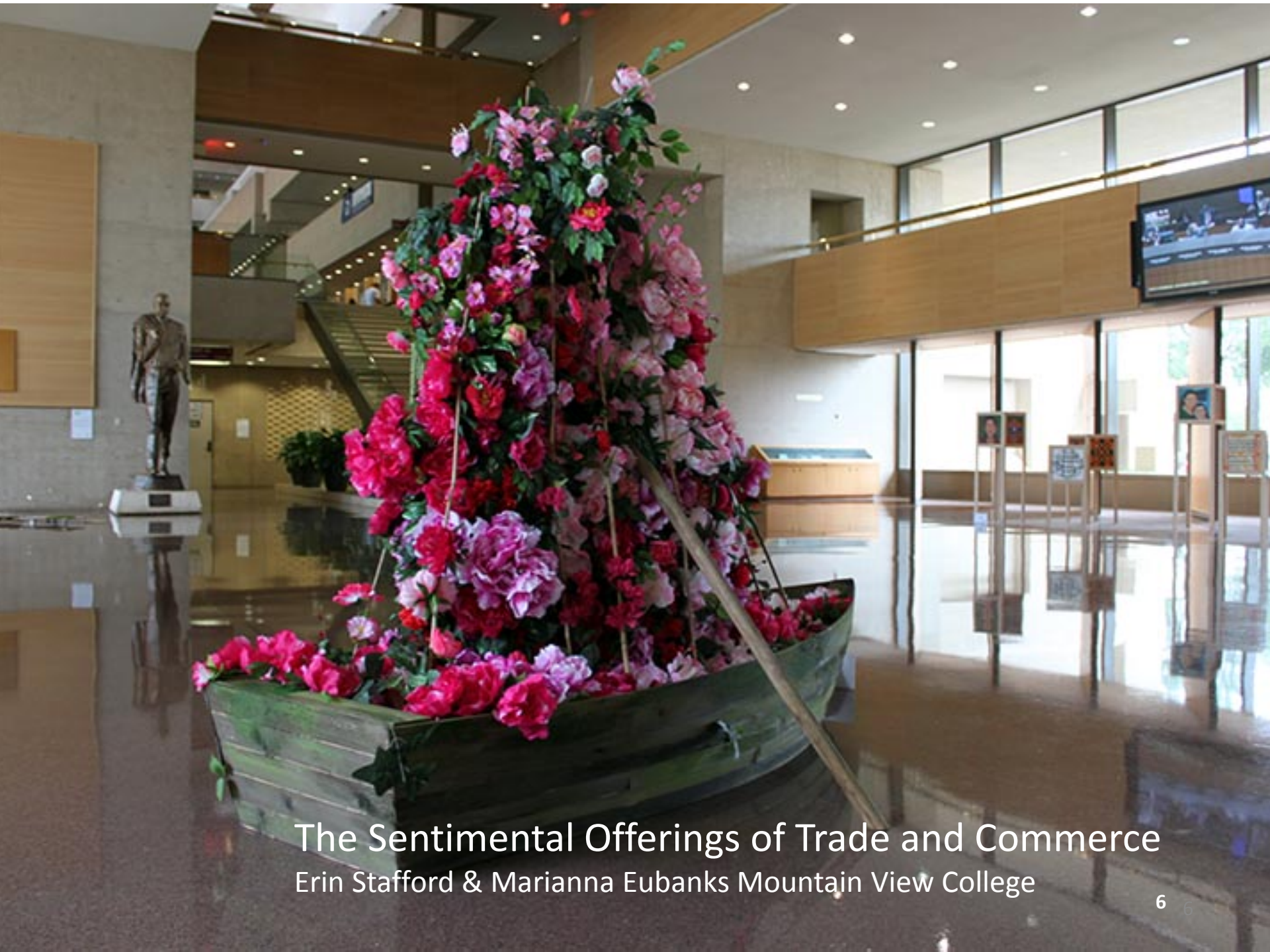


What is SEVEN?

