**SUBJECT November 10, 2021 City Council FINAL Agenda - Additions/Revisions/Deletions**

# SUBJECT M/WBE Participation for November 10, 2021 Council Agenda

The policy of the City of Dallas is to involve certified Minority and Women-owned Business Enterprises (M/WBEs) to the greatest extent feasible on the City's architecture & engineering, construction, goods, and professional services contracts. The City's Business Inclusion and Development Policy (BID Policy) is overseen by the Business Inclusion and Development (BID) division of the Small Business Center, which is providing this summary of M/WBE participation for the November 10, 2021 City Council Agenda.

As a reminder, the M/WBE goals that became effective on October 1, 2020 are:

## The following items do not meet the M/WBE goal but comply with the BID Policy:

**Agenda Item No. 16** Authorizes a construction contract in an amount of \$12.4M for the 2022 Two-Year Term Agreement Slurry Seal and Polymer Modified Micro-Surfacing Contract. This item is not meeting goal; however Elite Emerald Construction, a non-minority subcontractor on this contract performing concrete work and asphalt repairs, is in the process of becoming M/WBE certified. This contract will meet goal if Elite Emerald Construction is granted M/WBE certification.

**Agenda Item No. 30** Authorizes a three-year master agreement in an amount of \$495K for the purchase of plumbing pipe, fittings, fixtures, trim, and parts for city departments. Core and Main, LP is the manufacturer of plumbing pipe, fittings, fixtures, trim, and parts and will be drop shipping products from a factory located in Dallas.

Upcoming Office of Procurement Services and Office of Community Care Agenda Item – November 10, 2021

The following Office of Community Care (OCC) and Office of Procurement Services items will be considered by City Council on the November 10, 2021 Agenda:

**File ID: 21-1917:** Authorize a twelve-month service contract for childcare services to enable parents to participate in workforce training programs within the City of Dallas – United Way of Metropolitan Dallas, most advantageous proposer of two – Not to exceed \$375,000 – Financing: 2020 CARES Act Relief CDBG #3.

## **Background**

In 2020, the City of Dallas received a third allocation of CDBG funding from the CARES act to be used for services responding to the COVID 19 pandemic. A total of \$1.95M was allocated for a variety of client services programming, titled the "CDBG Drivers of Poverty", within which \$375,000 was allocated specifically to support childcare services and the remainder to Client Assistance Programming. The City of Dallas Office of Community Care (OCC) sought subrecipients through a request for proposal process, to provide childcare services to families to enable parents to participate in job skills training and educational opportunities to pursue employment and/or to seek and maintain employment. In keeping with the CARES Act requirements for COVID-9 response, services will be provided for individuals who have experienced job loss, reduced hours, unemployment or underemployment as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, public health protocols implemented because of the pandemic, and economic contractions resulting from the pandemic. Services to be provided include full payment of childcare assistance for a period up to six months per family.

A total of 45 children will be served through the United Way of Metropolitan Dallas's Southern Dallas Thrives Childcare Assistance Program, which will enable their mothers to participate in their workforce training program. Assistance is embedded within the Women's Workforce component of the Southern Dallas Thrives, which provides training in high-growth, in-demand sectors, such as the Manufacturing, Construction, and Hospitality, and career navigation services to equip unemployed/underemployed women in southern Dallas with the skills and supports they need to secure living wage jobs for their families. All women participating in the Childcare Assistance Program will be City of Dallas residents who have been financially impacted by COVID-19 and who are classified as low-income. This collaboration leverages the capacity and expertise of high-performing, community-based workforce development providers and the place-based initiative team of Southern Dallas Thrives to ensure that funding is being directed to those women in most need of the supplemental resource to continue their training.

