#### **SUBJECT Timekeeping Audit**

The City Auditor released an audit of timekeeping controls this afternoon. It is important to note that there were no findings of misuse of funds or improper payments.

Management's response is included in the materials. Many of the auditor's findings center around system limitations in the current HRIS (Lawson) system. The FY 2015-16 proposed budget includes funding for a new payroll system. If funding is approved, be assured that the proposal specifications will include items to address the auditor's recommendations.

In the meantime, staff will continue to implement process improvements to address the recommendations related to ensuring timesheet approvals and segregation of duties.

August Fish Mortality Event Information SUBJECT

> As you are aware, Trinity Watershed Management responds, monitors, and reports citywide issues impacting streams, lakes and rivers, including fish, to Texas Parks and Wildlife and Texas Commission on Environment Quality (TCEQ), While naturally occurring, conditions combine to create adverse stream water quality conditions, and many fish can die. The Trinity Watershed Management Department is currently responding to three environmental incidents across the City.

- Pavaho Sump at Winnetka and Canada Drive: While a successful aquatic relocation effort was undertaken last fall to relocate fish and wildlife to support wetlands construction, spring rains refilled the pond. With construction activities resuming for the wetlands project, staff performed a routine stormwater inspection on Thursday, August 13, 2015 and found approximately 300 to 400 dead fish, which were removed today. Most of the fish were large carp, with 20 to 30 black catfish. There are additional fish that could not be removed due to staff safety concerns. Field testing indicated that water quality in this pond and the adjacent Delta channel were generally normal with the exceptions of warm temperatures and low dissolved oxygen. While the wetlands construction has recommenced, it is not clear whether this is the sole factor contributing to this fish mortality, particularly as this is also concurrently occurring in other areas. It is anticipated that the prolonged period of high temperatures and very low flow dissolved oxygen contributed to the fish kill. This incident has been reported to both Texas Commission on Environmental Quality, and Texas Parks and Wildlife.
- Trinity River at Scyene and Dixon: Staff are also investigating a report of dead fish in the Trinity River near Scyene and Dixon. At this time, this incident remains under investigation, and water quality data are being collected and reviewed. Staff collected about 168 dead fish at this location. This incident has also been reported to both Texas Commission on Environmental Quality, and Texas Parks and Wildlife.
- Elmwood Branch: Staff were also called to investigate water quality and a potential fish kill on on Elmwood Branch near South Edgefield Avenue and Wright Street; however, staff did not locate any water quality abnormalities, or dead fish at this location.

Staff will be monitoring these locations over the weekend and into next week to assess changes to water quality. Trinity Watershed Management encourages community members to use 3-1-1 to report any concerns related to water quality in neighborhood creeks and ponds, so that staff can respond. SUBJECT West Nile Virus Update

Dallas County Health and Human Services (DCHHS) announced the third human West Nile Virus (WNV) case in the City of Dallas for the 2015 season. Additionally this week, fourteen positive WNV traps have now been confirmed in various locations throughout Dallas (see attachments), exceeding the number of positive traps confirmed in the 2014 season during the same period.

Although the current data indicates a higher number of positive traps this season, WNV infections are unpredictable and residents are being advised to take precautions to prevent mosquito bites. Public information and outreach continues on radio, billboards, social media, and community meetings and at www.dallascityhall.com.

The City operates an integrated mosquito management program, as recommended by Dallas County and the U.S. Centers for Disease Control (CDC), that focuses on surveillance, reduction of breeding sites, community outreach, public education and the use of adulticides.

### Areas in Dallas to be sprayed for West Nile Virus

**Dallas** – Mosquito pools were confirmed positive for West Nile Virus. Weather permitting; the area(s) delineated below are scheduled for mosquito control spraying between 9:00 p.m. and 5:00 a.m. Friday, August 14, 2015 and Saturday, August 15, 2015 on each night.

**Control Areas:** The areas to be sprayed are within the following general boundaries:

9000 block of Rolling Rock Lane (75238): **Wallbrock Drive** on the north, **Plano Road** on the west, **Pandora Drive** on the east and **Northwest Highway** on the south.

8700 block of Eustis Avenue (75228): **San Saba Drive** on the north, **Whittier Avenue** on the west, **Sweetbriar Drive** on the east and **Longwood Lane** on the south.

3600 block of Mount Rainer Street (75211): **Rock Quarry Road** on the north, **Mt. Shasta Street** on west, **Hartsdale Drive** on east, and **Higgins Avenue** on the south.

While the insecticide is approved by the Environmental Protection Agency for treatment, residents in the above areas should avoid contact with the spray by staying indoors. Persons inside a vehicle while trucks are actively spraying should remain in their vehicles with the windows up and the air conditioner on until the trucks pass and the spray is no longer visible. Persons out during the scheduled spraying time should be alert for trucks and should not follow them. Residents who come in contact with the spray are advised to wash the affected area thoroughly with soap and water. The spray breaks down quickly in the presence of sunlight and has no residual effect.

#### Protection against mosquito bites

Dallas residents are urged to take precautions against mosquito bites by reducing outdoor activity during evening and nighttime hours. Residents who are outside during these times should cover their arms and legs and use a mosquito repellent.


#### Prevent mosquito breeding

Residents should eliminate standing water to prevent mosquito breeding and the spread of West Nile Virus. Breeding places for mosquitoes include swimming pools that are not kept clean, stagnant ponds, pet watering dishes, birdbaths, potted plants, old tires, empty containers, toys and clogged rain gutters and French drains. Standing water should be eliminated promptly, as mosquitoes can grow from egg to adult in as little as seven days.


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

6000 block of Jim Miller Road (75228): **Fenestra Drive** on the north, **Telegraph Avenue** on the west, **Senate Street** on the east and **RL Thornton Fwy** on the south.

2200 block of Colony Ct (75235): **Denton Drive** on the north, **Harry Hines Blvd** on the west, **Shea Road** on the east and **Empire Central** on the south.
