SUBJECT **Permit Dashboard – Single Family New Construction Launches January 27, 2023**

At the request of the City Manager and in partnership with Development Services, Data Analytics and Business Intelligence created a public facing [Permit Dashboard for New Single-Family Construction](#) projects. The dashboard objectives are 1) to provide information to the City of Dallas residents about the permit process, 2) to provide transparency into some key permit related metrics and their trends over time and 3) to make an online tool for viewing permit data for the first time that will be refreshed once a month.

The dashboard shows the following metrics:

- permits created and issued
- median days to issue a permit
- permits in queue
- permit cycles
- other permit-related information

Definitions and additional information about the metrics can be seen by hovering over graphs and numbers.

The dashboard demonstrates that 1) in the recent months, the number of issued permits are almost double that of incoming permit applications, 2) in December 2022, of all initial departmental reviews completed, 82% met the initial departmental review performance goal of 15 days or less and 3) all the permits in queue, more than two thirds of them are currently with the applicant. Overall, the time to issue permits that required no applicant revisions was significantly less compared to permits that required one or more revisions.

The dashboard is expected to be updated the first week of every month. Currently, the dashboard displays data until December 2022 and will be updated next on the first week of February with January 2023 data.

SUBJECT **Data Sharing Request from Dallas County Health and Human Services (DCHHS)**

Honorable Mayor and Members of the City Council, I am writing to inform you that we have recently received a request from Dallas County Health and Human Services (DCHHS) for data held with Dallas Fire-Rescue (DFR).

DFR received a request from Dr. Philip Huang, MD, MPH, Director of DCHHS, who serves as the Public Health Authority for Dallas County and for the City of Dallas, requesting access to DFR's response data, including opioid data, for the purpose of Public Health surveillance and response efforts. We are working with our HIPAA Privacy Officer, HIPAA Security Officer, and the City Attorney's Office to comply with the request and ensure data is transferred in a secure and legally compliant manner.

The request from DCHHS is for the purposes of Public Health surveillance and response as a part of their efforts to combat the Opioid overdose epidemic.

SUBJECT **Atmos Energy Corporation - DARR Filing**

On January 13, Atmos Energy Corporation, Mid-Tex Division (Atmos) filed a request with the City to increase rates. This filing was made under the Dallas Annual Rate Review (DARR) Tariff and is the company's fifth filing under the current DARR mechanism. Atmos is requesting an increase in annual revenues of \$20.6 million from within the city. This represents a monthly increase of 6.36 percent or \$6.10 for the average residential customer. Atmos has requested a June 1, 2023 effective date for the new rates.

Staff is currently reviewing the filing with the City's gas rate consultant and outside legal counsel and will brief their findings to the Government Performance and Financial Management Committee on April 24, 2023, with recommendations for City Council action on May 10, 2023. The statutory deadline to take action on this matter is May 28, 2023.

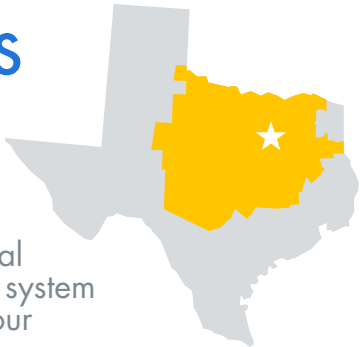

Mid-Tex Division Highlights



In 2022, Atmos Energy spent more than \$180 million in capital investment in the City of Dallas and more than 85 percent was spent to enhance the safety and reliability of our natural gas system.

This investment in system modernization also reduces our environmental impact. Our goal of reducing methane emissions from our distribution system mains and services by 50 percent from 2017 to 2035 is essential to our environmental commitment.

Atmos Energy submitted a Dallas Annual Rate Review (DARR) filing to the City of Dallas on January 13, 2023, requesting an increase in annual revenues of approximately \$20.6 million.

