

2. Citizens Police Review Board

Action Taken/Committee Recommendation(s):

On Monday, February 11, 2019, Chief Hall briefed the committee on the Citizens Police Review Board. This presentation provided the information on the current board and highlighted the Dallas Police Department's recommended changes to the board structure. Leading up to this briefing, many groups, associations, and citizens have provided insight on possible changes to the board. These changes will facilitate integrity-driven policing and strengthen community relationships. Staff discussed: background on the current board structure, an overview of areas of opportunity, review of input from multiple stakeholders and a chart with the current and proposed board. Next steps include the City Attorney's Office to review recommendations, construct an ordinance to modify the City Code and to present a briefing to the full council in March 2019. Councilmembers expressed concerns about reducing the number of board members. The committee does not feel ready to bring this to full council in March, following this meeting staff will take feedback into consideration and work with the coalition and board members to bring a revised briefing to council in March. A public hearing regarding the item will be taken into consideration.

City Attorney Update

- Reviewed past and recent cases concerning civil forfeitures
- Did not discover any cases binding in Texas which hold that the civil forfeiture process is illegal or unconstitutional
- Recent U.S. Supreme Court Case
 - Ruled that the excessive fines provision of U.S. Constitution applies to States and municipalities



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City Attorney Update

- Recent U.S. Supreme Court Case (continued)
 - Excessive fines clause:
 - Prohibits the government from imposing a fine that is excessive based on the facts and circumstances of a particular case
 - Applies to civil asset forfeitures
- Texas Constitution already had an excessive fine provision
- Supreme Court ruling did not alter the Texas civil forfeiture process

Asset Seizure Overview

- In addition to narcotics seizures, the department will seize currency, vehicles and other property that are used to further the criminal activity and are obtained through illgotten gains
- Asset Seizure (AS) is a powerful tool used by law enforcement agencies against criminals and criminal organizations

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Asset Seizure Overview, Cont.

- Asset Seizure is authorized under Federal Law (18 USC, 19 USC, 21USC) and Texas Law (CCP – Chapter 59)
- Law Enforcement agencies use these laws to disrupt, dismantle, and deter those who commit illegal activity for financial gain



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Seizures, Cont.

- The Dallas Police Department's role in asset forfeiture is only in the <u>seizure of evidence</u>
- Seizure:
 - The forcible taking of property by government law enforcement from a person who is suspected of violating, or is known to have violated the law



Seizures

- In order for a law enforcement agency to seize potential evidence in a criminal case:
 - 1. Judge determines probable cause pursuant to a sworn application for a search warrant
 - 2. Probable cause is found by an officer pursuant to an exception of the warrant requirement

In either instance, the law requires that any seized item must bear a substantial connection to to the offense



Public Safety and Criminal Justice

Seizures

- <u>Due process</u> is afforded to any person making claim to the property that was seized within the respective governmental process if they choose to participate
- After a court hearing, the Dallas Police Department will receive a notification from the respective government attorneys office if an award is made to the department



Narcotic Division's Seizures

- The Dallas Police Department utilizes both federal and state laws depending on which enforcement group develops a case
- Dallas Police federal task force cases involving seizures are adopted by the federal agencies they are assigned to and become part of the equitable sharing program



Equitable Sharing Program

- The Federal government equitable sharing program states that the proceeds of liquidated seized assets are shared between state and federal law enforcement authorities
- The Federal Government holds the seized money until a determination is made in court; and sends the City a check



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Confiscated Funds Accounts

State <u>Confiscated Fund</u>

- Follow the State of Texas Chapter 59 Forfeiture Code
- City holds seized money in an escrow account until :
 - It is determined that a civil case will not be filed, so the money is returned
 - A civil case is filed, a ruling is made in Court, and a determination is made by the court on the final disposition of the seized property



Confiscated Funds - Awarded



Summary

- Funds awarded are used to supplement,
 <u>NOT</u> supplant government budgets
- All seizure cases are reviewed by the prosecutors before being filed for asset forfeiture



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Summary, Cont.

