 - Aggressive panhandling
 - Attacks on LGBT community
 - Loud music
 - Aggressive animals



Mission:

To promote Public Safety through testing of all life safety systems before it is occupied



New Construction Team I & II

- 2 Lieutenants
- 12 Senior Inspectors
- 1 Pre-Development Liaison
- 1 Senior Office Assistant





What is the role of the New Construction Inspector?

- Inspectors are responsible for testing of all life safety systems from start to finish for all new buildings and renovations of existing buildings within the Dallas city limits
- There are thirty-four (34) different tests
- Many tests are performed before and after normal business hours, (0800-1700) to prevent disruption of retail and corporate activities



This includes:

• High Rise Commercial and Residential







• Hospital / Healthcare









Green Oaks Hospital



• Places of Assembly

Restaurants, bars, clubs, churches, and malls







• Low Rise Commercial and Residential



• Special Construction Projects

Klyde Warren Park and Dallas Area Rapid Transit (DART) rail





• Single Family Homes

Over 7500 sq. feet require residential sprinkler systems




• Flammable and Combustible Hazardous Material (HazMat) Locations Underground, aboveground tank installation and removal





Types of Acceptance Testing









• Fire Alarm Acceptance Testing

Smoke alarms, heat detectors, pull stations, tamper switches, water flow, duct detectors, and audio/visual devices















• Sprinkler System Acceptance Testing

Hydrostatic pressure, wet systems, dry systems, wet/dry standpipe systems, pre-action systems, deluge systems, foam systems and underground fire lines













• Generator Tests

Backup power for Life Safety Systems to include fire alarm, fire pump, emergency lighting and elevators



• Elevator Recall

Automatically recalls elevators to ground level during fire alarm and

gives firefighters full use of elevators









• Access Control

Electronic egress devices or "magnetic locks" are frequently chosen for added security to workplace





• Commercial Cooking Extinguishing Systems

Required over any appliances that produce grease laden vapors







• Paint Booth

Extinguishing systems are required in all spray paint booths





• Alternative Extinguishing Systems

Factory Mutual (FM) 200 and Inert Gas Room Systems











• Fire Lane Acceptance Plans

Knox locks, Knox boxes, Key Switches (KS-2) and gate radio receivers



• Fire Pump Testing

Fire pumps are compulsory when the city water pressure does not meet

the requirements of the sprinkler system





• High Rise Roof Flow

Test to determine if the adequate water pressure is reached at the roof level

FIREFIGHTER PHYSICAL REHAB AT EMERGENCIES "BOX 4"

Public Safety Committee August 8, 2016







To brief the Public Safety Committee regarding rehab of firefighters at fire scenes and other emergencies via Box 4 Fire Buff Association, Inc.



- The name Box 4 comes from the original fire box located at Ervay and Kelly Streets, the location of the original Fire Station 4.
- This was the lowest box number ever issued by the Dallas Fire-Rescue.
- It also was the box located across the street from Honorary Fire Chief Julius Schepps' home and business. He is the one who actually named Box 4.

- Box 4 responded to its first fire and furnished refreshments on a three-alarm fire in March 1963 at 3900 Cole Avenue.
- The first time Box 4 responded with the Salvation Army Canteen was on December
 9, 1963, a three-alarm fire at 1815 Browder.

- Box 4 is a 501 (c) (3) non profit organization.
- Made up entirely of fully vetted volunteers.
- Existing membership group votes on new members who must complete a 1-year probationary period before becoming eligible for membership.

- The members are individuals in the community who have a passion for service.
- Some of the members include: retired firefighters, retired police officers, business executives, a doctor and an area police chief.
- Several members are family relatives and/or spouses of active and retired firefighters.
- Each member is subject to being on call 24/7/365.

 Box 4 vehicle is stored at Fire Station 28 located at 8701 Greenville Avenue.



- Responds to all 2nd Alarm Fires or greater.
- Responds to varied incidents, (i.e., DPD barricade and hostage incidents, etc.), large demonstrations and dignitary visits to name a few.





 Box 4 has also supported the Annual Easter Egg Hunt, Citizens' Fire Academy, Fire Ops 101 and funerals of fallen firefighters and police.







- Box 4 also responds to surrounding cities when called upon to provide physical rehab as needed.
- In fifty three (53) years of existence, Box 4 has never missed responding to a call. Its members are very serious about their call to duty.

- Once on scene of an incident, Box 4 will set up 10 x 20 awnings and chairs as needed to provide shelter/shade while firefighters are resting up in the rehab area.
- Box 4 stages adjacent to EMS personnel who provide medical monitoring.






- Hot summer months, Box 4 deploys misting fans to cool firefighters and which reduces the potential for heat exhaustion and heat related injuries.
- Winter months, Box 4 uses propane heaters to warm firefighters and protect them from cold temperature physical injuries.



- Box 4 is solely financially supported by monetary donations.
- Annually, Dallas Fire-Rescue's personnel are solicited for needed monetary contributions. Recognizing Box 4's value, DFR members have helped to support its mission over the years.
- Donations are used to purchase water, sports drinks, snacks, coffee and hot chocolate.
- Box 4 also provides meals to firefighters who are out on extended incidents during meal times.