DRIVERS BEHIND OUR \$20.6M FILING

Atmos Energy continues its comprehensive pipe replacement program that prioritizes the replacement of segments based on relative risk by analyzing many factors, including pipe material. This program is based on the company’s Distribution Integrity Management plan developed in compliance with state and federal regulatory requirements. This replacement activity includes all pipe types, including steel and plastic, on both mains and service lines.

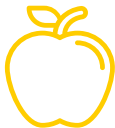

In 2022, Atmos Energy invested more than \$1.7 million to provide educational, literacy, financial assistance, and food security resources across the City of Dallas.



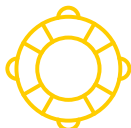

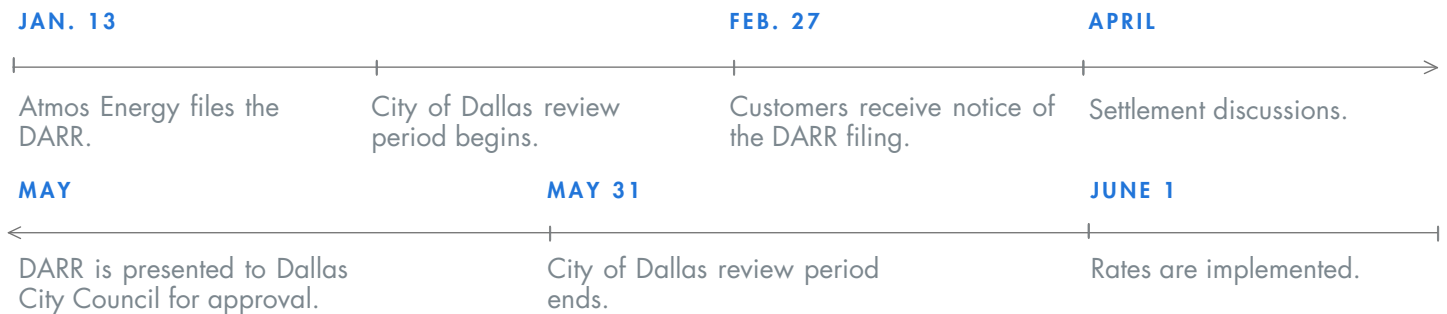

DARR FAQ

WHY IS ATMOS ENERGY ASKING FOR A RATE ADJUSTMENT?

We are requesting an increase in annual revenue of \$20.6 million to help recover more than \$180 million of capital spent from October 2021 through September 2022. The rates we charge customers – coupled with investor and creditor capital – allow us to enhance the safety and reliability of our natural gas system through pipeline replacement and system modernization. Current rates don't allow us to recover our additional spending on safety and reliability.

WHAT ROLE DOES THE CITY PLAY IN SETTING NATURAL GAS RATES?

The City Council reviews the rates we charge our customers in the City of Dallas. In Texas, cities have original jurisdiction over natural gas rates. In order to recover costs after they've been spent, natural gas utilities must file directly with the cities for approval to adjust rates. The Railroad Commission of Texas is the regulatory body for natural gas companies in Texas, with appellate jurisdiction over cities and jurisdiction over areas outside of city limits.

WHAT IS THE DARR?

The Dallas Annual Rate Review (DARR) is a mechanism that was developed by the City of Dallas and Atmos Energy in 2011 to ensure all of our spending is reviewed annually. It takes into consideration precedent decided by the Railroad Commission of Texas and outlines specific factors such as return on equity, capital structure and other administrative items, reducing the need for costly litigation that is ultimately borne by our customers. The parties reached a negotiated settlement in nine out of eleven filings from 2012 through 2022. This process is not unique to Dallas – the other 443 cities served by the Mid-Tex Division also operate under similar annual mechanisms.

WHAT IS A CAPITAL EXPENDITURE?

Just like highways, bridges and other utility lines across the country, natural gas pipelines must be modernized over time. The associated costs, or capital expenditures, primarily include pipe replacement and repair, service line replacement, growth and fortification of the natural gas distribution system and overall pipeline integrity.