## **Procurement**

The City of Dallas Office of Community Care (OCC) sought proposals via a Request for Proposals (RFP) from non-profit agencies to serve as subrecipients during the period March 2020 through July 31, 2022 for the purpose of administering the CV-COVID-19 (CARES Act Relief CDBG #3 funding) Drivers of Poverty-Childcare Program within Dallas city limits to residents who have been economically impacted because of the COVID-19 pandemic, and who are at or below 80% Area Median Income (AMI) under a subrecipient agreement. The solicitation required that programs target service delivery in locations that are accessible to or within communities in which poverty is concentrated and/or communities in which there are concentrations of populations as identified in the Mayor's Task Force on Poverty report.

The following organizations submitted a proposal, their ranking and score is listed in the table below:

## **SUBJECT FY 2022 Bike Lane Funding Plan**

Given the importance placed on multi-modal transportation, the Fiscal Year (FY) 2022 adopted budget includes \$2 million for the bike lane program. Upon review of available funds and community priorities of providing a connected network that connects to trails and key destinations, this memo will summarize the current plan for the programmed bike lane funds.

### **Summary of Proposed Bicycle Infrastructure Projects for FY 2022:**

In general, the bike lane funds programmed for FY 2022 will go towards updating the 2011 Bike Plan and projects that fill critical gaps, extend the reach of the bike network, help to provide connections to major destinations (including trails), and implement previously designed projects. Key projects that are proposed to receive funding for engineering, implementation and/or supplement third party funding with the bike lane general funds include:

## • Citywide:

Funding to update the 2011 Dallas Bike Plan, which will supplement the \$150,000 previously awarded by the Regional Transportation Council. The plan refresh is intended to bring greater consensus on where bike facilities are needed and desired by the community, re-evaluate the feasibility of various routes, and develop a realistic implementation strategy that focuses on filling critical gaps and making meaningful connections.

#### South West Dallas Area:

- Zang Boulevard, Eldorado Avenue, Elisbeth Street implementation of previously designed bicycle facilities that would connect the bike lanes on Zang Boulevard with the bike lanes on Bishop Avenue.
- Vernon Avenue (DART rail line to Illinois Avenue) implementation of previously designed protected bike lanes on Vernon Avenue that would connect residents to transit and commercial areas.

#### South Central Dallas Area:

- District 4 Bicycle Facilities design and implementation of bicycle facilities. There
  are currently no existing or funded on-street bicycle facilities in District 4. The
  routes under consideration are intended to begin the on-street network in District
  4 and include:
  - Corinth Road from 8th Street (DART's 8th and Corinth Station) and Morrell Avenue.
- Spring Avenue, Myrtle Street, Exline Street, and Pine Street design and implementation of bike facilities that would connect the existing bike lanes on Lagow Street and the existing bicycle facility on Bexar Street.

#### **FY 2022 BIKE LANE FUNDING PLAN**

#### South East Dallas Area:

 Lawnview Avenue (Hunnicut Road to Military Parkway) – evaluation of the road infrastructure to accommodate bike lanes to connect the existing bicycle facility on Hunnicut Road and the existing bike lanes on Lawnview Avenue south of Military Parkway.

#### Central Dallas Area:

- Akard Street (AT&T Plaza to Belleview) implementation of previously designed bike lanes that will connect South Dallas with Downtown Dallas.
- Jackson Street (AT&T Plaza to Pearl) design and implementation of a cycle track that would complete a connection between Deep Ellum and AT&T Plaza.
- Union Bikeway (Houston Avenue to Woodall Rodgers frontage road via Nowitzki Way, Field Street, Ashland Street, and Harwood Street) – buffered cycle track connecting Katy Trail in Uptown to Klyde Warren Park near the Arts District

#### West Dallas Area:

Sylvan Avenue (Singleton Avenue to Morris Street) – design and implementation
of protected bike lanes that would fill a gap between the existing bike lanes south
of Singleton and the existing bike lanes on the Sylvan Avenue bridge.

#### • East Dallas Area:

 Fisher Road (White Rock Creek Trail at West Lawther Drive to Abrams Road) – implementation of previously designed bicycle facility.

