Landmark initiation and appeals

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Historic Designation Initiation process

- Property owner through a zoning change application or;
- Landmark Commission (LMC), City Plan
 Commission (CPC), or City Council authorization of
 a public hearing.
 - A notification letter is sent to the property owner at least 10 days prior to the public hearing to initiate.



- <u>Ft. Worth</u> City manager, City council, Historic Commission, owner or owners representative.
- Houston
 - Requests for designation are by property owner or HAHC (Commission must have a majority vote to initiate)
 - "Protected Landmark" designation can only be requested by property owner
 - Only City Council can determine designation based on recommendations from planning commission and HAHC
 - *Districts need 67% owner consent



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San Antonio –

- Only property owner can initiate,
- 3rd parties can file for review but must have owner's consent - if no consent, review is scheduled with Commission.
- If determined it should move forward, review is scheduled with City Council and can proceed without owner's consent.
- *Districts need 51% owner consent to pass, must have at least 30% at the time of first public hearing.
- Austin Owner or an agent of the owner can initiate, or a 2/3 Commission vote in favor to approve initiation. 4



- <u>Denver</u> Initiated by anyone (non-owners require at least 3 persons to sign off on the application who are either residents or owners of property, or business owners within the city/county of Denver)
- Atlanta
 - Owners, city council (with nomination to the director) can initiate.
 - *Districts owners of 10 properties or 10%, whichever is less.
- Los Angeles Anyone can nominate



Appeal of initiation process

- After the Landmark Commission (LMC) or City Plan
 Commission (CPC) approves the initiation, the property owner
 may appeal the initiation to the City Council.
- A written notice to director within 10 days after the action of the LMC or CPC.
- Staff has 180 days after the appeal to prepare and present a designation report to the City Council.
- Landmark Commission must approve designation report.
- Sole issue on appeal is whether the LMC or CPC erred in evaluating the significance of the property based on the criteria.

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- Ft. Worth Written notice of appeal must be filed within 15 days with the Ft. Worth City Secretary's office and the HPO must specify grounds for appeal.
 Houston property owners can apply for a "Certificate of non-designation", HAHC has 180 days to consider application.
- San Antonio Appeal to Board of Adjustment within 30 days
- Austin Appeal must be submitted by 14th day after date of decision by board/commission



- <u>Denver</u> Appeal must be file within 28 days to the district court, but all "administrative remedies" must be exhausted first.
- Atlanta Appeals filed with Superior Court of Fulton County within 30 days
- Los Angeles Appeals to Planning Commission must be filed within 15 days of the date of action. Decisions can be appealed only once.