SUBJECT **Office of Homeless Solutions (OHS) Update on Unsheltered Housing and Encampment Resolution Efforts**

The purpose of this memorandum is to restate the scheduled OHS status reports to the Housing and Homelessness Solutions (HHS) Committee and the full City Council, utilizing the following:

- Weekly TCB updates on area cleanings and introducing H.A.R.T data from the week prior
- Quarterly updates on the Dallas R.E.A.L Time Rapid Rehousing (DRTRR) Initiative
- Introducing a monthly dashboard incorporating the work done through the OHS Street Outreach teams, H.A.R.T, and the DRTRR between quarterly updates

Every week, OHS staff provide updates via the TCB which include locations of where we are cleaning and/or removing encampments based on 311 data and where/what the H.A.R.T team has resolved issues in the past week. We are continuing to triage encampments based on these criteria and have added in responses by the Homeless Action Response Team (H.A.R.T), serving our community as a homelessness crisis response team.

Every quarter, per the existing schedule, OHS and Housing Forward present joint updates on the Dallas R.E.A.L Time Rapid Rehousing (DRTRR) Initiative. These updates include an overview of individuals housed, individuals engaged, encampments decommissioned, overall system orientation and planning concerning street outreach, housing needs, and system performance.

On a monthly basis, we are introducing a dashboard capturing the above activities in one location to provide the most current image of our accomplishments. OHS is also creating district-specific updates on area hotspots, which we will debut soon, including meetings with individual Councilmembers.

Please be advised that we are continuing to do quarterly updates for the DRTRR and the next scheduled update is to the HHS Committee on February 27, 2023. In addition, we continue to provide new program updates and initiatives to the Citizen Homelessness Commission and the Dallas Area Partnership. SUBJECT **2020-2030 Census – Input Opportunities for Future Processes**

On June 27, 2022, the Dallas City Council approved and adopted the new City of Dallas districting plan, which redrew the City Council district lines from which Councilmembers are elected as required by the Dallas City Charter. The City Council engages in this redistricting process after the census is released by the U.S. Census Bureau every ten years.

Following the conclusion of the 2021 redistricting process, Councilmembers inquired about the determination of census tracts before the start of the decennial census. The redistricting process is determined by census tracts. Census tracts are delineated by the U.S. Census Bureau before they come to a governmental body as part of the census and redistricting process. Census tracts are generally bounded by physical features such as roads, creeks, or shorelines, but also may be bounded by nonvisible features such as city, county, school district, or voting precinct boundaries.¹ Most census tracts are entirely within a single governmental entity's *corporate* limits, but some cross over limits.² Thus, census tracts may serve as *representative boundaries* of a governmental entity but may not precisely mirror the *corporate* limits.³

To ensure government services are provided to all residents within a governmental entity's corporate limits and for mapping best practices, it is routine for the redistricting process to include a robust review of the districting map and adjust as necessary to align with *corporate* limits. The boundaries in the 2021 final districting plan have been aligned with the City of Dallas' *corporate* limits (as shown in the map below) *without affecting the population count in any district*. The final GIS map file of the City of Dallas's adopted districting plan was provided to the City Secretary's Office and to Dallas County on December 5, 2022. Census tracts and representative boundaries in Collin and Denton Counties were unchanged.

Following the conclusion of the formal districting activity in June 2022, city staff began a review of the process to ensure that every opportunity for input and proper count is pursued in future census and redistricting processes. Cities are afforded opportunities to provide input on how census tracts and blocks are drawn before the initiation of the census and redistricting process.

SUBJECT **2020-2030 Census – Input Opportunities for Future Processes**

In August 2022, the Office of Government Affairs shared a [memorandum](#) with City Council regarding opportunities to provide input on how census tracts and blocks are drawn before a future census and redistricting processes.