### North Central Dallas Area:

 Meandering Way (Belt Line Road to Peyton Drive) and Brookgreen Drive (Esperanza Road to Meandering Way) – design and implementation of bicycle facilities to connect the White Rock Creek Trail, Cottonwood Creek Trail, and Preston Ridge Trail.

This summary only includes the bike projects to be implemented with the bike lane general funds. Other bike projects will be implemented through bond-funded projects, with other external funding, or as part of traffic calming projects.

## **SUBJECT Fair Park Multimedia Center Progress Report**

Honorable Mayor and Members of the City Council,

Since our last briefing for your action in April, the Fair Park Multimedia Center (FPMC) has had its soft opening, bolstering resilience through increased communications capacity. The purpose of this memo is to provide you an update on accomplishment of several strategic goals.

### **Recent Activity**

Content created at the FPMC won the City of Dallas' first-ever Government Programming Awards (GPAs) from NATOA (the National Association of Telecommunications Officers and Advisors). Dallas earned an "Award of Distinction" for COVID-19 response and an "Award of Honor" for Overall Excellence among U.S. cities with an operating budget over \$1 Million. Dallas work produced at the FPMC was also honored at the 2021 conference of TATOA, the Texas state chapter of NATOA, including an Honorable Mention for the FY2020 Budget Video and 3<sup>rd</sup> place awards for the Spanish language video on "Programa Para Reducir La Brecha Digita" (Closing the Digital Divide); the CARES Act Recap; and the 2021 Virtual MLK Awards Gala.

Dallas' NATOA GPA-winning videos were created in part by apprentices in COM's Dallas Apprenticeship Program (DAP) launched during FY21 with partners including Dallas College PTECH, Dallas ISD, and Paul Quinn College. The DAP supported the City Manager's 2021 goal of using the FPMC to provide apprenticeships for local students and bolster resilience through additional communications capacity. COM's DAP also supports the City's 2020 BHAG (Big Hairy Audacious Goal) to create a national model for youth development, outreach and mentorship programs.

Since COM's last briefing memo shared for your action on April 28, new content and programs completed at the FPMC include:

- 1) One Dallas Update, new weekly news bulletin marketing City of Dallas programs and services to residents
- 2) Conversations, a new series for communication, outreach and marketing of City of Dallas' programs and services starting with an in-depth look at the Kay Bailey Hutchison Convention Center Master Planning process with OSE Director Rosa Fleming
- 3) Launching the Office of Homeless Solutions' communications and outreach strategy focusing on five pillars:
  - 1. Dallas Real Time Rapid Rehousing (DRTRR);
  - 2. Panhandling Diversion;
  - 3. Street Charity education
  - 4. Encampment Resolution; and
  - 5. emergency Inclement Weather Sheltering
- 4) Partner content highlighting initiatives of City department-funded programs and services for Dallas residents including OAC grant recipient Dallas Winds
- 5) Planning for OCC's second virtual Martin Luther King, Jr. Day week of festivities in 2022

### **Metrics**

The FPMC was also key to COM exceeding several of its FY21 performance metrics. During the 2021 Fiscal Year ending Sept. 30, content produced at the FPMC was viewed over 3,234 times for a total of 83.3 hours. Coupled with the launch of COM's virtual Language Access Center in FY2021, the percentage of original multicultural and multilingual content on public, educational, and government channels increased 57%, establishing the City as a trusted primary source for information and ensuring residents with limited English proficiency have access to programs and services as One Dallas.

# **Construction Update**

While the FPMC is in-service, finishing touches have been delayed by COVID-19 while we remain in Phase 3 of the City's return to work plans. Global supply chain issues postponing shipments were compounded by an outbreak of the coronavirus among crew members performing construction and installation work, which forced a total work stoppage during the State Fair of Texas (when access was already challenging due to event traffic). Following guidance from the CDC and our contract health authority, Dallas County, we are cautiously optimistic grand opening festivities may be held in Q2 of FY22.