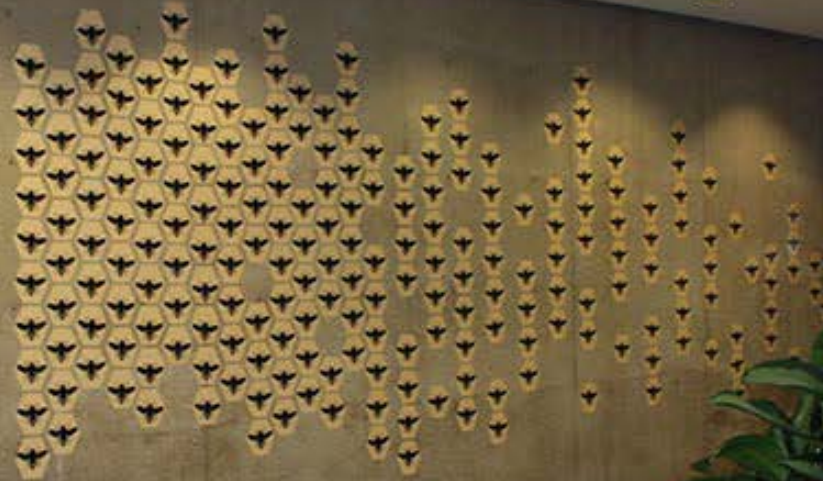

