Staff provided the Committee with the month ending May 2018 Public Safety Dashboards to provide a comprehensive snap shot of performance measures, critical areas of concerns, and staffing levels each month. Chair McGough opened floor to committee for questions. Council is currently in discussion regarding levels of police pay and its effect on retention and recruiting. Councilmember Kingston asked what is staff's reaction to that discussion and should we increase pay 5% across board in this budget year? Staff responded that there is need to review compensation for police and fire and they have been assessing a market study for pay increase as discussions of meet and confer have begun. Staff is also looking at other metroplex areas as a foundation as base for budget and meet and confer discussions. Council is requesting data before October 2018 budget vote.

Councilmember Gates raised concern on response times and complaints concerning prostitution questioning the real crime activity being recorded and reported. Chief Hall responded that Dallas Police Department has active enforcement regarding prostitution to include narcotics and patrol divisions. Communications do need to be provided to community, perception of crime is something being worked on, actionable items can be having more of a police presence in areas, however a challenge is still a need for personnel. Councilmember Greyson asked for more emphasis on buyers of these types of services. Medrano and Felder asked for more police presence in their districts.

Background/History

- Dallas Police has 354 permanently mounted overt surveillance cameras installed in areas with:
 - Concentrated pedestrian and vehicular traffic
 - Highest incidents of reported crime (TAAG areas)
- Overt cameras have been installed in three phases:
 - Phase I (2006 2007) ... 155 cameras in Downtown (CBD), McKinney Ave., Jefferson Corridor, Five Points, and Jubilee Park
 - Phase II (2010) ... 90 cameras in TAAG Areas for increased visibility
 - Phase III (2014) ... expanded TAAG Area coverage with 109 additional cameras
- DPD deploys 9 overt mobile surveillance camera trailers



Purpose

- Create a force multiplier in TAAG and High Traffic Areas
- Identify criminal activity and coordinate real-time field response to location, suspects and vehicles
- Provide detectives with video evidence in support of criminal investigations



Video One Team

- Created Video One Team for continuous real time monitoring of City of Dallas cameras
- Overt camera feeds can be simultaneously monitored by Video One Operators and Dallas Fusion Center (DFC) Detectives/Analysts
- Moved Video One Team (March 2018) from DPD Communications to DFC to create seamless communication


Video One Operator Duties

- Real Time monitoring of Priority One Calls for Service and Police Radio Traffic to identify criminal activity or incidents requiring emergency response in close proximity to overt City of Dallas cameras
- Investigative Support review and provide video for specific locations within specific time frames
- Respond to Open Records Requests approximately 80% of Video One Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) Requests are regarding traffic accident investigations



Multiple Independent Systems

Simultaneous monitoring of calls for service and camera system network requires use of multiple resources to identify calls within camera range



Haystax Constellation

Dallas OEM, DPD and DFR integration of resources and data streams on Haystax Constellation computer platform

Included resources:

- Map Layers (streets, beats, council districts, etc.)
- Dallas Police / Fire CAD
- Dallas 311
- DPD cameras
- TxDot Traffic Cameras



Covert Cameras

- The Narcotics Division installs, maintains and operates all Covert Cameras
- The cameras are deployed to undisclosed locations in support of criminal investigations. The cameras are also used to monitor activity at RISK and Habitual Criminal Properties at the divisional level
- Duration of these camera installations are dependent upon investigative need and operational priorities
- Each camera is monitored by requesting investigating unit detectives or patrol officers in support of investigative operations



Proposed Action

- Consult with Law Enforcement and Private Sector Partners with established operational video monitoring centers. Develop policies, procedures, systems requirements and staffing models to enhance operations of the Video One Team
- Incorporate advanced software to more efficiently review video footage

Texas Transportation Code, Chapter 551 Operation of Bicycles, Mopeds, and Play Vehicles

- Subchapter B: Regulation of Operation (bicycles)
 - A bicycle rider has the rights and duties applicable to a driver operating a vehicle
- Operation on Roadway
 - Slower moving bicycles are to keep as near as possible to the right curb unless unsafe to do so
 - Persons may ride two abreast in a single lane
 - Persons may not ride more than two abreast unless they are riding on a part of a roadway set aside for the exclusive operation of bicycles
- Safety Equipment
 - Bicycles must be equipped with a brake capable of making a braked wheel skid on dry, level, clean pavement
 - Riding a bicycle at night requires:
 - A lamp on the front of the bicycle that emits a white light visible from a distance of at least 500 feet
 - A red reflector located on the rear of the bicycle



Texas Transportation Code, Chapter 551 Operation of Bicycles, Mopeds, and Play Vehicles

- Subchapter E: Motor-Assisted Scooters
 - May operate on a street with a posted speed limit of 35 miles per hour or less
 - A municipality may prohibit use on a street, highway, or sidewalk
 - May operate on a path set aside for the exclusive operation of bicycles or on a sidewalk