Bond Sale Results - General Obligation Refunding and Improvement Bonds, Series 2021; General Obligation Bonds, Taxable Series 2021; Combination Tax and Revenue Certificates of Obligation, Series 2021; and Equipment Acquisition Contractual Obligation Notes, Series 2021

On November 4, 2021, the City received bids in a competitive sale for the General Obligation Refunding and Improvement Bonds, Series 2021 (the "2021 Bonds"), General Obligation Bonds, Taxable Series 2021 (the "Taxable 2021 Bonds"), Combination Tax and Revenue Certificates of Obligation, Series 2021 (the "2021 Certificates of Obligations"), and Equipment Acquisition Contractual Obligation Notes, Series 2021 (the "2021 Contractual Obligations"), collectively the "Obligations".

As a result, the City issued \$237.1 million in 2021 Bonds at a true interest cost (TIC) of 1.75 percent, in a bid submitted by Morgan Stanley & Co., LLC. In total, the City received 6 bids for the 2021 Bonds, with TIC ranging from 1.75 percent to 1.85 percent. The City also issued \$3.1 million in Taxable 2021 Bonds at a TIC of 1.60 percent, in a bid submitted by BOK Financial Securities, Inc. In total, the City received 10 bids for the Taxable 2021 Bonds, with TIC ranging from 1.60 percent to 2.11 percent.

Additionally, the City issued \$45.9 million in 2021 Certificates of Obligations at a TIC of 1.01 percent, in a bid submitted by Wells Fargo Bank, N.A. In total, the City received 8 bids for the 2021 Contractual Obligations, with TIC ranging from 1.01 percent to 1.16 percent.

Finally, the City issued \$26.9 million in 2021 Contractual Obligations at a TIC of 0.62 percent, in a bid submitted by Wells Fargo Bank, N.A. In total, the City received 8 bids for the 2021 Contractual Obligations, with TIC ranging from 0.62 percent to 0.80 percent.

Following anticipation ahead of the Federal Open Market Committee (FOMC) this week, the market reaction was calm as the Federal Reserve announced no changes to its benchmark interest rate and a tapering of bond purchases. With rates unchanged, the response to the City's bonds was exceptionally positive. Investor demand for the City's bonds was very strong, despite restrictions on underwriting firms relating to recently passed legislation, Senate Bill 13 and Senate Bill 19. The City's financial advisors, PFM, note that the successful pricing is a testament to, "the ongoing efforts of the City staff to maintain strong finances including a focus on multi-year planning on strengthening fund balance."

## **New Updates**

OHS Street Outreach Update – Successful Encampment Resolution through the DRTRR! OHS Street Outreach team kicked off the Dallas R.E.A.L. Time Rapid Rehousing (DRTRR) Initiative on October 1<sup>st</sup>, using 311 data and sites identified in the field to develop and implement the outreach and resolution via housing approach briefed to City Council on August 4<sup>th</sup>.

On Friday, Oct. 29, 2021, the Dallas R.E.A.L. Time Rapid Rehousing (DRTRR) Initiative closed its first encampment through housing. The team of homeless service providers, co-led by OHS and MDHA, has been working with unsheltered residents in District 8, near Hwy 175 and S. Beltline Rd. over the past month to gain their trust, build relationships, identify barriers to housing like ID reclamation and medical needs, which allowed the Initiative to move everyone into housing on Friday.



The final day of this process saw unsheltered residents volunteering to work alongside OHS staff, DPD, and Debris removal staff to clean up their encampments, identifying items to be stored via the DRTRR, and moving into units prepared specifically for them. The new residents were shown their respective units, with each person given a round of applause to commemorate the experience. It was truly a remarkable day for the residents and DRTRR Encampment team as well, who were visibly excited to witness the culmination of this work.

