increasing their representation at Dallas City Hall after the city's redistricting process has run its course.

But even if officials do increase the number of Latino-majority City Council districts, it could be mid-decade before the opportunity becomes reality.

As the city's redistricting commission begins to hold its final public hearings on new redistricting maps, advocates have introduced maps that would expand the number of Latino-majority City Council districts from three to five.

They say the increase is needed to adequately reflect the growth of the city's Latino population, which stands at more than 40 percent of the total. Only three of the 14 single-member district seats are held by Latinos.

Dallas lawyer **Domingo García**, who sits on the redistricting commission, recently introduced a map with five Latino-majority districts, one black-majority district, and one coalition district where ethnic and racial minority groups are the majority.

"Our map reflects the diversity of Dallas more adequately and shows the willingness of our community to be part of the decision-making process for Dallas," García said.

García has been involved in redistricting issues since 1991, when the city increased the number of single-member districts to 14. He has been a consistent advocate for more Latino political representation.

He believes Latinos are entitled to six districts today, based on their percentage of the population. But age and citizenship, as always, are major factors in preventing greater representation.

Latinos tend to be younger than average, and a certain percentage are immigrants and ineligible to vote.

Oak Cliff resident Bill Betzen took these factors into consideration when he drew his map, which also has five Latino-majority districts.

In the Latino-majority districts he drew, an average of 62.4 percent of the voting-age population is Latino. Betzen, a former social worker and now a retired Dallas teacher, said his motivation for drawing the districts was basic: "Dallas needs to be governed by the people who live here."

He wants to see smaller, more compact districts that would make boundaries easier for voters to locate on a map.

A smaller district also would be easier for a candidate to campaign in. Betzen said he lives in District 8, which is 52 miles long and takes in too many disparate neighborhoods.

Compare that to City Council member Pauline Medrano's District 2, which is only about 15 miles long

Medrano applauded the efforts of Betzen and García to increase the numbers of Latinos on the City Council.

"There's no doubt that we're everywhere, and that we'll potentially have an impact on every City Council district," Medrano said.

"But we may not fulfill our goal of more Latino City Council members for another four years."

Educating an electorate that traditionally doesn't have a strong turnout at the polls will be the key, she said.

And with jobs and school cutbacks a main concern for Latinos, she said, "the stakes could not be higher for us today."

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


# Crenshaw Manages to Bedevil Redistricting Commission Without Even Showing Up

We told you it was getting weird in there: At last night's meeting of the city's Redistricting Commission, the most important person in the room wasn't even in the room. That would be <u>Sandra Crenshaw</u>, cactus juice addict, <u>Schutze co-star</u> and, increasingly, the commission's biggest headache.

Crenshaw was scheduled to appear before the commission last night to present <u>her two proposed</u> redistricting maps. But in a move reminiscent of that time Marlon Brando sent that Native American lady to pick up his Oscar, she emailed a three-sentence statement instead, which the project demographer read into the record. And they were *long* sentences.

"This is to serve notice to the City of Dallas," the statement began, "that I will not make any personal appearances before this commission until my redistricting attorney on Voting Rights Act issues has the opportunity to review all of the public and confidential notices and efforts that I have submitted to ..." followed by a list of city officials that included the city attorney, the acting secretary, two city managers and several city council members.

Crenshaw accused commission members of directing the public to draw maps in a way that protects incumbents, of "berating" public submitters and of various other corruption- and manners-related forms of unpleasantness. She ended by saying, "Until my personal attorney and I can be assured that somebody other than me bring objections to those concerns I cannot appear before this body in the audience or at the mike and probably not at City Hall period."

This wasn't exactly a surprise: Crenshaw has repeatedly expressed her displeasure that Dwaine Caraway has been allowed to submit a map through Billy Ratcliff, his appointed commissioner.

"The whole purpose and intent of appointing people to draw the lines is so it will be independent of the council people," she told Unfair Park in a lengthy phone call last week."So you don't try to gerrymander to

keep the current incumbents."

But when <u>we talked to Redistricting Chair Ruth Morgan</u> yesterday, she reiterated that it's legal and above-board for city council members to submit maps. "There really is no issue there," she said. "Anyone can submit a map. No one is confined from submitting one. Anyone can ask a commissioner to do the map, as long as it's perfectly transparent. This was done last time, there's no change there. The commission shouldn't get in the business of saying, 'You can't submit one or you can't do it this way."

