



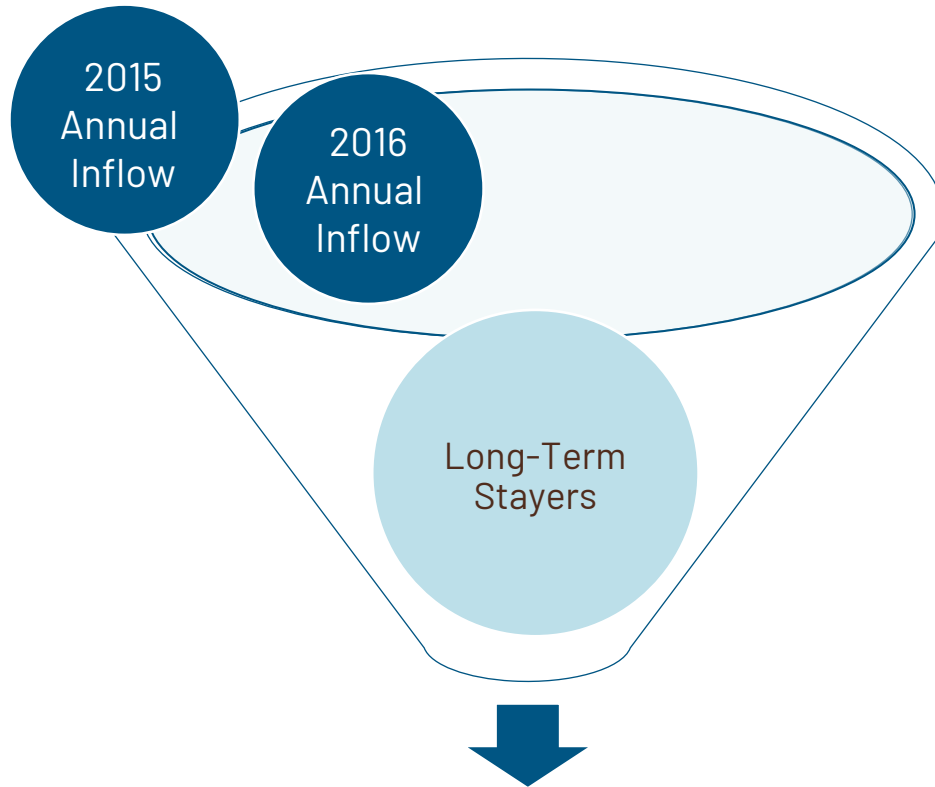

## Temporary Shelter + Inadequate Rehousing Exits

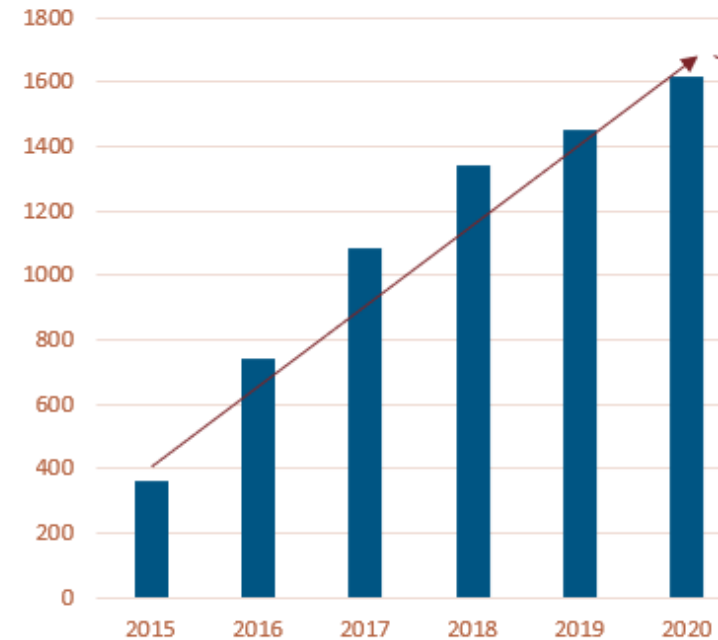


## The Result:

2015-2020 – 3 X increase in unsheltered homelessness  
45% increase in homelessness overall

