- April to June 2017 Citizens Bond Task Force
   Assisted the City Manager and City Council in reviewing and selecting projects for each proposition
- May 2017 Two CBTF Town Hall Meetings
   Collected 420 Resident Comment Cards



#### **2017-2022 Bond Program**



#### 1,322 projects:

- A. Streets: 1,027 projects
- B. Parks: 163 projects
- C. Fair Park: 12 projects
- D. Flood Control: 85 projects
- E. Libraries: 3 projects
- F. Cultural Arts: 9 projects
- G. Public Safety: 16 projects
- H. City Facilities: 7 projects

### **Proposition A: Streets and Transportation**

\$533,981,000 for 1,027 projects to construct or improve streets, sidewalks, and multimodal facilities in coordination with established transportation plans and other agencies.

- Traffic signal system upgrades
- Installation of warranted traffic signals at 63 locations citywide
- Street reconstruction and resurfacing
- Sidewalk replacement
- Critical bridge repair



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#### **Proposition B: Parks and Recreation**

**\$261,807,000** for **163** projects to acquire, develop or renovate parks and park facilities and amenities.

- Aquatics Master Plan Phase 1 and 2A
- Southern Gateway Public Green
- Dallas Zoo, Dallas Arboretum and Klyde Warren Park expansions
- 38 miles of trail improvements
- Rehabilitation and expansion of multiple recreation centers



#### **Proposition C: Fair Park**

**\$50,000,000** to rehabilitate **12** historical facilities, including roof repairs, HVAC replacements, plumbing improvements, security system upgrades and facade repair.

- Hall of State
- African American Museum
- Coliseum
- Texas Discovery Gardens
- Food and Fiber Building
- Magnolia Lounge
- Tower Building
- Science Place 1
- Aquarium Annex
- Pan American Complex
- Music Hall
- Centennial Building



# Proposition D: Flood Control & Storm Drainage

\$48,750,000 for 85 projects to improve or develop stormwater drainage systems, erosion control, and flood management to minimize repetitive flood loss.

- Bank stabilization
- Vinemont Channel improvements
- Drainage flow improvements



#### **Proposition E: Library Facilities**

\$15,589,000 for 3 critical projects to improve the City's library system.

- Replace the existing Forest Green Branch Library with a new facility
- Construct a new library in the Vickery Meadow/Midtown area
- Complete plumbing and roofing improvements at the J. Erik Jonsson Central Library







### Proposition F: Cultural & Performing Arts Facilities

\$14,235,000 for the rehabilitation of 9 cultural and performing arts facilities, including waterproofing, roof replacements and security upgrades.

- Dallas Museum of Art
- Bath House Cultural Center
- Kalita Humphreys Theater
- Dallas Black Dance Theatre
- Sammons Center for the Arts
- South Dallas Cultural Center
- Morton H. Meyerson Symphony Center
- Dallas Heritage Village
- Oak Cliff Cultural Center







#### **Proposition G: Public Safety Facilities**

**\$32,801,000** for **16** projects to design and construct new public safety facilities and rehabilitate existing facilities.

- Security upgrades at the Jack Evans Police Headquarters and 7 police substations
- New fire station at Loop 12 and Jim Miller
- Replace fire stations #36 and #46
- Interior renovations (kitchens, showers and living quarters) at 15 fire stations
- Waterproofing, HVAC replacement, electrical, mechanical and plumbing improvements at 12 fire stations



### Proposition H: City Hall & City Service & Administrative Facilities

\$18,157,000 for 7 projects to expand and rehabilitate existing City facilities.

- 8,000 sq. ft. expansion of West Dallas Multipurpose Center
- City Hall renovations
- Replacement of electrical panels at 37 facilities
- Phase 1 renovation of the Oak Cliff Municipal Center



# Proposition I: Economic Development & Housing

\$55,400,000 to help facilitate economic development and housing opportunities throughout the City.

- Revitalization of commercial corridors
- Transit-oriented development
- Mixed-income housing
- Mixed-use development
- Neighborhood revitalization



## **Proposition J: Homeless Assistance Facilities**

\$20,000,000 for permanent supportive and transitional housing.

- Permanent supportive housing targeting:
  - Chronic homeless
  - 0-30% Area Median Income (AMI)
- Rapid rehousing addressing:
  - Elderly and disabled
  - Families with children
  - Young adults (ages 18-24)
- Day centers for seamless wraparound services



#### **Bond Program Highlights**

- No property tax increase
- Focus on reconstruction and rehabilitation
- 51% streets and transportation projects (more than 500 lane miles)
- Millions in leveraged outside funding



#### 2017 Bond Program Delivery

- Shovel-ready projects
- Projects currently under design
- On-call contract delivery (rare)
- Funding agreements
- Design build projects
- Mass selection of design consultants



### **Challenges to Resolve**

- 1. Equity in assigning work
- 2. Diversity enhancements
- 3. Clarity in PS&E
- 4. Timely dispersal of procurement documents
- 5. Set-up of proper bond reporting structure
- 6. Project delivery