That still left the issue of Sandra Crenshaw's own maps last night, which the commission didn't quite know how to handle. John Loza proposed indefinitely postponing both of them, which several commissioners immediately said they disagreed with, pointing out that it wasn't the first time a map had been submitted without its creator being present to answer questions. Loza argued that this time was a little different, saying that when a submitter "has deliberately insulted the commission by adamantly choosing not to appear before it, I would say we don't have to give much consideration to those maps." At that, an older African-American woman in the audience laughed unhappily.

Morgan went into a brief huddle with staff attorneys, and the commission ultimately decided to leave Crenshaw's maps in the mix. Crenshaw was also signed up to speak during the public comment period. She didn't show up for that one either, resulting in what was probably the shortest Redistricting Commission meeting ever. By 8 o'clock, Unfair Park was back out on the sidewalk, wondering what the hell to do with the evening. And what, for that matter, are we going to do when the redistricting is over completely? This is way better than TV.







I submit this e-mail as (i) a Lake Highlands resident, (ii) a member of the Richardson ISD Board of Trustees since May, 2000, and (iii) a member of the Skillman TIF Board.

I strongly urge that Lake Highlands NOT be divided into two or more city council districts. Such action would be detrimental to not only Lake Highlands, but to the City of Dallas and Richardson ISD.

My wife and I are 28-year residents of Lake Highlands. Our children attended RISD schools in Lake Highlands from kindergarten through high school. I echo the comments of other Lake Highlands residents concerned about dividing Lake Highlands among several council districts. I, too, point to the "cohesive community" of Lake Highlands, the long-standing investments by Lake Highlands civic organizations in City of Dallas projects, the value of turning to a single city council member who lives in Lake Highlands, and the commitment of Lake Highlands residents to embrace diversity in neighborhoods and schools. There is no question that Lake Highlands is a "small town" with Lake Highlands High School as its epicenter. I often say to people that "unfortunately" Lake Highlands is a "unique" community - the point is that the City of Dallas would benefit from MORE communities like Lake Highlands.

I believe that my 11+ years of service on the Richardson ISD Board of Trustees provides a unique perspective to this discussion. The RISD trustees are each elected "at-large" and the RISD boundaries encompass 38square miles within the cities of Dallas, Garland, and Richardson. I know the numerous communities within RISD and assure you that Lake Highlands is a "community of interest" under any definition. In fact, I believe it is the most distinct "community of interest" among the 4 high school attendance zones in RISD.

Proposed redistricting plans that divide Lake Highlands into 2 or more council districts would also divide schools, neighborhoods, neighbors, and communities. At least one plan I have reviewed would divide certain school attendance zones (elementary, junior high schools, and Lake Highlands HS) such that families within a single school would be represented by different city council members – that is not only confusing for residents and council members, it is not in the best interest of the City of Dallas. Moreover, there are already 3 Dallas city council members who live in and represent RISD areas. Increasing that number to 5 Dallas council members within the RISD boundaries would undermine and dilute the long-standing effective communication and productive partnerships between RISD and the City of Dallas.

I have not heard a credible argument for dividing Lake Highlands into multiple council districts - how would fragmenting Lake Highlands benefit the residents of Lake Highlands, the outstanding schools in Lake Highlands, or the City of Dallas? I recommend the proposed redistricting plan cPlan16 not be adopted. I believe that, if adopted, this plan would intensify racial segregation in Lake Highlands, and overturn decades of successful cultural integration in the Lake Highlands Community. Lake Highlands is already, and has been for many years, a united Community of Interest, and dividing it would represent an unwarranted, artificial and counterproductive maneuver.

I believe it is perceived by some that adopting cPlan16 would be a path to electing a minority to a council seat. I suggest that geographic racial segregation, as would result from a redistricting plan like cPlan16 for example, is never a good idea, and would lead to fragmentation of representation rather than consensus. Lake Highlands would, in fact, move backwards in time in terms of civil equality if cPlan16 were adopted. 

# Redistricting Commission Chair Ruth Morgan Says, Look, She Has It All Under Control

You may want to bring <u>a bottle</u> <u>of this</u> tonight.