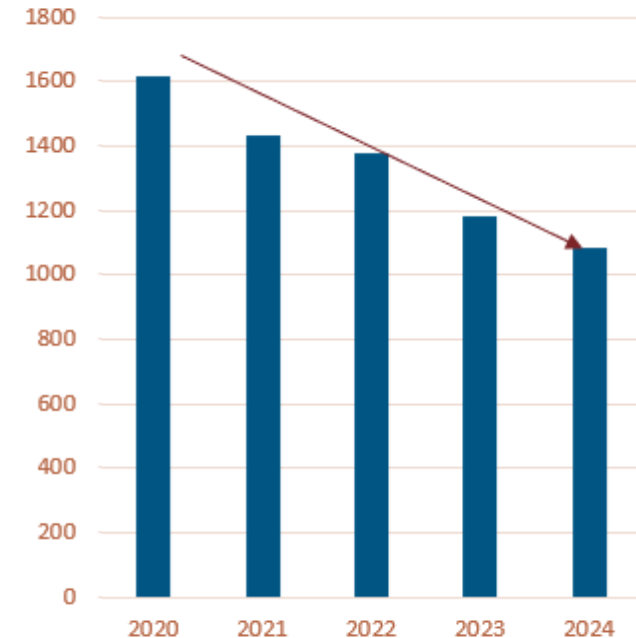

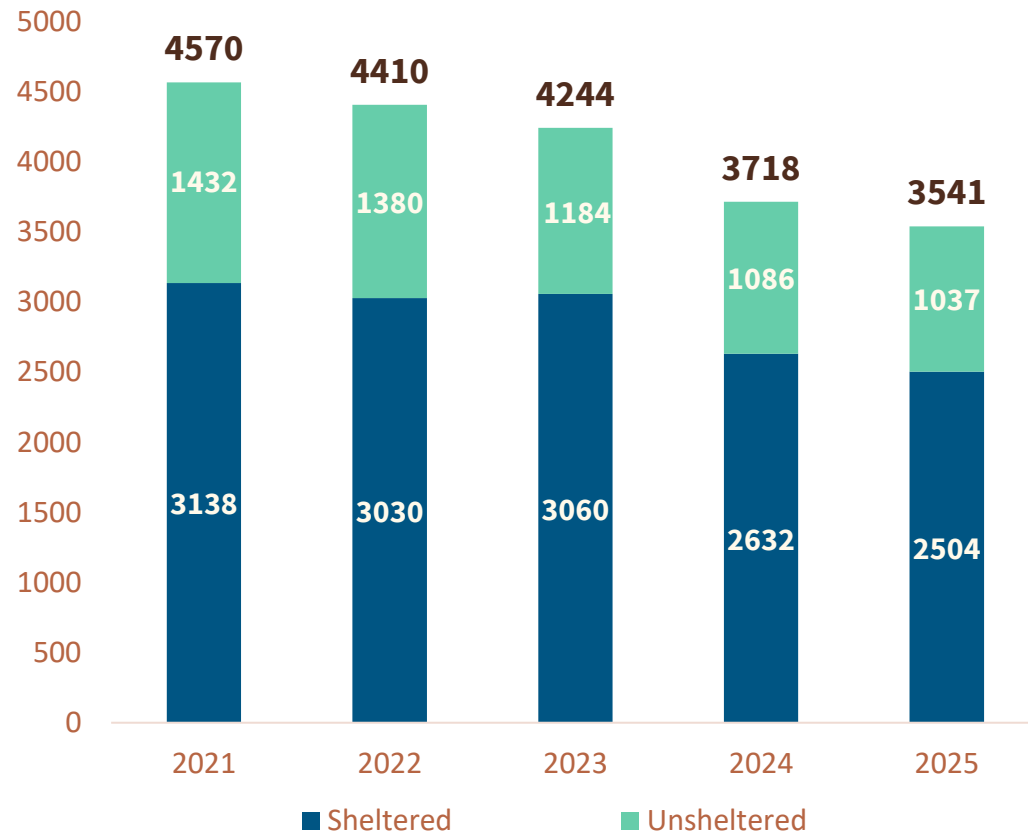
## Trends in Unsheltered Homelessness

# STRATEGIC INVESTMENTS LEAD TO FOURTH CONSECUTIVE YEAR OF REDUCTIONS, DESPITE YEAR-OVER-YEAR INCREASES IN ANNUAL INFLOW

**Dallas and Collin Counties**  
Point-in-Time Count (2021-2024)



Since 2021, system transformation has resulted in

- 23% decrease in overall homelessness
- 28% decrease in unsheltered homelessness
- 15,968 Individuals Housed, 90% do not return to homelessness
- Effective end to Veteran Homelessness

# STREET TO HOME INITIATIVE: PHASE 1

## *Achieving an Effective End to Street Homelessness in Downtown Dallas*

### ENHANCED INTERVENTIONS

#### 1. Integration of Mental Health and Housing Services

257 moved into housing with integrated mental healthcare; 20 connected to higher level of care.