It is important for our leadership to understand the procedures for determination of census tract boundaries leading up to the redistricting process. Interest is centered on diverse populations that span a single census tract, which may lead to reduced government program services and funding eligibility. Many government programs, services, and funding are allocated based on data determined by census tracts.

The following are input opportunities for the previous and future censuses:

- **Local Update of Census Addresses Operation (LUCA)** is the only time that tribal, state, and local governments can review and comment on the U.S. Census Bureau's residential address list for their jurisdiction. *The Office of Government Affairs will continue to participate in all LUCA-related training and workshops so that we can file an appeal, if needed.*
- In addition, the North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG) participates in the Census' **Participant Statistical Areas Program (PSAP)** on the City's behalf. The PSAP allows participants to review and verify selected statistical area boundaries for census data tabulation following U.S. Census Bureau guidelines and criteria. *The City of Dallas will be engaged through NCTCOG.*
- A **Special Census Review** can update population and demographic estimates produced by the Census Bureau if local officials believe they changed considerably after the 2020 Census count. *Opportunities to request this review will open in March 2023. We will make a determination at or around that time.*
- In September 2022, the U.S. Census Bureau distributed information regarding potential paths forward to ensure that all Dallas residents are represented and counted in the Census. The **2020 Post Census Group Quarter Review (PCGQR)** allows local governments to request that the U.S. Census Bureau review the population counts of group quarters they believe were not correctly counted. *At this time, the City of Dallas has not identified concerns with group quarters counts.*
- The **2020 Census Count Question Resolution Operation (CQR)** gives local governments the opportunity to request that the Census Bureau review their boundaries and/or housing counts to identify Census count errors. *The City of Dallas is not asserting errors; however, we do expect to weigh in on the above-listed opportunities when the engagement periods begin to provide comment on improvements for the 2030 census.*