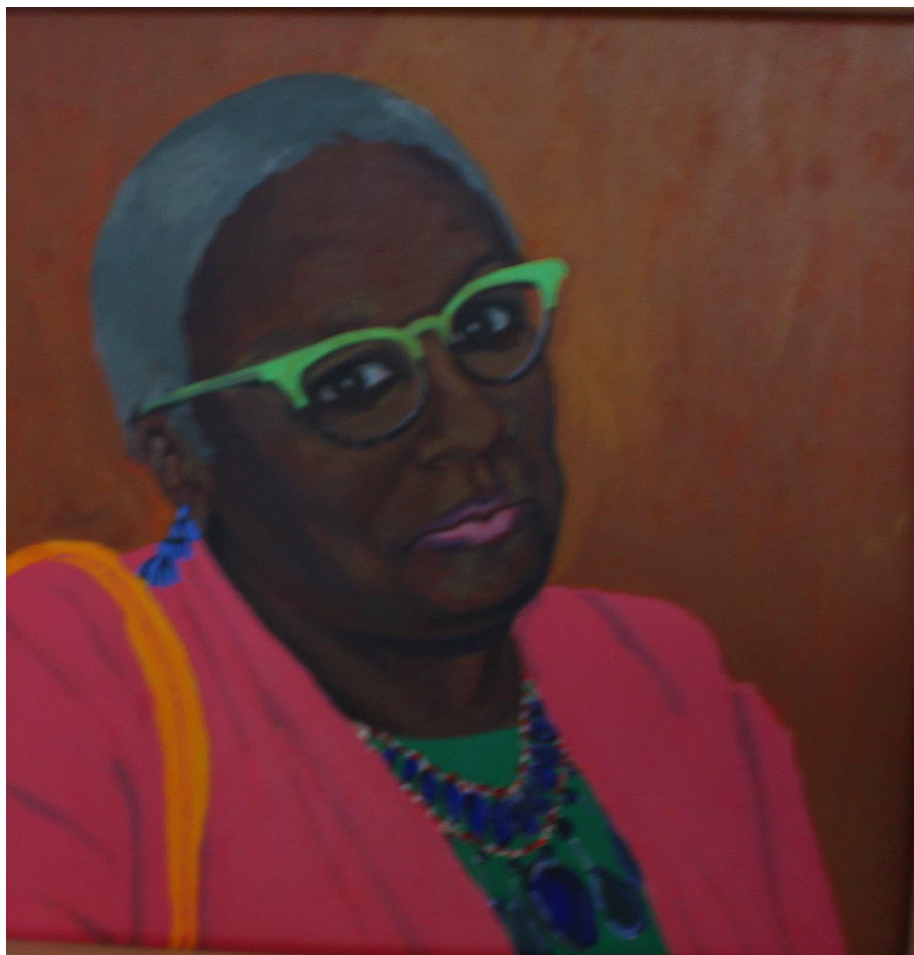

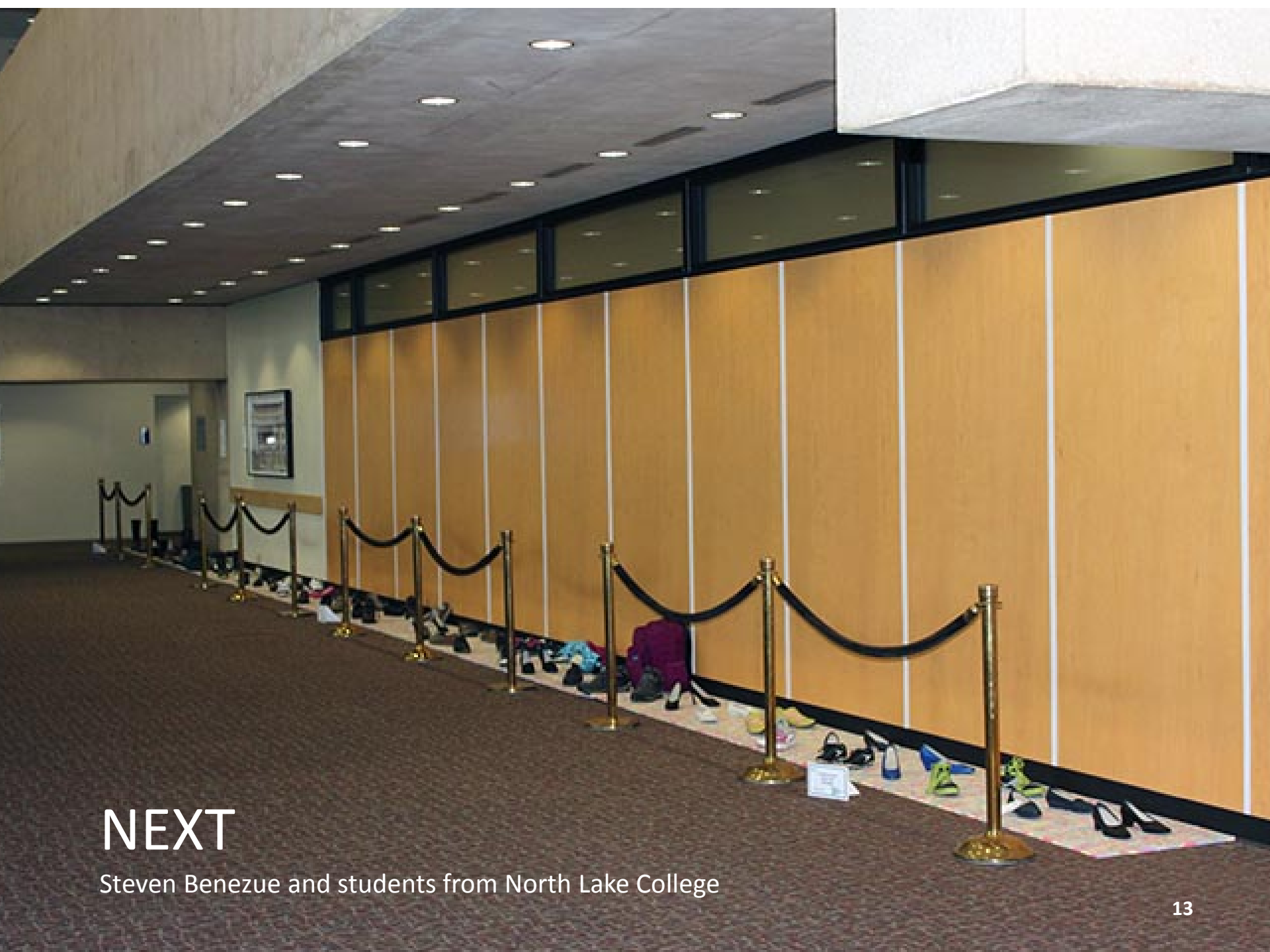