It must be Christmas in July or Unfair Park's birthday or something, because there are *two* Redistricting Commission meetings this week. The second one is tonight, and the main event will probably be <u>Sandra Crenshaw's</u> presentation of her <u>two proposed maps</u>. We suspect she may follow that up by expanding upon the promises she made Tuesday night to lodge formal complaints with both the Department of Justice and the city's Ethics Commission over Dwaine Caraway's being allowed to <u>submit a map</u> through his appointed commissioner.

In advance of that particular bit of legislative excitement, this morning we called Redistricting Commission chair Ruth Morgan -- author of <u>Governance by Decree: The Impact of the Voting Rights Act in Dallas</u> -- to see how she thinks the process is going so far. <u>Things got a little shouty</u> between members of the public and the commissioners on Tuesday night. So is this what she envisioned when the commission asked ordinary citizens to get involved in the redistricting process?

"This is not unexpected. It happens in these things," Morgan tells Unfair Park. "There's a lot at stake and a lot of passionate feelings about what is right." She adds, with a dry little laugh, "One might wish that the commissioners would be a little less passionate in their questioning, because at times I think it could be misinterpreted as an attack. When I talked to the commissioners later, though, that was not their intention."

Morgan reminds us that the commission has been meeting for almost six months without compensation. "They are very conscientious," she said. "When something goes on from February the 8th to the hot summer days of August, it's quite demanding on their time and energies and work. I think they should be credited with what they've been doing. They've been exceedingly responsive to the public and exceedingly responsive to trying to fulfill the guidelines as they were adopted at the beginning."



Dr. Morgan is absolutely correct. The Dallas Redistricting meetings are going very well. The conflicts we are seeing are what happens when you make this process transparent, when you make it public. As the public begins to slowly understand the true power of redistricting, and how that power has been manipulated by politicians to select their own voters and create "impossible to loose" seats of power, the anger will spread.

Gerrymandering made possible in the "normal" redistricting process behind closed doors has created the impass we now have in Washington. Too many politicians in Washington know there is no danger they will ever be voted out no matter how much they do not do in D.C. or how bad their decisions. They have either been able to gerrymander their own districts, selecting their voters, or, if they are not from "the party" in power, they have allowed the "other party" to use their district as the dumping ground as the other party "packs" their district as part of the gerrymandering strategy. 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

population in District 4 when compared with the version of wPlan03 presented to the Commission. This was achieved by following the requests of residents of Uptown Dallas to reunify their area of Dallas. The northern boundary of District 4 was moved south from Turtle Creek to Thomas Avenue with the result that almost 8,000 in mostly Anglo population was moved from District 4 into District 14. This necessitated 5 of the 6 corrections that were made to the original wPlan03. That original wPlan03 is in the data base of maps being considered by the Redistricting Commission.

This change, plus one other minor change to District 8, moved the average Black voting age population (VAP) percentage for the three majority Black districts from 60.25% to 62.70%.

Additional changes were done this morning to the western edge of District 13 in response to concerns by the District 13 Commissioner. By moving the western boundary of District 13 from Marsh to Webb Chapel the Hispanic VAP has now risen a total of 3.66 percentage points in District 6 to 66.05%. This led to a rise of half a percentage point, to 62.43%, as the average for the percentages of Hispanic VAP in the 5 majority Hispanic districts in the modified wPlan03.

No other map being considered by the Dallas City Council Redistricting Commission is even close to the level of minority representation possible with these modifications to wPlan03: **62.70% Black VAP average in 3 districts** and **62.43% Hispanic VAP average in 5 districts.** Wplan03 also continues to be **the most compact map** being considered of all the maps that also have 8 minority districts.

Eight minority districts should be the **minimum** number of minority districts in any Dallas City Council map considered, and they should be strong districts, with VAP averages above 60%, unless someone manipulates the maps to make them weak.

# This Whole Commission's Out of Order: City of Dallas's Redistricting Fun *Really* Begins

OK, no one has actually studied the effects of redistricting on the human body, but after last night it seems safe to say that the longer a redistricting process goes on, the grouchier everybody gets. At the county level, we have Maurine Dickey's temper tantrum as evidence. And last night's meeting of the city's Redistricting Commission featured some yelling from the audience, some yelling from the commissioners and a few stern words from Ruth Morgan, the chair whose no-backroom-shenanigans and keep-it-civil policies are well documented.