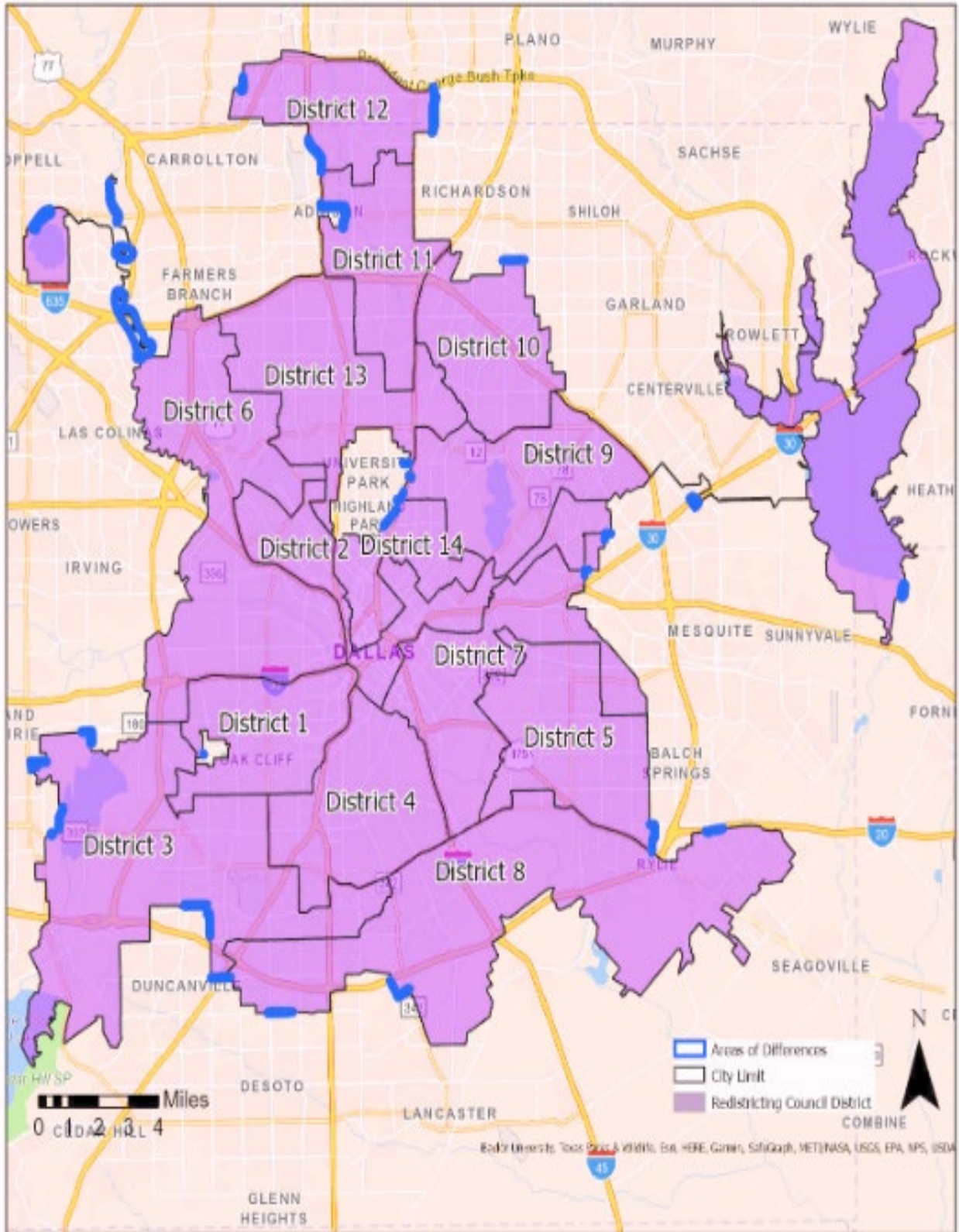

ASUNTO **Censo 2020-2030 – Oportunidades para Aportar Comentarios en Futuros Procesos**

El 27 de junio de 2022, el Concejo de la Ciudad de Dallas aprobó y adoptó el nuevo plan de redistribución de distritos de la Ciudad, que modificó los límites de distritos del Concejo de la Ciudad a partir de lo cual se eligen a los concejales según lo exige la Carta Constitucional de la Ciudad de Dallas. El Concejo de la Ciudad realiza este proceso cada 10 años luego de que la Oficina del Censo de los EE. UU. publica el censo.

Tras la conclusión del proceso de redistribución de distritos de 2021, los concejales indagaron sobre la determinación de los distritos censales antes del comienzo del censo decenal. El proceso de redistribución de distritos está determinado por distritos censales. Los distritos censales son trazados por la Oficina del Censo de EE. UU. antes de que lleguen a un organismo gubernamental como parte del censo y el proceso de redistribución distrital. Los distritos censales generalmente están delimitados por características físicas, como carreteras, arroyos o costas, pero también pueden estar delimitados por características no visibles, como los límites de la ciudad, el condado, el distrito escolar o los distritos electorales.¹ La mayoría de los distritos censales se encuentran íntegramente dentro de los límites corporativos de una sola entidad gubernamental, pero algunos traspasan dichos límites.² Por lo tanto, los distritos censales pueden servir como *límites representativos* de una entidad gubernamental, pero es posible que no plasmen con precisión los límites *corporativos*.³

Para asegurar que los servicios gubernamentales se proporcionen a todos los residentes dentro de los límites corporativos de la entidad gubernamental y para emplear las mejores prácticas de mapeo, es habitual que el proceso de redistribución de distritos incluya una revisión sólida del mapa distrital y se ajuste, según sea necesario, para alinearlos con los límites *corporativos*. Los límites en la redistribución distrital final de 2021 se alinearon con los límites *corporativos* de la Ciudad de Dallas (como se muestra en el mapa a continuación) sin afectar el conteo de la población en cualquier distrito. El archivo final del mapa GIS del plan distrital adoptado por la Ciudad de Dallas se entregó a la Oficina de la

Secretaría de la Ciudad y al Condado de Dallas el 5 de diciembre de 2022. Los distritos censales y los límites representativos en los Condados de Collin y Denton no se vieron modificados.

