# SUBJECT City of Dallas Public Improvement Districts (PIDs)

Council Member Griggs asked staff to provide information to the Economic Development and Housing Committee about the status of various PIDs related to collections compared to the estimated PID budget contained in the most recent PID creation/renewal documents.

Unlike a tax that is assessed at a fixed rate each year, PID assessments must be made on the basis of special benefits accruing to the property because of the PIDs services or improvements. By signing the petition, property owners agree to bear an agreed apportionment of the annual budget reflected in the PID petition and service plan. For Dallas PIDs, the apportionment is based on the appraisal district valuation of the properties in the PID. The total collections should not exceed the annual budget approved by the petitioners.

Last year, staff expressed concern that some PIDs were collecting funds in excess of their annual budgets. In the event of such an over-collection, the PID management company has several options. These options have been memorialized in the following language, which is included in the petitions for all new and recently renewed PIDs. The language will also be included in all future PID creation and renewal petitions:

"If the PID assessment collection is greater than the annual projected amount, the managing entity shall:

- i. be permitted to carry over up to 20% of the funds budgeted to the following year to account for delays or cost adjustments, provided that the cumulative 7-year total is not exceeded as a result of such carry-over;
- ii. reduce the amount of the assessment in the following year to absorb the over-collection;
- iii. return the funds to the property owners; or
- iv. submit a revised petition to obtain consent of the property owners for an increased collection."

Several PIDs were renewed or created after this issue was initially raised and their petitions contain the language above in an effort to prevent future over-collection

and clearly state budget/collection limitations. The recently renewed or created PIDs with the new language are:

- Knox Street
- Lake Highlands
- North Lake Highlands
- Oak Lawn Hi Line
- South Dallas Fair Park
- Tourism
- Vickery Meadow

The Prestonwood PID expires in 2018, and the new language will be included in any renewal petition. This PID is not likely to exceed its petition budget.

The Deep Ellum PID is set to expire in 2020, but has already contacted staff about an early renewal to adjust its boundary. The new language will be included in the proposed renewal petition.

The remaining PIDs will add the new petition language upon their regularly scheduled renewal dates — Dallas Downtown Improvement District (2020), Klyde Warren Park/Dallas Arts District (2021), South Side (2019), University Crossing (2020), and Uptown (2019).

Currently no PID has collected more funds than is contained in the PID's total petitioned budget. Below is a list of the Dallas PIDs with their expiration/potential renewal date, collections to date, and total petitioned budget amounts, and status relative to inclusion of over-collection/budget limitation language in petitions.

Addendum Item #1 on August 23, 2017 – Acceptance of an Airport Improvement Program (AIP) grant from the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA)

The following item will be presented to City Council on the August 23, 2017 agenda. This item authorizes the acceptance of an AIP entitlement grant from the FAA for the federal share of the eligible capital improvement projects in an amount not to exceed \$1,617,738. The grant amount is generated through an AIP formula based upon 2015 enplanement data received from and for the FAA. The FAA provided the grant paperwork on July 25, 2017 with an acceptance date of August 31, 2017. A delay in accepting this grant could cause the FAA approval deadline to elapse and cause the grant to be withdrawn and, the monies to be redistributed to other airports.

The projects identified within FAA Grant No: 3-48-0062-053-2017 are:

# **Extension of Taxiway M**

Build a new portion of Taxiway M to serve as primary aircraft route to the end of Runway 13L for takeoff. The new "detour" will allow the existing route via Taxiway B to be rehabilitated.

# **Runway 18-36 Conversion**

A project to convert the existing closed 150 foot wide runway into an active 75 foot wide taxiway. The work includes milling and placement of new asphaltic pavement and the installation of taxiway lighting and signage.