- Government must notify owners or potential owners of the seized property and process to make claim
- The seized property or currency cannot be used until due process has been afforded and it has been officially awarded



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Conclusion

- Asset Seizure is a vital tool used to combat criminal activity
- Asset Seizure takes the profit out of criminal activity
- Dallas Police Department recommends the continued use of the Asset Seizure policies which are already in place

SUBJECT Dallas Fire-Rescue Strategic Initiatives

On Monday, February 25, 2019, you will be briefed on Dallas Fire-Rescue's (DFR) strategic priorities for 2019 by Fire Chief Dominique Artis. Dallas Fire-Rescue continues to work to recognize and identify present and future departmental challenges and opportunities. The executive staff for DFR has outlined the following strategic priorities for 2019:

- 1. Improve Citizen and Firefighter Safety
- 2. Executive Officer Development/Succession Planning
- 3. Mental Health and Wellness Enhancements
- 4. Service Delivery Improvements
- Continue to Improve Community Relationships 5.

Improve Citizen and Firefighter Safety

The safety of our citizens and firefighters will always remain our top priority. Over the past year, Dallas Fire-Rescue made significant changes to address safety concerns. We developed a Health and Safety Program that certified the department's first Health and Safety Officer to be compliant with National Fire Protection Association 1521 (Standard for Fire Department Safety Officer). The Department also improved its City of Dallas Insurance Service Office (ISO) rating from a Class 2 to a Class 1. Listed below are Dallas Fire-Rescue's 2019 strategic priorities for safety:

- Implement the 1st phase of the replacement plan for our Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus
- Establish a plan to acquire the 2nd set of bunker gear for firefighters
- Full implementation of Priority Dispatch in late May. This software will help to prioritize which units are sent to emergency calls and what level of response is needed.
- Continue to procure ambulances with patient loading capabilities. • These ambulances are designed to reduce the risk of back injuries to firefighters/paramedics associated with loading patients.
- Implement DFR's highway blocker program to protect personnel and equipment at highway emergency incidents. The highway blocker program



will address many of the issues related to DFR's vehicles being struck on the freeway.

Executive Officer Development/Succession

Dallas Fire-Rescue has lost a significant amount of occupational knowledge due to attrition over the last several years. This problem of high attrition has created the need for an Executive Officer Development Program (EODP). The goals of the program are to prepare our emerging leaders to become future executives by developing an outline of activities that will strengthen their skills. The EODP will be designed to challenge and engage selected individuals and provide a broader perspective of city and departmental business.

The Dallas Fire-Rescue Department will lower its overtime budget for FY 2019 due, in part, to the overwhelming success of our 2018 recruiting initiatives. This success has resulted in the department becoming fully staffed.

Mental Health and Wellness

Increased levels of stress, anxiety, and heavy workloads, place firefighters who are not provided needed support at greater risk of mental and physical health problems. The U.S. Fire Administration reports issues related to post traumatic stress, suicide, substance abuse, and depression across the country. Cardiac problems are another issue for firefighters that may be caused by exertion, and is one of the leading causes of firefighter deaths in the U.S. Cancer also poses an elevated risk to firefighters. Dallas Fire-Rescue's Health and Wellness division is developing programs to support the physical and mental well-being of our members.

Service Delivery Improvements

Dallas Fire-Rescue is committed to developing service delivery improvements to external and internal customers. Customer service will always remain an essential element of service we provide to our citizens. We will continue to encourage behaviors that exemplify our "Service First" philosophy embraced by city management. Service delivery improvements for 2019 include:

- Cultivate strategies for station planning and infrastructure improvements
- Develop a plan to attain Texas Best Practices from the Texas Fire Chief Association
- Develop a plan for International Fire Accreditation from the Center of Public Safety Excellence
- Design a model for our future Digital Radio system
- Improve predictive fire modeling for fire prevention efforts





On February 25, 2019 the Office of Emergency Management will brief the PSCJ Committee on the strategic objectives and goals for the department this calendar year. <u>TIER I Department</u> is a department who has at least one essential function that must be operational within 0-24 hours and whose overall function directly impacts life safety or City's infrastructure.