The Dallas Fire-Rescue Department utilizes Visual Fire Software for its National Fire Incident Reporting System (NFIRS). Fire Department personnel across the nation report on activity and actions taken during emergency response by entering data into proprietary database software designed to meet the requirements the NFIRS. Reporting of all data is analyzed at the local, state and federal level. Additionally, fire departments which have been awarded federally supported grants such as Dallas Fire-Rescue are required to participate in National Fire Incident Reporting.

This reporting is critical as data analysis allows decision makers at the local, state and federal level to better understand trends covering types of fires that are occurring, their cause and origin as well as for other analysis. Through NFIRS analysis, product recalls have also occurred in instances involving defective electrical equipment design leading to fires or manufactured products which have led to human injury or death. The value of NFIRS reporting and analysis is also important because it allows for decision making that leads to enhanced human resource deployment and equipment purchase.

The Dallas Fire-Rescue Department is seeking the support and recommendation from the Public Safety Committee to authorize this service contract for maintenance and support of the Visual Fire Software. This item will be placed on the August 10, 2016, City Council Agenda

In July of 2016, the Department of Homeland Security announced grant funding for the 2016 award year for the Emergency Management Performance Grant (EMPG). As a designated recipient of this funding, the City of Dallas has applied for and has been awarded \$169,381.01 to build our capacity to prevent, protect against, respond to, and recover from a terrorist attack or natural disaster.

This funding will provide reimbursement for up to 50% of allowable costs for the Office of Emergency Management's (OEM) FY16 budget, up to \$169,381.01

EMPG is a yearly grant from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) awarded to local emergency management departments to help develop and maintain plans to respond to all-hazards incidents. Funds are used to reimburse salaries for OEM staff and other costs associated with running the Emergency Management Program.

SUBJECT: Upcoming Agenda Item # 33: Authorize (1) acceptance of Public Assistance Funds from the Federal Emergency Management Agency of the U.S. Department of Homeland Security passed through the Texas Division of Emergency Management in an amount not to exceed \$10,000,000 to reimburse emergency response and permanent disaster recovery work efforts by the City as a result of the May 2015 Presidentially Declared Disaster; (2) the receipt and deposit of funds from the Federal Emergency Management Agency in an amount not to exceed \$10,000,000; (3) the establishment of appropriations in an amount not to exceed \$10,000,000 in the FEMA Public Assistance Fund; and (4) execution of the grant agreement and any other documents required - Not to exceed \$10,000,000

This memo provides some clarification on the dollar amount associated with this item. The FEMA Public Assistance Program (PA) provides grants to state, local, and federally recognized tribal governments and certain private non-profit entities to assist them with the response to and recovery from disasters. Specifically, the program provides assistance for debris removal, emergency protective measures, and permanent restoration of infrastructure.

Dallas County had substantial damage from the flooding and was designation as a presidential disaster area based on the extensive damage in the County. The City of Dallas was then eligible to apply for these funds. The initial estimates of damages were closer to \$10 Million. However, as we went through the site visits and analysis process the actual reimbursement that we may be eligible for is going to be a lower amount. We have some sites that have been underwater for quite some time and actual site visits to those areas start next week. We continue to work with FEMA for maximum reimbursement for needed repairs to the damaged area and our agenda item reflects the acceptance of up to \$10 Million in reimbursements.

The Office of Emergency Management is seeking the support and recommendation from the Public Safety Committee to authorize acceptance of the reimbursement funds. This item will be placed on the August 10, 2016, City Council Agenda.

SUBJECT: Upcoming *Draft* Addendum Item E: Authorize execution of the North Central Texas Public Works Emergency Response Team Mutual Aid Agreement, subject to the supplemental terms and responsibilities of the agreement through the North Central Texas Council of Governments

Based on lessons learned from several past natural disasters and large scale incidents, Public Works support has been identified as a necessary resource which needed a more regional approach to coordination. As a result, the North Central Texas Public Works Emergency Response Team (PWERT) was created to provide public works assistance when an emergency or disaster overwhelms local resources especially within the North Central Texas region. While it was formed by and for local governments and operates on a voluntary quid pro quo basis, the team is supported and facilitated by the NCTCOG Emergency Preparedness Department. PWERT first deployed in response to resource requests during the April 3, 2012 tornado outbreak and continues to grow to meet regional needs.

Membership and Benefits

The Public Works Emergency Response Team currently has 39 member cities. While cities sign the mutual aid agreement to join the team, it is always up to that city in any circumstance to either approve or deny a request for assistance. Signing the mutual aid agreement allows for this discretion by management but it also offers the protection of payment terms and allowable Operational Period, which are required to protect the city if reimbursement is sought for a disaster in the future. Additionally, once a member city joins the team, if/when public works resources are necessary to support a local response, it only takes 1 call to get needed resources identified, located and sent. This call goes directly to the 24-hour response line and a team leader or member answers the call and coordinates the request at the direction of the requesting agency.

The Office of Emergency Management is seeking the support and recommendation from the Public Safety Committee to authorize and execute the Mutual Aid Agreement for the North Texas Public Works Emergency Response Team (PWERT). This item will be placed on the August 10, 2016, City Council Agenda.