Tras la conclusión de la actividad formal de distribución de distritos en junio de 2022, el personal de la Ciudad inicio una revisión del proceso para asegurar que se aprovechen todas las oportunidades para brindar comentarios y conteos adecuados en futuros procesos de censo y redistribución de distritos. Las ciudades tienen la oportunidad de proporcionar comentarios sobre cómo se delimitan los distritos censales y los bloques antes del inicio del censo y el proceso de redistribución de distritos.

En agosto de 2022, la Oficina de Asuntos Gubernamentales compartió un [memorándum](#) con el Concejo de la Ciudad con respecto a las oportunidades para proporcionar comentarios sobre cómo se delimitan los distritos y bloques censales antes de un futuro censo y procesos de redistribución de distritos.

Es importante que nuestros líderes comprendan los procedimientos para la determinación de los límites de los distritos censales que conducen al proceso de redistribución de distritos. El interés se enfoca en diversas poblaciones que abarcan un solo distrito censal, lo que puede conducir a una reducción de los servicios de programas gubernamentales y oportunidades para recibir fondos. Muchos programas, servicios y fondos gubernamentales se asignan en función de los datos determinados por los distritos censales.

Las siguientes son oportunidades para brindar comentarios para los censos previos y futuros.

- **Operación de Actualización Local de Direcciones Censales (LUCA**, por sus siglas en inglés) es el único momento en que los gobiernos tribales, estatales y locales pueden revisar y comentar sobre la lista de direcciones residenciales de la Oficina del Censo de EE. UU. para su jurisdicción. *La Oficina de Asuntos Gubernamentales continuará participando en todas las capacitaciones y talleres relacionados con LUCA para que podamos presentar una apelación, si es necesario.*
- Además, el Consejo de Gobiernos del Norte y Centro de Texas (NCTCOG, por sus siglas en inglés) participa en el **Programa de Áreas Estadísticas Participantes del Censo (PSAP**, por sus siglas en inglés) en nombre de la Ciudad. El PSAP permite a los participantes revisar y verificar los límites de áreas estadísticas seleccionadas para la tabulación de datos del censo siguiendo las directrices y criterios de la Oficina del Censo de EE. UU. *La Ciudad de Dallas participará a través de NCTCOG.*
- Una **Revisión Especial del Censo** puede actualizar las estimaciones demográficas y de población producidas por la Oficina del Censo si los oficiales locales creen que cambiaron considerablemente luego del conteo del Censo de 2020. *Las*

oportunidades para solicitar esta revisión estarán disponibles a partir de marzo de 2023. Tomaremos una determinación en ese momento o en torno a esa fecha.

- En septiembre de 2022, la Oficina del Censo de EE. UU. distribuyó información sobre los posibles caminos a seguir para asegurar que todos los residentes de Dallas estén representados y contados en el Censo. La **Revisión de Alojamientos del Grupo Posterior al Censo (PCGQR**, por sus siglas en inglés) **de 2020** permite a los gobiernos locales solicitar que la Oficina del Censo de EE. UU. revise los conteos de población de los alojamientos de grupo que creen que no se contaron correctamente. *En este momento, la Ciudad de Dallas no ha identificado preocupaciones con respecto a los conteos de alojamientos de grupo.*
- La **Operación de Resolución de Preguntas del Censo (CQR**, por sus siglas en inglés) **de 2020** brinda a los gobiernos locales la oportunidad de solicitar que la Oficina del Censo revise sus límites o conteos de viviendas para identificar errores en el censo de EE. UU. *La Ciudad de Dallas no afirma errores; sin embargo, esperamos opinar sobre las oportunidades mencionadas anteriormente cuando los períodos de participación comiencen para brindar comentarios sobre las mejoras para el censo de 2030.*