311, CIS, CMO, CTS, DFR, DPD, DWU, OEM, PBW

<u>TIER II and III Department</u> is a department whose essential function (s) must be operational within 1-7 days (Tier II) or with 7-30 days (Tier III). Some departments may have an essential function that must be operational within 0-24 hours, but their functions do not directly impact the life safety and City's infrastructure and thus are classified Tier II.

Authorize a one-year master agreement for the purchase of **(1)** 21 pieces of fleet vehicles and equipment for the Fire-Rescue Department - Siddons Martin Emergency Group, LLC in the amount of \$9,949,206.18 through the Houston-Galveston Area Council of Governments cooperative agreement; and **(2)** 100 squad cars for the Police Department - Freedom Dodge in the amount of \$4,363,900.00 through the Texas Association of School Boards cooperative agreement - Total not to exceed \$14,313,106.18 - Financing: General Fund (\$3,359,439.00), Master Lease-Equipment Fund (\$10,784,821.18), and Communication Service Fund (\$168,846.00)

BACKGROUND

This action does not encumber funds; the purpose of a master agreement is to establish firm pricing for goods, for a specific term, which are ordered on an as needed basis.

The City conducts an evaluation on vehicles and equipment using established criteria before replacement occurs. This evaluation includes life-to-date maintenance cost, recommended replacement mileage, and recommended replacement life. This purchase includes the replacement of 120 vehicles and equipment and 1 new unit.

This master agreement will allow for the purchase of a total of 121 fleet vehicles and equipment for Police and Fire-Rescue departments. Below is a list of the units:

- Police squad cars with partition 40 (DPD)
- Police squad cars without partition 60 (DPD)
- Aerial ladder trucks 3 (DFD)
- Pumper trucks 3 (DFD)
- Air truck 1 (DFD)
- Rescues (ambulances) 12 (DFD)
- Lake fire boat 1 (DFD)
- Swift water rescue vehicle 1 (DFD)

The Houston-Galveston Area Council of Governments and the Texas Association of School Boards cooperative agreements are authorized by Chapter 791 of the Texas Government Code and Subchapter F, Chapter 271, Texas Local Government Code. Section 271.102 of the Texas Local Government Code authorizes a local government to participate in a Cooperative Purchasing Program with another local government or a local cooperative organization.

PRIOR ACTION/REVIEW (COUNCIL, BOARDS, COMMISSIONS)

WHEREAS, on February 28, 2018, City Council authorized a one-year master agreement for the purchase of 549 pieces of fleet vehicles and equipment with Austin Truck & Equipment, LTD dba Freightliner of Austin in the amount of \$7,739,741.00, Sam Pack's Five Star Ford in the amount of \$7,336,461.00, Freedom Dodge dba Duncanville Automotive in the amount of \$3,915,044.00, Holt Texas, LTD in the amount of \$3,836,090.00, Chastang Ford in the amount of \$3,503,450.00, BTE Body Co., Inc. in the amount of \$1,121,466.00, Freedom Chevrolet dba Duncanville Automotive in the amount of \$534,680.00, Grande Truck Center in the amount of \$380,778.00, Bond Equipment in the amount of \$273,429.00, Rush Truck Centers of Texas, LP dba Rush Truck Center Dallas Light and Medium Duty in the amount of \$259,328.00, and Landmark Equipment in the amount of \$154,388.00; 56 pieces of fleet vehicles and equipment with Siddons Emergency Group, LLC in the amount of \$7,548,946.00, Hudson Bus Sales, LLC dba Hudson Emergency Vehicle Sales in the amount of \$4,196,597.00, Sam Pack's Five Star Ford in the amount of \$599,212.00, and Houston Freightliner, Inc. in the amount of \$344,746.00; 89 pieces of fleet vehicles with Sam Pack's Five Star Ford in the amount of \$2,914,138.00; 9 pieces of fleet vehicles with Southwest International Trucks, Inc. in the amount of \$1,766,519.00; and 1 piece of equipment with East Texas Mack Sales, LLC in the amount of \$264,125.00, by Resolution No. 18-0374; and