# **SUBJECT**

Authorize the **(1)** acceptance of a grant from the U.S. Department of Transportation Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) (Grant No. 3-48-0062-053-2017/CFDA No. 20.106) for the federal share of the eligible capital improvement projects for the Airport Improvement Program (AIP) at Dallas Love Field in an amount not to exceed \$1,617,738 of the total estimated project cost to provide design for the Extension of Taxiway M Design Project and construction for the Runway 18-36 Conversion Project; **(2)** receipt and deposit of grant funds in an amount not to exceed \$689,258 in the FAA AIP Grant-Taxiway M Extension Design Project Fund and \$928,480 in the FAA AIP Grant-Runway 18-36 Conversion to Taxiway E Project Fund; **(3)** establishment of appropriations in an amount not to exceed \$689,258 in the FAA AIP Grant-Taxiway M Design Project Fund and \$928,480 in the FAA AIP Grant-Runway 18-36 Conversion to Taxiway E Project Fund; and **(4)** execution of the grant agreement with the Federal Aviation Administration for the Airport Improvement Program Grant Funds – Not to exceed \$1,617,738 - Financing: Federal Aviation Administration Airport Improvement Program Grant Funds

# **BACKGROUND**

This item is on the addendum due the official receipt of the grant award from the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) was July 25, 2017 with an acceptance date of August 31, 2017 which is before the next consent agenda date of September 13, 2017. If we do not accept the grant within the required deadline we risk losing the grant and the funds going into the discretionary funding pool.

The Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) has indicated that the following projects are eligible for federal funding and can participate in an amount up to \$1,617,738 of the actual and eligible project costs.

# **BACKGROUND** (continued)

# Extension of Taxiway M

The existing pavement on Taxiway Bravo was assessed in a 2015 Airfield Pavement Condition Survey. The recommendation in the survey was reconstruction. To maintain capacity at the airport, a new portion of Taxiway M must be placed in order to reconstruct Taxiway B. In addition, the existing airfield drainage needs to be upgraded to conform to current standards.

# Runway 18-36 Conversion

A project to convert an existing 150-foot wide closed runway into a 75-foot wide taxiway. The work includes milling and placement of new asphaltic pavement and the installation of taxiway lighting and signage.

# PRIOR ACTION/REVIEW (COUNCIL, BOARDS, COMMISSIONS)

On April 22, 2015, City Council authorized an engineering services contract with HNTB Corporation for design services necessary for the Runway 18-36 Conversion Project at Dallas Love Field by Resolution No. 15-0806.

On October 14, 2015, City Council authorized Supplemental Agreement No. 1 to the professional services contract with HNTB Corporation to provide design, construction documents and bidding services for the physical improvements necessary to convert the existing Runway 18-36 to a taxiway for the Runway 18-36 Conversion Project at Dallas Love Field by Resolution No. 15-1880.

On January 27, 2016, City Council authorized Supplemental Agreement No. 2 to the professional services contract with HNTB Corporation to provide design, construction documents and bidding services for a Runway Incursion Project identified by the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) to be part of the Runway 18-36 Conversion Project at Dallas Love Field by Resolution No. 16-0181.

On October 11, 2016, City Council authorized a construction contract to EAS Contracting, L.P. to provide construction services required for physical improvements necessary for the Runway 18-36 Conversion Project at Dallas Love Field by Resolution No. 16-1649.

On October 11, 2016, City Council authorized Supplemental Agreement No. 3 to the professional services contract with HNTB Corporation to provide full time on-site construction administration and management services for the Runway 18-36 Conversion Project and the Runway Incursion Mitigation (RIM) Project at Dallas Love Field by Resolution No. 16-1651.

# PRIOR ACTION/REVIEW (COUNCIL, BOARDS, COMMISSIONS) (continued)

On March 22, 2017, City Council authorized Supplemental Agreement No. 4 to the professional services contract with Garver, LLC for design, planning, engineering, and construction document services for the Love Field Pavement Rehabilitation and Reconstruction Project, Taxiway Bravo Phase II, and Expansion of Taxiway Mike Design at Dallas Love Field by Resolution No. 17-0475.

On June 28, 2017, City Council authorized Supplemental Agreement No. 4 to the professional services contract with HNTB Corporation to provide design, on-site construction administration and management services for the expanded scope to keep Taxiway E open for aircraft traffic as requested by the Federal Aviation Administration for the Runway 18/36 Conversion by Resolution No. 17-1036.

On June 28, 2017, City Council authorized Change Order No. 1 to the construction contract with EAS Contracting, L.P. to provide construction services for the additional soil work, grading and electrical service to keep Taxiway E open for aircraft traffic exiting Runway 13R-31L by Resolution No. 17-1037.