Dallas City Code

- Chapter 9 Bicycles
 - Sidewalk riding is prohibited on designated streets within the Dallas Central Business District
 - Minors are required to wear bicycle helmets
- Chapter 28 Article VI
 - Sidewalk riding motor assisted scooters is prohibited on designated streets within the Dallas Central Business District, the Cedars neighborhood and Deep Ellum
 - Minors must wear a helmet



City of Dallas Dockless Vehicle Ordinance

 Sidewalk riding of bicycles and motor assisted scooters is prohibited on designated streets within the Dallas Central Business District, the Cedars neighborhood and Deep Ellum

Public Safety

- The Police Departments primary concern regarding dockless bicycles and electric scooters is the safety of pedestrians, preventing motor vehicle accidents and the safety of the operators.
- The department has identified high pedestrian areas for safety concerns:
 - CBD
 - Deep Ellum
 - Bishop Arts
 - Katy Trail
 - Uptown

Service Requests through 311

- From 10/01/2017 to 8/01/2018 there have been 3,631 bike share service requests created from 311 calls.
 - Bikes obstructing sidewalks or streets
 - Bikes abandoned on private property
 - Damaged bicycles that have been abandoned



Public Safety Enforcement Action

- The Dallas Police Department understands that many individuals utilizing a rental bike are from out of town and are unaware of Texas traffic laws and Dallas city ordinances.
 - Officers will ensure public safety of pedestrians and motorists by engaging individuals that are not following laws related to bicycles and motorized scooters or operating in an unsafe manner.
 - In most cases, officers will give warnings and educate the individuals before issuing citations.

- September 1, 2007: Cite & Release act effective (TX Legislature 80(R) HB 2391 Code of Criminal Procedure 14.06.)
- December 8, 2015: Originally briefed to PSCJ Committee
- December 1, 2017: Implemented Cite & Release Program (for Marijuana only)

Program Overview

- Cite & Release implemented December 1, 2017
- Goals of the program
 - > Reduce jail population for non-violent offenders
 - Reduce the time officers spend on jail processing procedures
 - Improve response times by getting officers back into service more quickly



Program Overview


- Dallas County only participating county in the City of Dallas Cite & Release Program
- Additional guidelines agreed upon with Dallas County
 - > Subject required to possess a valid state issued ID
 - Must obtain thumbprint
 - Minimum 17 years of age (adults only)








Divisional Breakdown






Citations vs TAAG locations






Citations vs Drug Locations/ Open Air Drug Use





Suspect Race





- Of the 65 Cases:
 - > 33 Suspects appeared in court
 - > 22 Suspects have failed to appear on the date assigned
 - > 7 Future court settings
 - > 3 Warrants dropped
- 19 Cases contained additional evidence that indicated <u>possible</u> distribution of Marijuana (small baggies, scales, etc.)
- 20 Suspects (31%) had prior arrests for possession of Marijuana
- 46 Vehicles were released at the scene (71% of cases)



Chief's Assessment

- Only 6% of Marijuana cases were eligible for the current Cite & Release program
- A disparity exists between population demographics and Cite & Release enforcement
- Cite and Release locations are consistent with TAAG enforcement, calls for service in narcotics locations and quality of life complaints of open air drug use

 - Improved traffic stop data collection
 - > Random audits of body worn camera video
 - Random in-car camera audits



Program Improvements

- Improvements that have already occurred:
 - Added requirement to capture the suspect's photo or video on body worn camera system
 - Altered notification procedures (via Dallas County Courts) from mail to e-mail and telephone

Benefits

- 100% of Cite & Release cases are eligible for the Dallas County Memo Program
 - Prevents jail time (if suspect appears for court)
 - Drug Awareness classes
 - Feedback from participant offenders indicates strong preference for Cite & Release program
- Reduced jail population for non-violent offenders
- Reduced time officers spend on jail processing procedures (Nurse line etc.)
- Vehicles not towed at owners expense
- Suspects not custodially arrested



Next Steps

- Modify requirements to increase participation:
 - The Department is reviewing other charges that can also be added to the Cite and Release program
 - Reviewed DWLI District Attorney's office changing current requirements for a DWLI case filing
- Re-convene with other counties to encourage participation
- Measure effectiveness of program alterations by comparing utilization rates
- Data improvements

SUBJECT: Summary of Northwest Patrol Division's Prostitution Initiatives

On April 20, 2018, Northwest Patrol Division began implementing prostitution initiatives. The initiatives concentrated in the areas of Harry Hines Boulevard, Walnut Hill Lane, Shady Trail, Royal Lane, Dennis Road, and Storey Lane. The initiative addresses the prostitutes, pimps, and "johns." Both uniformed and plain clothes officers are used during these initiatives.

During the initiatives Northwest Patrol Division noticed the pimps were hanging out in the parking lots of businesses on Harry Hines Boulevard and Walnut Hill Lane. The Neighborhood Patrol Officers contacted those businesses and obtained Criminal Trespass Affidavits, so the officers could take enforcement action of trespassing when the businesses are closed.