WHEREAS, on August 22, 2018, City Council authorized a one-year master agreement for the purchase of two pieces of fleet vehicles with Siddons Martin Emergency Group, LLC, and Houston Freightliner, Inc.; six pieces of equipment with Dickson Equipment Co., Inc.; five pieces of equipment with Rush Truck Centers of Texas, LP, Kirby-Smith Machinery, Four Brothers Outdoor Power and RDO Equipment Co.; four pieces of equipment with Scully's Aluminum Boats, Inc.; and four pieces of fleet vehicles with Sam Pack's Five Star Ford by Resolution No. 18-1145; and

WHEREAS, on December 12, 2018, City Council authorized the purchase of onehundred nine pieces of fleet vehicles and equipment with Chastang Ford, Holt Texas, Ltd., Austin Truck and Equipment, Ltd. dba Freightliner of Austin, Sam Pack's Five Star Ford, Southwest International Trucks, Inc., Kirby-Smith Machinery, Kinloch Equipment & Supply, Inc., Freedom Chevrolet, Rush Truck Centers Of Texas, LP; seventy-three pieces of fleet vehicles with Sam Pack's Five Star Ford; four pieces of fleet equipment with Dickson Equipment Co., Inc., Holt Texas, Ltd.; nine pieces of fleet vehicles with Longhorn Harley-Davidson by Resolution No. 18-1807.

Now, Therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF DALLAS:

SECTION 1. That a master agreement for the purchase of (1) 21 pieces of fleet vehicles and equipment for the Fire-Rescue Department is authorized with Siddons Martin Emergency Group, LLC (VS90252) in the amount of \$9,949,206.18 through the Houston-Galveston Area Council of Governments cooperative agreement; and (2) 100 squad cars for the Police Department is authorized with Freedom Dodge (VS0000077189) in the amount of \$4,363,900.00 through the Texas Association of School Boards cooperative agreement, approved as to form by the City Attorney, for a term of one year, in a total amount not to exceed \$14,313,106.18.

SECTION 2. That the Purchasing Agent is authorized, upon appropriate request and documented need by a user department, to issue a purchase order for 121 fleet vehicles and equipment. If a written contract is required or requested for any or all purchases for 121 fleet vehicles and equipment under the master agreement instead of individual purchase orders, the City Manager is hereby authorized to execute a contract, approved as to form by the City Attorney.

SECTION 3. That in order to reimburse and finance the lease/purchase acquisition of the equipment described herein over a period not to exceed the estimated useful life (10 years) thereof, any Authorized Officer of the City designated in the Master Equipment Lease/Purchase Agreement (the "Master Lease") between Banc of America Public Capital Corp and the City is hereby authorized and directed to execute, acknowledge and deliver a Schedule A (as defined in the Master Lease) pertaining to such equipment including all attachments, financing statements and schedules thereto, in substantially the form attached to the Master Lease, with such changes as the signing officer shall determine to be advisable. Each Authorized Officer of the City is also authorized to execute, acknowledge and deliver any other agreement, instrument, certificate, representation and document, and to take any other action as may be advisable, convenient or necessary to enter into such Schedule A. The financing terms for such equipment, to be determined pursuant to the provisions of the Master Lease and reflected in such Schedule A, and the granting of a security interest in the financed equipment pursuant to the Master Lease, are hereby approved.

SECTION 4. That the Chief Financial Officer is hereby authorized to disburse funds in an amount not to exceed \$14,313,106.18 to Siddons Martin Emergency Group, LLC and Freedom Dodge from Master Agreement Contract No. POM-2019-00008845.

SECTION 5. That this resolution shall take effect immediately from and after its passage in accordance with the provisions of the Charter of the City of Dallas, and it is accordingly so resolved.