But, first, a guest star: Mayor Mike Rawlings showed up for a redistricting meeting for the first time last night, sitting quietly at the staff table and munching on a boxed lunch. When Morgan asked if he'd like to say anything, he replied, "No, I'm just learning and listening. ... Thank you to all of you for your time."

But Mayor Mike disappeared pretty soon after it became clear that what was to be the main event of the evening, the presentation of <a href="Dwaine Caraway's not exactly street-legal map">Dwaine Caraway's not exactly street-legal map</a> by commissioner Billy Ratcliff, was not going to happen after all. Ratcliff announced that he wouldn't be presenting the plan, as it is still "in evolution." "It has evolved from this to the plan that I'll be presenting on August 4th."

This was not thrilling news for former city council person <u>Sandra Crenshaw</u>. "We signed up to speak on this plan as scheduled," she said, referring to herself and <u>Marvin Crenshaw</u>. Morgan allowed them both time to air their grievances about Caraway's proposed map, at which point. Crenshaw said she believes it is "a violation of the code of ethics for [Ratcliff] to be advancing a map by a council member."

"This will be articulated at every public forum," she promised, and "through other means," including, she said, complaints to the Department of Justice and the city's own Ethics Commission.

The next bout of uncomfortableness came minutes later, when 24-year-old college student Randall Bryant presented his redistricting map. Donna Halstead, a commissioner fresh from her own proposed map being tabled amidst accusations from other commissioners of deliberate minority disenfranchisement, told Bryant, who is African-American, that his map was, in fact, kinda racist. Specifically, she criticized him for drawing District 10 in such a way that, according to her, "an Anglo would definitely be re-elected." But she also told him, "To look at this only in terms of the color of skin of the individuals is to be very shortsighted."

During the public comment period, former Unfair Park-er Sam Merten got up to talk about some changes he's made to his own proposal. ("Why is he speaking if he lives in Frisco?" a lady whispered agitatedly behind me. "I think he works in town," whispered her companion.) Specifically, he's moved Buckner Terrace into District 2, put all of Vickery Meadow in District 13, and all of Oak Lawn into District 14.

"The Village should be in District 13," said a slightly testy commissioner Elizabeth Jones. "People keep trying to chew my western boundary of my district." She added that Merten's map "makes a lot of radical changes that need not be made." Domingo Garcia also asked Merten, again, why his proposal signficantly alters District 2, Pauline Medrano's district.

"I didn't make this map to protect incumbents," Merten said, very, very politely. He was equally calm with commissioner John Loza, who thanked him for coming and then said, "Now I'm gonna come after you." Loza demanded to know what the Hispanic neighborhoods along Maple -- "One of which I live in" -- have in common with Turtle Creek and Uptown. Merten replied that several districts are quite diverse, pointing to District 14 as an example.

"It doesn't sound like you have an answer for me, so I'm gonna just move on," Loza said.

"I've tried to answer your questions," Merten replied.

The low point of the meeting came during Bill Betzen's presentation: He's narrowed down his three maps to just one, and told the commission, "I really do enjoy working on these maps. ...I'm getting better all the time."

But Jones became visibly annoyed with him, telling him, "You have altered the north considerably," adding that he'd made a lot of changes to District 13. "I've told you again and again," she said, at a volume that could fairly be described as shouting, "take the Village out and put it back where it belongs!"

From the audience, Crenshaw shouted back, "The public doesn't take directives from the commission! The commission takes directives from the public."

"You're out of order," Morgan told her.

"You never call your commissioners out of order," Crenshaw replied. Morgan told her that she'd be asked to leave if she didn't abide by the rules of conduct. "*That's* in order," Crenshaw replied, and was quiet for the remainder of the meeting.

Jones turned back to Betzen and said, in a normal tone of voice, that she hoped he would "allow [himself] to embrace" the changes she's recommended.

Just a suggestion, but maybe the commission and the regulars in the audience might want to embrace some deep breathing exercises instead? A stress ball, perhaps? Because this thing ain't over yet by a long shot.