The Shady Trail businesses were also affected by the prostitution, so Northwest Patrol Division brought together the business owners to form a Shady Trail Business Crime Watch. While setting up this crime watch, Northwest Patrol Divison obtained Criminal Trespass Affidavits from these businesses, so officers can take enforcement actions while the businesses are closed.

Attached is a copy of the activity the Northwest Patrol Division has done since implementing the prostitution initiatives in April.

Psychiatric Service Providers Update

The North Texas Behavioral Authority along with Parkland Hospital have created a resource guide for Dallas Police Officers to determine APOWW destination facilities.

This guide supersedes all past information released (including past Roll Call Training Bulletins) regarding psychiatric service providers. <u>Officers shall utilize this guide when making decisions on where to transport APOWW subjects.</u> Patrol SOP 1401 will be updated to reflect these changes.

Law Enforcement Resources for APOWW Destinations

Texas Health and Safety Code, Title 7, Subtitle C, Chapter 573 states that anyone who meets the criteria for apprehension by a peace officer without a warrant (APOWW) should be brought to the nearest inpatient mental


health facility. Peace officers and receiving medical facility staff should never make any determination about payer source or indigency in responding to a psychiatric emergency.

Per this statute:

- (d) A peace officer who takes a person into custody under Subsection (a) shall immediately:
 - (1) transport the apprehended person to:
 - (A) the nearest appropriate inpatient mental health facility; or
 - (B) a mental health facility deemed suitable by the local mental health authority, if an appropriate inpatient mental health facility is not available.

In order to assist you in determining the nearest appropriate inpatient mental health facility, please see the list provided by the North Texas Behavioral Health Authority below as well as the associated map.

ALL OF THESE FACILITIES MUST TAKE APOWW PATIENTS PER THE STATUTE.

The Texas Attorney General's (AG) office has released two opinions regarding the responsibilities of law enforcement conducting emergency detention.

- GA-0753, states that law enforcement cannot be required to transport an individual to a medical facility for evaluation prior to transporting to a mental health facility.
- GA-0877, states that law enforcement is not mandated to remain with the individual at the mental health facility, only to transport to the facility.

SUBJECT

Authorize a three-year service price agreement, with two one-year renewal options, for public safety uniform alterations - CG Wholesale LLC, lowest responsible bidder of two - Not to exceed \$254,220.00 - Financing: General Fund

BACKGROUND

This action does not encumber funds; the purpose of a service price agreement is to establish firm pricing for services, for a specific term, which are ordered on an as needed basis. We anticipate the following City departments will use this agreement:

- Police Department
- Fire-Rescue Department
- Court & Detention Services
- Department of Equipment and Building Services

This service price agreement will provide for public safety uniform alterations. Through this agreement the vendor will provide alterations to ensure uniforms fit properly. Alterations may include hemming of trousers, tailoring of police uniforms, dress coats, mending minor tears, adding patches, striping, mohair, piping, or adding buttons. The Police Quartermaster facilitates alterations services to all uniformed personnel in the Police Department and other City departments who receive uniforms from Police Department Quartermaster, including the Department of Equipment and Building Services security and Marshals. Alterations services for the Fire-Rescue Department are being included in this agreement to allow them to have their uniforms mended and patches, mohair, piping, and buttons added.

An estimated 210 alterations are performed weekly and the City is charged a flat monthly fee regardless of actual number of services performed. The monthly charge includes necessary products, accessories, and equipment to support alterations functions and provide services. Alterations are provided on site at the Quartermaster facility and are typically performed while the customer is waiting. This service price agreement will require the vendor to provide a minimum of one employee during all business hours of 6 am - 6 pm, two employees to cover peak hours of 9:30 am - 2:30 pm, and three employees during times of heightened demand.

The City employees included in the agreement include:

- 3,100 police officers
- 1,936 firefighters
- 54 Marshals
- 71 security staff

As part of the solicitation process and in an effort to increase competition, the Office of Procurement Services used its procurement system to send out 4,646 email bid notifications to vendors registered under respective commodities. To further increase competition, the Office of Procurement Services uses historical solicitation information, the internet, and vendor contact information obtained from user departments to contact additional vendors by phone. Additionally, in an effort to secure more bids, the Office of Business Diversity sent notifications to 25 chambers of commerce and advocacy groups to ensure maximum vendor outreach.

On November 10, 2015, City Council authorized the wage floor rate of \$10.94, by Resolution No. 15-2141; the selected vendor meets this requirement.

PRIOR ACTION/REVIEW (COUNCIL, BOARDS, COMMISSIONS)

On June 26, 2013, City Council authorized a three-year master agreement for uniforms, jackets, rainwear and accessories with Regali, Inc., ERMC IV, LP, Premier Uniform, Inc. and C&G Police Supply dba C&G Wholesale; and a three-year service contract for alterations of police uniforms, jackets and rainwear with C&G Police Supply dba C&G Wholesale by Resolution No. 13-1065.