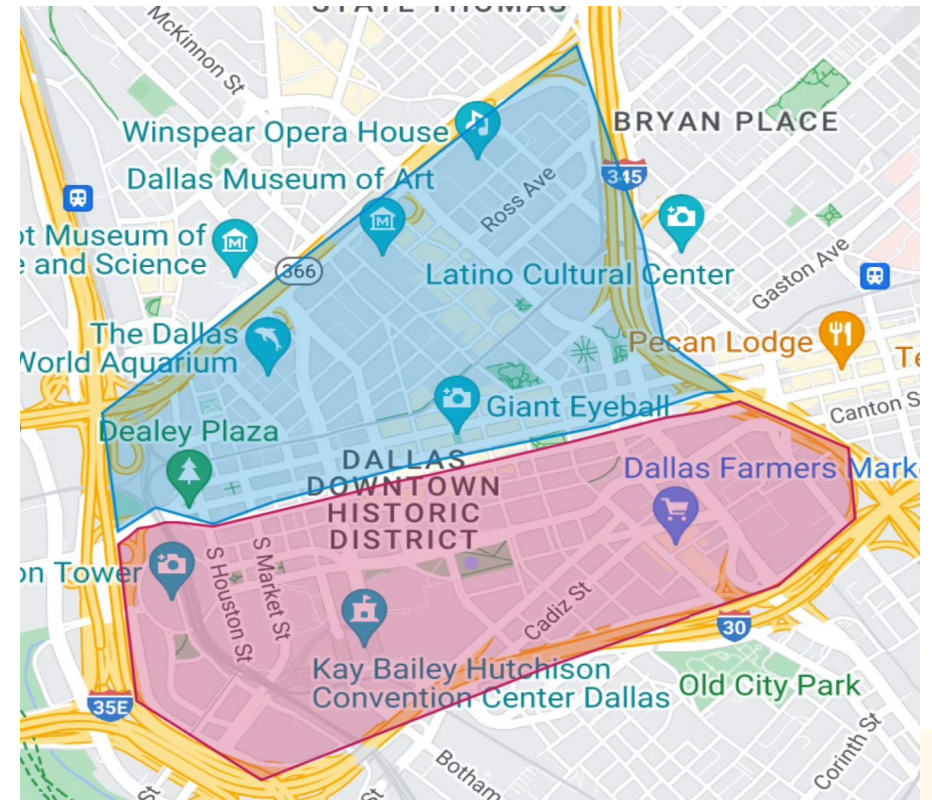
#### 2. Multidisciplinary Site Management & Enforcement

Pathways off the street immediately activated for new individuals attempting to sleep Downtown, w/ multidiscipline teams assigned to 2 X geographic zones

#### 3. Accelerated Diversion and Rehousing from Shelter

Avoid overflow onto street, bring new individuals into shelter

## STREET TO HOME INITIATIVE: PHASE 2

*Downtown provides a proof point for ending street homelessness, incrementally across Dallas and Collin counties*

What does an effective end look like?

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1. No One Sleeps Outside
2. Multidisciplinary response immediately activates pathways off the street for anyone new attempting to live or sleep outside
3. Diversion and Rehousing from Shelter Prevents Future Street Homelessness



# STREET TO HOME INITIATIVE: PHASE 2

## *What's Next?*

Resources to:

1. Maintain an effective end Downtown
2. Resolve high-priority, high-risk encampments at new locations across the City
3. Begin building a sustainable system that can end street homelessness incrementally, across Dallas and Collin counties.

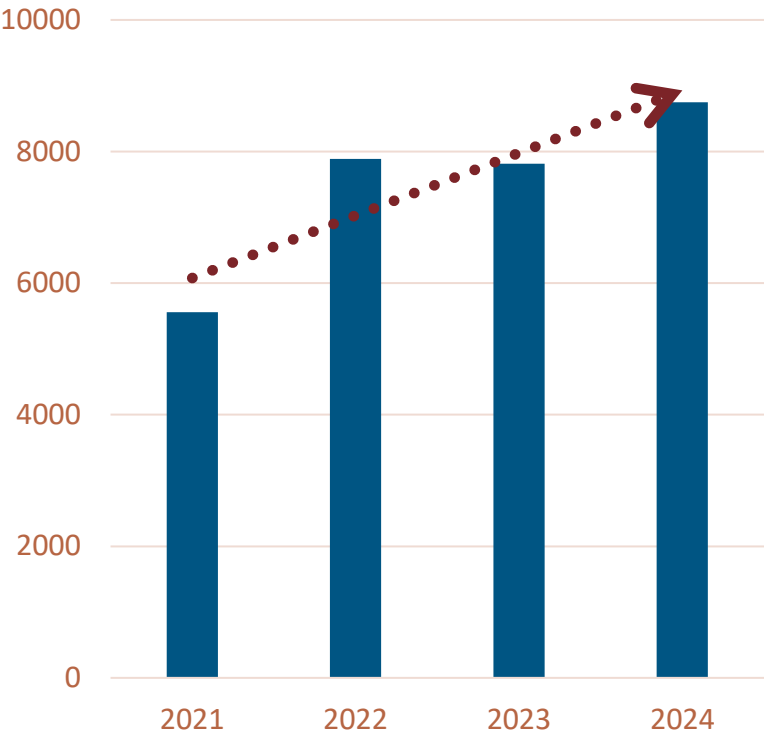

Annual Number of Household Inflowing Into the Homeless Response System (2021-2024)\*