# Domingo, As a Member of the Redistricting **Commission, You Should Really Know Better**

Like I said Friday, when we looked at Dwaine Caraway and Carolyn Davis's messed-up maps, Anna's heading to that Redistricting Commission meeting this evening at City Hall -- sooooo lucky. (Tell Sandra Crenshaw that Schutze sends his warmest regards.) In advance of that wingding, I went to the commission's site this afternoon to see if anyone submitted a map since last we looked -- and sure enough, moments ago some commission members' maps went live, complete with staff analysis. And when it comes to issues of minority representation, says the staff analysis: "While this plan includes 7 minority districts and 2 minority coalition districts, many of the districts exceed the population deviation for population equality. Because all areas of the city were not assigned to a district, additional evaluation of the plan cannot be completed."

Still, at least his submission is better than fellow commissioner Elizabeth Jones's. She could only be bothered to redraw four districts' boundaries: 10 through 14. It doesn't work like that. Not like she should know. Oh, wait. Add Donna Halstead's nixed proposal to the scrap heap, and the commission's batting a bit o-fer at the moment.

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# First Dallas ISD Redistricting Meetings started 7/25/11

This evening the first Dallas ISD redistricting meetings happened. I attended the one at Bryan Adams High School. There were 14 people in attendance. I heard afterward that nobody showed up at the other meeting on the other side of Dallas at Medrano Middle School. Testimony this evening by a very articulate recent college graduate, from the New Tejas Project, about the need for both printed and online redistricting materiels in Spanish as well as English may help explain the lack of attendance at Medrano Middle School. It is located in a Dallas City Council District that is almost 70% Hispanic.

These meetings are managed by staff from Bickerstaff. Heath, Delgado and Acosta LLP who are on contract with DISD to manage the redistricting process. A court reporter attempted to record all testimony. Most of it appeared to center around questions relating to the redistricting process and differences between the four maps, and who made them. In summary the following most critical points emerged:

- 1. Need for more print and online materiels in both Spanish and English explaining the redistricting process, as applied within DISD, was obvious.
- 2. There must be public access to both online and/or computer workstation software and databases to allow redistricting maps to be drawn by the public for submission. (If a political entity like DISD does not provide such public access then only firms or individuals with the significant resources needed for such data bases and software can effectively provide usable input for map design. Demographic data from 2010 census is critical.)
- 3. Information on compactness of each district is very important if we are seeking to create the most efficient districts possible. No information on the compactness of the current DISD district map, or the four proposed, was available, not even district perimeter or area. It is much easier for a trustee to represent a more compact area than some of the gerrymandered districts within DISD.
- There needs to be a public record of every meeting placed online and available. (A videotape of the meeting may also be helpful but the expense may prohibit this.)
- The need for maps with high school attendance zones to help in redistricting process, and in generating public interest, was mentioned by several present.

This is a new process for board members as well. Two local members were present this evening, Ms. Nutall and Mr. Perrott. They were obviously working hard to facilitate the process.

As the power behind redistricting becomes better understood the redistricting process will attract increased public interest. DISD would do well to consult with the Dallas City Council redistricting staff who appear to be far ahead in the process. But how can DISD do it all for about 38% of the \$650,000 the City of Dallas has budgeted for this process? A new map of more compact trustee districts, that will both preserve and produce a dedicated board to accurately reflect Dallas, is well worth the investment.

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

The next meeting of the Redistricting Commission <u>is Tuesday</u> -- I know, I know, settle down. 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

Dear Ms. Tolliver,

I understand that you are the staff coordinator for the redistricting commission. I would appreciate your sharing this email with the commission.

I appreciate how difficult it must be to draw a redistricting map that is satisfactory to all segments of this wide and disparate city. As a member of the City Plan Commission representing District 12 for almost five years, I also appreciate the long hours and dedication it takes to be a civic volunteer, and I thank you for your service. When I heard that the commission was considering a map in which the Prestonwood neighborhood, where I have lived since 1992, would no longer be a part of District 12, I wanted to write you and give you some additional information.

