SUBJECT Trinity River Update

The Corps and City have been in ongoing communication regarding the recent regional rainfall, lake releases and preparations for the coming weeks. The flood control lakes that provide storage for the region continue to be in a state of surcharge releases and will likely be in this stage for the next seven to ten days (map attached). Once these lakes return to a controlled setting, the Corps will continue to release waters in preparation of rainfall events. The reservoirs will continue to make normal releases for up to ninety (90) days. This may change depending on potential and actual rainfall events.

To assist with education and outreach with respect to what this means to the Dallas Levees, the Corps has provided a cross section for the Commerce area of the Trinity River. This is attached for your convenience. The Trinity River Basin reservoir lake levels and corresponding authorized operating pools may be reviewed at http://www.swf-wc.usace.army.mil/cgibin/rcshtml.pl?page=Reports&report=fish.

As the levels in the Trinity River continue to provide a unique view of the river, we expect to see people continue to visit the area. Since May 2, there have been over 44,000 people explore the Continental Bridge and West Dallas Gateway.

All flood control systems are working as intended and staff will continue to monitor conditions as well as operate pump stations as necessary. Please feel free to contact me if you need additional information.



Upper Trinity River Watershed








Trinity River Flooding History

City of Dallas -Recent Rain May Bring Mosquitoes

Prevent mosquito breeding

The City of Dallas reminds the public to "drain after the rain" to help reduce the mosquito population. Wet weather followed by warm temperatures can create ideal mosquito breeding conditions. Residents should remain vigilant and eliminate standing water. Breeding places for mosquitoes include swimming pools that are not kept clean, stagnant ponds, pet watering dishes, birdbaths, potted plants, old tires, empty containers, toys, clogged rain gutters and French drains. Mosquitoes can grow from egg to adult in as little as seven days.

Outreach and ground spraying protocol

The City of Dallas continues the proactive approach to "fight the bite" in 2015 with Public Service Announcements, billboards, brochures and community meetings. The City will maintain 90 mosquito traps weekly until October. Ground spraying activities for mosquito control will be based on a positive West Nile Virus (WNV) mosquito trap result from a public health laboratory or a consistently high count of mosquitoes in traps as outlined under the City of Dallas 2015 Mosquito Control Plan. Additionally, ground spraying may occur if a confirmed human case of the Chikungunya Virus (CHIK-V) is detected in the City of Dallas by the State Health lab. The location(s) of all ground spraying activities along with a map will be posted on the City's web site approximately 4-7 hours prior to spraying.

Protection against mosquito bites

People have an important role to play in protecting themselves and their loved ones from illnesses caused by mosquitoes. Citizens should employ the 4 **D**s' to avoid mosquito bites:

Defend yourself by using insect repellents – Follow label instructions

Dress in long sleeves and pants, loose and light colored clothing when you go outside Dusk and dawn, stay indoors during this time to avoid mosquitoes when they are most active Drain standing water and install or repair window screens

RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF DALLAS PARK AND RECREATION BOARD REGARDING THE MAYOR'S FAIR PARK TASK FORCE KEY RECOMMENDATIONS

WHEREAS, the Dallas Park and Recreation Board supports the Mayor's Fair Park Task Force Key Recommendations with the following proposed modifications:

Proposed Modification to MFPTF Key Recommendation 1:

The Dallas Park and Recreation Board recognizes that it has no authority to undertake planning initiatives around or near Fair Park. The Board encourages the City Council to undertake and develop a comprehensive land use study and urban design plan for the South Dallas/Fair Park neighborhood. This plan should have strong community participation and input. A goal of the study should be to protect the community and surrounding neighborhood and to mitigate gentrification.

Proposed Modification to MFPTF Key Recommendation 2:

The Dallas Park and Recreation Board recommends below-ground parking to preserve the character and landscape of Fair Park.

Proposed Modification to MFPTF Key Recommendation 3:

The Dallas Park and Recreation Board recommends that the board of the new 501(c)(3) for the public/private partnership be diverse and inclusive, with no less than 10% of its members representing the surrounding Fair Park community and no less than 10% having expertise in historic preservation.

Proposed Modification to MFPTF Key Recommendation 4:

The Dallas Park and Recreation Board recommends that implementation of the Task Force recommendations within the Dallas Park and Recreation Board jurisdiction be the responsibility of the Dallas Park and Recreation Board.