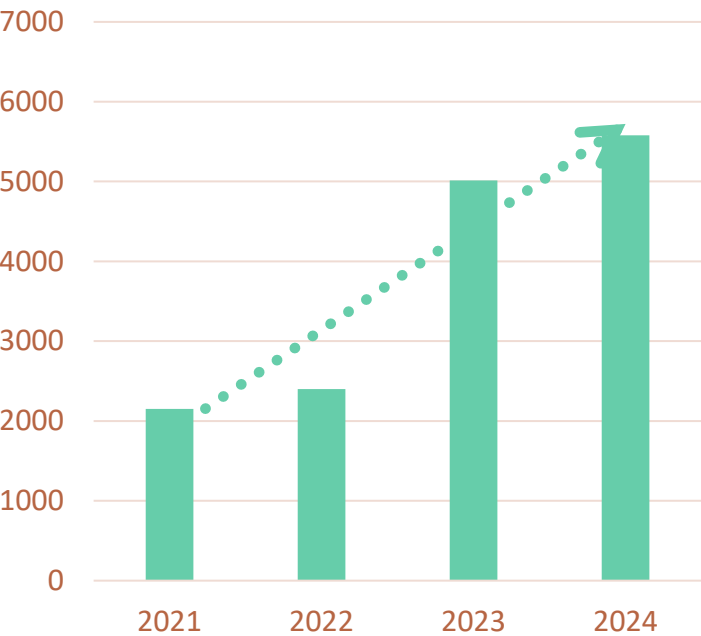
**INFLOW:** Includes people newly entering homelessness, as well as 650 returning, over the course of the year

Annual Number of Diversion & Rehousing Placements (2021-2024)\*

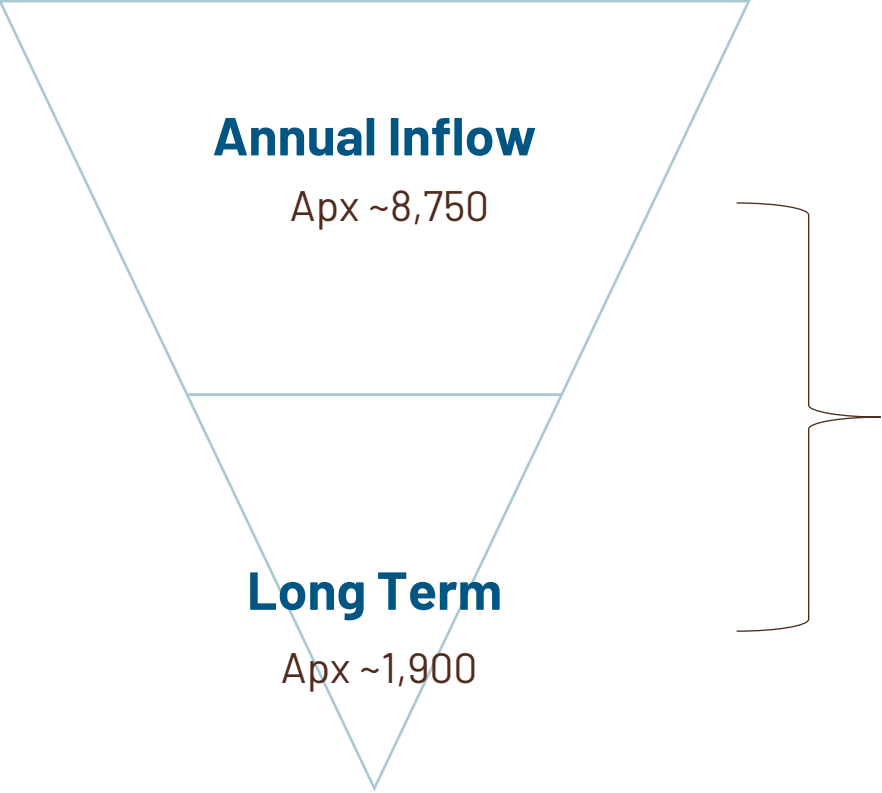

## HIGH IMPACT INTERVENTIONS

STRATEGIES	% of HHs Served
<b>Self Resolve or Systemwide Diversion</b> Divert wherever possible with very low cost, light touch interventions	70%
<b>Rapid Rehousing</b> Rental assistance and case management to prevent long term homelessness	17%
<b>Permanent Supportive Housing + Integrated Behavioral Healthcare</b> targeting long-stayers w/ disabling conditions (long term rent assistance and integrated behavioral healthcare)	13%
