



- 2. The hose valves are required to remain and shall be compatible with local fire department fittings.

903.2.1.6 Assembly



Public Safety Committee January 25, 2016





Mission: To provide citizens with an overview of Dallas Fire-Rescue services, increase fire and life safety awareness, and promote the customer service aspect of our department



Objectives:

- Impart information on core job functions
- Engage students during demonstrations
- Share volunteer opportunities available within the City of Dallas
- Provide CPR certification training
- Provide fire prevention and disaster preparedness education





Benefits to the City:

Public safety is improved through enhancement of community outreach by increasing involvement, communication and education.



Safety:

State certified instructors are utilized to train citizens. Safety is emphasized during classroom instruction and hands-on training.

Citizens participating will be taught valuable life safety skills offered as part of CPR certification training during the academy.





Customer Service:

The citizens' fire academy focuses on customer service. Students are educated on what we do and why we do it.

The 8-week academy is conducted at the Dallas Fire-Rescue Training Center on Thursday evenings (6:00 p.m.)





Training topics:

- Hazardous materials operations
- Emergency dispatch operations
- Fire tactics and strategies
- Self Contained Breathing Apparatus
- Equipment familiarization
- Fire prevention and education
- Hiring process
- Training process



Tentative Schedule:

- Week 1: Welcome and overview of Dallas Fire-Rescue to include the organizational structure of the Department as well as the hiring process. Students will take a field trip to the Dallas Firefighters Museum to learn about the history of the Department.
- Week 2: Fire behavior, apparatus familiarization, protective clothing and the self contained breathing apparatus (SCBA) will be discussed. Students will also learn about Emergency Communications and how the dispatch process works. This week also includes a field trip to Fire Dispatch.
- Week 3: Water supplies, fire streams, hydraulic principles, pump operations and fire hose will be introduced as well as the different applications for their use. The Inspection and Life Safety Education Division as well as Arson Investigation will discuss their roles within the Department.

Tentative Schedule (cont.):

- Week 4: This weeks topics will be building construction types, ventilation and forcible entry methods. Students will also be given an overview of the Critical Incident Stress Management (CISM) program as well as Chaplain Services.
- Week 5: Lessons this week include the Hazardous Materials Response team, an introduction to the Incident Command System (ICS) and a presentation from the Emergency Medical Services Bureau. Students will be given an opportunity to view a Rescue (ambulance) unit for hands on inspection.
- Week 6: Students will be trained and certified in Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation by an American Heart Association instructor.

Tentative Schedule (cont.):

- Week 7: Firefighting equipment and tactics will be taught. Students will be given an opportunity to practice with their protective gear, preparing them for the live burns scheduled for the last day of the Academy.
- Week 8: Students will be taught vehicle extrication techniques and will have an opportunity for hands on training. This week also includes search techniques and procedures followed by actual searches in the training apartment and burn building.

- CFA is being promoted through media along with <u>www.dallasfirerescue.com</u> and <u>www.dallasnewsroom.com</u> websites. Home Owner Associations are also mailed promotional letters.
- Application enrollment period will be January 19 February 29. Interested participants may obtain applications on-line or by calling the Fire Training Center (214-670-0231).
- Selection criteria: 18 years of age or older, background check conducted, must work or live in the City of Dallas, first come/first served. Class size will be limited to 20 students.
- Dallas Fire-Rescue (DFR) has embraced the world of social media through Twitter. Since inception twitter has been used to alert citizens related to Ebola precautions, Inclement weather events, Earthquake preparedness and other types of information to make Dallas a safer city.  - Supervisory positions
 - Paramedics

Rainier Swiss Avenue Investors, LLC, a Texas limited liability company, et al.</u>, Cause No. CC-15-04815-D, pending in Dallas County Court at Law No. 4, to acquire approximately 29,401 square feet of land, located on Swiss Avenue at its intersection with Haskell Avenue for the Mill Creek/Peaks Branch/State Thomas Drainage Relief Tunnel Project; and (2) settlement of the condemnation proceeding for an amount not to exceed the award - Not to exceed \$135,804 (\$132,304 being the amount of the award, plus closing costs and title expenses not to exceed \$3,500); an increase of \$32,341 from the amount Council originally authorized for this acquisition - Financing: 2006 Bond Funds

BACKGROUND

This item is being placed on the addendum requesting Council approval prior to the deadline to file objections to the Award of the Special Commissioners.

On March 25, 2015, the City Council authorized the acquisition of this property, by Resolution No. 15-0561. The property owner was offered \$99,963, which was based on a written appraisal from an independent certified appraiser. The appraisal was updated November 10, 2015, and the offer amount was revised to \$105,844. The property owner did not accept the offer and the City filed an eminent domain proceeding to acquire the property. After a hearing before the Special Commissioners on January 7, 2016, the property owner was awarded \$132,304. This item authorizes deposit of the amount awarded by the Special Commissioners for the property, which is \$32,341 more than the City Council originally authorized for this acquisition, plus closing costs and title expenses not to exceed \$3,500.



BACKGROUND (Continued)

The City has no control over the Special Commissioners appointed by the judge or any award that is subsequently rendered by the Special Commissioners. The City, in order to acquire possession of the property and proceed with its improvements, must deposit the amount awarded by the Special Commissioners in the registry of the Court.