Within in months of moving into Prestonwood, I became active in the Concerned Cotton Belt Coalition, a group of neighbors who worked closely with our past council members Max Wells, Sandy Greyson, and Ron Natinsky to ensure that concerns of the neighbors would be heard as development of the Cotton Belt rail line proceeded. For those of you unfamiliar with the Cotton Belt, it is a 26 mile long rail corridor owned by DART, extending from DFW airport to North Central Expressway, that cuts through the heart of Far North Dallas, crossing 8 intersections in our neighborhoods, with homes backing up to both sides of the tracks. The line is part of the DART system's 2030 plan, but plans are underway to create a public/private partnership to help finance the line so that construction can begin much sooner. The Coalition sent representatives to Austin to lobby, has met with Congressman Pete Sessions, and is well known at DART. The Prestonwood neighborhood, with 1027 homes, is the largest neighborhood in the Coalition, with the most homes impacted by the Cotton Belt rail line. The Coalition has been successful in keeping our concerns at the forefront because all of the affected neighborhoods are in the same council district. If the affected neighborhoods were to be split between council districts, the impact of our citizens on our council member is diluted. We are at a very critical juncture right now; in fact on Monday night there will be a DART meeting concerning the Environmental Impact Study that has been proceeding along the Cotton Belt. It is imperative that all Dallas neighborhoods affected by the Cotton Belt be in the same district. Ensuring that the Cotton Belt is implemented in accordance with the Natinsky Plan (the compromise plan for responsible development along the corridor adopted by the Dallas City Council after 14 years of negotiations) is the major development issue affecting District 12 for the foreseeable future. Splitting our Coalition between council districts could severely weaken our strength at a time when we must be united.

My family has resided in Lake Highlands (District 10) for 21 years. When we moved from California in 1990, we looked at houses all over the northside of the Dallas area (Coppell, Plano, Richardson, North Dallas, and Lake Highlands) before we finally settled on a home in Lake Highlands. We were initially attracted to Lake Highlands and have remained in Lake Highlands for the following reasons:

- 1. Strong schools: I am a big believer in public schools, and the academic reputation of the Lake Highlands schools and RISD was a key consideration in our decision to move here. And, it has been a key consideration in our decision to stay and raise our sons in LH.
- 2. Strong sense of community: Lake Highlands is like a city within a city. #### Madam Chair Morgan:

I would like the record to reflect the following comments made by Commissioner Elizabeth Jones of District 13 on August 2, 2011:

1. Under Commissioner Jones' own testament, she stated, "I have asked and quite frankly it's only been of young people, people typically under the age of 30 if not 25 education just as a matter of reference, and also because we had testimony from people from Eastland College that they were working with the GIS program and as you know UT Dallas also has GIS programs, so my curiosity when I see someone drawing maps or taking a proactive interest in our process it's always to ask whether they are doing that in concert with our Universities. So realistically I was not trying to in anyway challenge our young man capabilities, in fact I was very impressed, with what Mr. Bryant presented to us."

This however is false, I have notated in Exhibit A all questions asked by Commissioner Jones to each map presenter that has appeared before this commission and not one has been asked that question.

2. Under Commissioner Jones' own testament, she state, "My raising of the issue of Mr. Bryant's political background came from two things. Number one in his own testimony he pointed out that he had learned about the city through active political grassroots and other related work. He was very clear in stating that. The second is that he did not reveal to us even though I asked him if he was a paid political worker the nature of that work and differentiating that all of us would have the opportunity to do it as a matter of our personal right a democracy versus somebody who is a paid political advocate that was my point.

After reviewing my quite hostile dialogue with Commissioner Jones' I did in fact state that I have ran Phone Banks and Walk Programs and that I have been paid to do so, however I have never been paid as a Political Consultant. For her to continue to insinuate that I did not reveal the nature of my work is a complete lie.

as a matter of public record that is a material fact. And that is something that needs to

For the past year I've had the pleasure of sitting on a City of Dallas Board, the South Dallas Fair Park Trust Fund Board and I am registered with the company I work for as a Lobbyist with the City of Dallas. In those capacities yes my professional and personal information is a matter of public record. However, as a citizen of the City of Dallas, in the capacity of authoring and presenting a map for my vision of our great city, my education, professional and personal information is not a matter of public record for material fact, and should not be disclosed.

Although I have been quite disappointed in the actions taken by some Commission members, rest assured that I have not been discouraged.