City Council will be briefed by memorandum regarding this matter on August 18, 2017.

**WHEREAS,** on October 11, 2016, City Council authorized Supplemental Agreement No. 3 to the professional services contract with HNTB Corporation to provide full time on-site construction administration and management services for the Runway 18-36 Conversion Project and the Runway Incursion Mitigation (RIM) Project at Dallas Love Field by Resolution No. 16-1651.

**WHEREAS,** on March 22, 2017, City Council authorized Supplemental Agreement No. 4 to the professional services contract with Garver, LLC for design, planning, engineering, and construction document services for the Love Field Pavement Rehabilitation and Reconstruction Project, Taxiway Bravo Phase II, and Taxiway Mike at Dallas Love Field by Resolution No. 17-0475; and

WHEREAS, on June 28, 2017, City Council authorized Supplemental Agreement No. 4 to the professional services contract with HNTB Corporation, to provide design, on-site construction administration and management services for the expanded scope to keep Taxiway E open for aircraft traffic as requested by the Federal Aviation Administration for the Runway 18-36 Conversion Project, in an amount not exceed \$91,000, increasing the contract amount from \$2,241,850 to \$2,332,850, by Resolution 17-1036; and

**WHEREAS,** on June 28, 2017, City Council authorized Change Order No. 1 to the construction contract with EAS Contracting, L.P. to provide construction services for the additional soil work, grading and electrical service to keep Taxiway E open for aircraft traffic as requested by the Federal Aviation Administration by Resolution 17-1037; and

**WHEREAS**, it is desirable to accept reimbursement funds from the FAA for the eligible costs of each project.

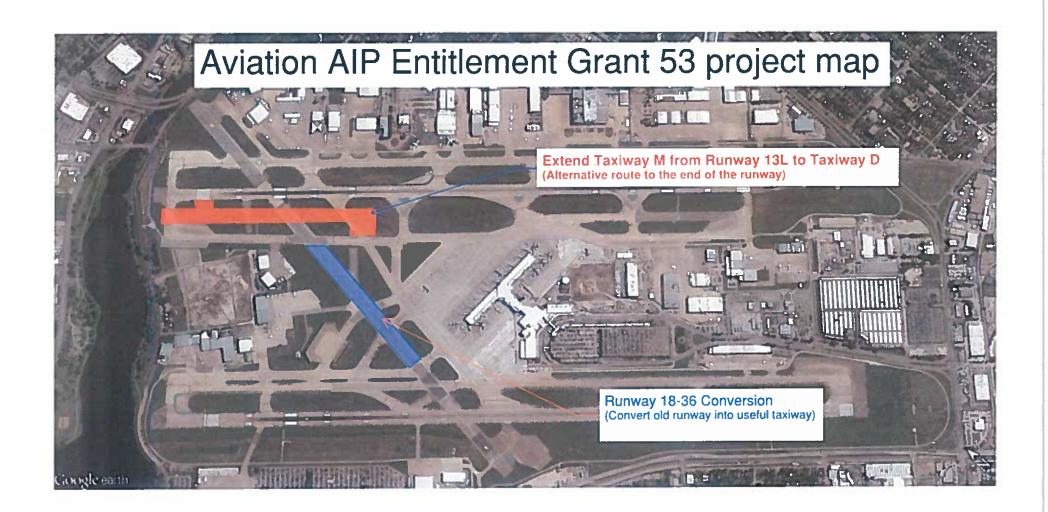

# **BACKGROUND**

The Park and Recreation Department is prepared to implement Phase III of the automated athletic field lighting control system from Musco Sports Lighting, LLC (Musco). The Musco Control Link System will integrate with the Department's RecTrac Reservation System. Each day RecTrac will report to the Musco Control Center with the schedule for the athletic fields utilizing the system. If a field has a valid reservation, the Musco System will activate the field lights at the beginning of the reservation time and turn them off after the reservation has ended. The initial pilot system has helped greatly reduce the amount of unauthorized play on athletic fields, has eliminated the need for staff to manually turn lights on and off and has resulted in reduced electrical costs.