Thanks to the support of the public and private entities backing the Initiative, this process has now housed several individuals experiencing chronic homelessness and will continue to do so, ultimately housing over 2,700 individuals; setting them on the path to self-

sufficiency. This is the first of many success stories to come and we are excited about what the future holds for the DRTRR.

OHS continues to urge people who see an encampment to report via 311 or 311's OurDallas smartphone app to ensure strategic alignment with comprehensive OHS outreach. Please also stay tuned for the DRTRR Dashboard through MDHA, which is slated to be presented to the Citizens Homelessness Commission, Housing and Homeless Solutions Committee, and the Dallas Area Partnership Board later this month.

Throughout this process, the OHS Street Outreach Team will continue to engage with unsheltered residents through normal street outreach, connecting people with the needed resources, such as: getting IDs, working with Community Courts on expunging eligible tickets and offenses from their records, identifying medical needs, and getting them access to the Coordinated Access System (CAS).

Please see the attached schedule for homeless encampment cleaning the weeks of November 1–5 and November 8–12. Note that these will be for debris removal and outreach only.

recognized because of their constant dedication and determination to get the job done each day, ensuring the communities they serve are clean and clutter free. Sanitation Brush Crews work in all weather conditions, from dawn to dusk, until the job is done. In FY 2020-21, Sanitation Brush Crews collected over 181,000 tons of brush and bulky debris throughout Dallas. On an average day, Crew Leader Joe and Brush Crew 745 collect approximately 22 tons, or over 6,500 tons a year. They are hard workers with a can-do attitude and are valued members of our Sanitation and City of Dallas team!

# Vaccine Incentive Update

The vaccine incentive offered to City of Dallas employees who self-reported their vaccine status was a tremendous success! As of the final participation deadline on November 1, 2021, approximately 8,069 employees had uploaded their COVID19 Vaccine documentation into the Apricity@Work app. HR and the U.S. Wellness team will be reviewing the documentation through December 1st and employees may expect to see their leave time available in Workday by December 15, 2021. The U.S. Wellness is the sub-contractor under CareATC that created the app (algorithms) for the Apricity@Work app we are using. They will review any "unreadable" or suspicious documents that may have been uploaded or manually added. As a reminder, vaccine incentive leave will be maintained in a separate bank and may not be paid out or transferred for any reason. A special thanks to everyone that supported this initiative! Staff will provide an update on the vaccination incentive program and the final phase of the Return to Work Plan at the December Ad Hoc Committee on COVID-19 Recovery and Assistance. 

### Redistricting

The Redistricting Commission met on Thursday, October 28, 2021 in the City Council Chambers. They were given a preview of the redistricting website, DallasRedistricting.com, and approved a regular meeting schedule that consists of the 2<sup>nd</sup> Monday of the month at 6:30 p.m. and the 4<sup>th</sup> Monday of the month at 3:30 p.m., until the end of the year. 2022 meeting dates are to be determined. They were unable to approve a public town hall meeting schedule and decided to hold it under advisement until their next meeting on Monday, November 8, 2021, at 6:30 p.m., as part of their next regular Commission meeting. Once the public town hall meeting schedule is finalized, we will notify the City Council of those dates. The town hall meetings will now likely take place in December and January.

Meanwhile, the redistricting website is now live. Residents are encouraged to visit <a href="DallasRedistricting.com">DallasRedistricting.com</a> for the latest information on the redistricting process, getting involved, communicating directly with Redistricting Commissioners and submitting their very own maps. The Office of Government Affairs continues to work with the Office of Equity and Inclusion and the third-party consultant to ensure the website is ADA compliant.

The Office of Government Affairs also continues to work with Communications, Outreach and Marketing to develop a communications and marketing strategy to promote the process and engage residents to get involved. This marketing strategy will be presented to the Redistricting Commission on Monday, November 8, 2021. Once approved, we will forward the strategy to the City Council and use the tools included in the strategy to notify as many residents as possible about the upcoming Redistricting Commission meetings and townhalls. 