The controller unit (attachment) will be attached to the outside of the load center at each of these complexes. The controller will electronically tie into the complexes' power by a certified Musco installer along with a staff electrician from the Park and Recreation Department. The controller unit cost is \$7,082 and the installation cost is \$1,250. Phase III total cost is \$83,320 (10 units & installations). Musco Sports Lighting, LLC is the manufacturer and only distributor.

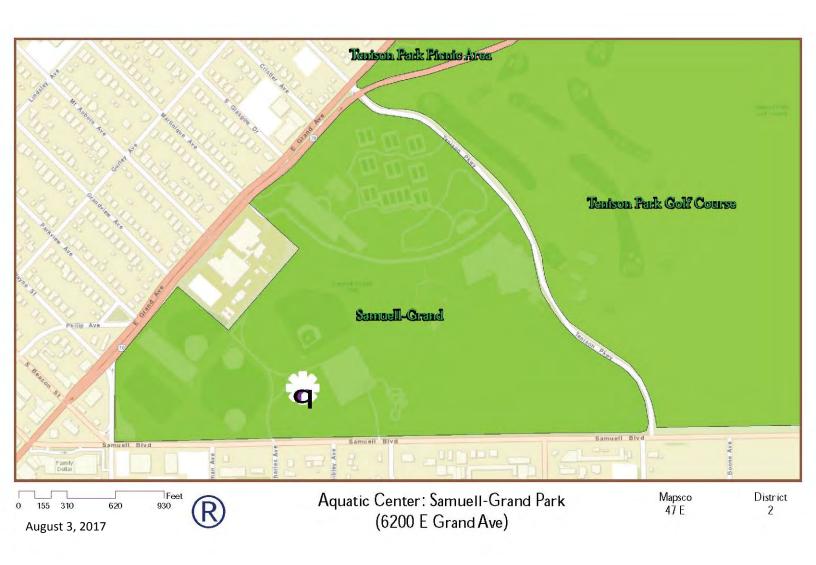

#### **BACKGROUND**

Section 42.041(b)(14) of the Texas Human Resources Code, as amended, allows city-sponsored youth recreation programs to be exempted from the state's day care licensing laws if the city adopts standards of care for those programs and complies with other requirements of that legislation. One requirement is that the City Council hold a public hearing annually on the city's youth program standards of care and adopt an ordinance re-establishing and continuing in effect the standards.

Ordinance No. 23159, adopted by the City Council on June 11, 1997, created Chapter 12 of the Dallas City Code in order to exempt City of Dallas youth programs from State child-care licensing requirements and provide minimum standards by which the City operates youth programs. Chapter 12 was readopted on June 10, 1998, by Ordinance No. 23534, on June 9, 1999, by Ordinance No. 23907, on June 14, 2000, by Ordinance No. 24281, on May 23, 2001, by Ordinance No. 24611, on May 22, 2002, by Ordinance No. 24943, on May 28, 2003, by Ordinance No. 25269, on June 9, 2004, by Ordinance No. 25628, on May 25, 2005, by Ordinance No. 25998, on June 14, 2006, by Ordinance No. 26376, on June 13, 2007, by Ordinance No. 26800, on June 11, 2008, by Ordinance No. 27222, on June 10, 2009, by Ordinance No. 27565, on June 9, 2010, by Ordinance No. 27911, on May 25, 2011, by Ordinance No. 28217, on May 23, 2012, by Ordinance No. 28670, on June 12, 2013, by Ordinance No. 29036, on May 28, 2014, by Ordinance No. 29358; on May 28, 2016 by Ordinance No. 30106. Chapter 12 expired on June 16, 2017, it is now necessary for the City Council to readopt its standards of care for city-sponsored youth programs.

## **BACKGROUND** (continued)

The Director of the Park and Recreation Department implements, administers, and enforces Chapter 12, which applies to youth programs sponsored by the City, whether offered after school, during the summer, or during holidays. A coordinator initiates an inspection report for each program to confirm that standards of care are being met.

The youth program coordinators and leaders must meet certain qualifications pertaining to age, education, and experience and are provided orientation and training relating to working with children.

Each program must operate with a participant to leader ratio of 20:1 and must follow guidelines pertaining to safety, fire, and health as set forth in the standards of care.

On May 5, 2016, the Park and Recreation Board authorized a public hearing.
