Neighborhood Public Hearings Schedule FY 2018-19 HUD Consolidated Plan Budget

The Office of Budget and Community Development Commission (CDC) are pleased to host the annual Neighborhood Public Hearings, giving citizens the important opportunity to provide comments and input to identifying community needs in Dallas and the potential uses of the FY 2018-19 U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Consolidated Plan grant funds. The Consolidated Plan grants include: Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), HOME Investment Partnership Program (HOME), Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG), and Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS (HOPWA).

The City of Dallas' Citizen Participation Plan (CPP) requires a minimum of six (6) public hearings be held during the development phase of the Consolidated Plan Budget. Typically, these meetings are designated as one meeting in each quadrant of the city: one meeting at City Hall; and one meeting within the city limits, but outside of Dallas County, where HOPWA funds are allocated. This year, in collaboration with the Office of Fair Housing & Human Rights, the CDC and staff from the Office of Budget - Grants Administration Division will conduct twelve (12) Neighborhood Public Hearings in January and February of 2018. As required by the CPP, one of these neighborhood public hearings will be held outside of Dallas County. A new initiative added this year. one meeting will be a virtual town-hall meeting. This coordination will leverage citizen participation efforts for the FY 2018-19 Consolidated Plan Budget and the Assessment of Fair Housing public participation meetings. The CDC has concurred with the proposed meeting dates and times, and developed the communication plan to solicit citizen input in the use of FY 2018-19 Consolidated Plan grant funds. Please see the attached English and Spanish translation of the proposed public hearing schedule locations.

The CDC has recommended that advertisement be placed in the following newspapers: The Dallas Morning News, The Dallas Examiner, Al Dia, The Asian Magazine, The Oak Cliff and Lake Highlands Advocate, Southern Dallas Magazine, and the Dallas Observer. We will post notices at public hearing locations, recreation centers, libraries, the City's webpage, and the Dallas City News Network channel. We will send email notices to homeowners and neighborhood associations, neighboring

SUBJECT Sales Tax Receipts

The September 2017 sales tax receipts from the State Comptroller's Office are \$26,528,842 which represents a 0.1 percent decrease in total collections compared to the same reporting period last year. September's sales tax revenue is 4.7 percent less than budgeted.

September 2016 actual \$26,553,757

September 2017 budget \$27,827,924

September 2017 actual \$26,528,842

This is the last report for sales tax receipts for FY 2016-17. For the 12-month period, receipts totaled \$293,610,565. This is \$9,692,693 (3.4 percent) better than the prior fiscal year and \$1,422,061 (0.5 percent) better than the FY 2016-17 budget.

The FY 2017-18 budget forecasts sales tax revenue to increase to \$303,349,086. This is 3.3 percent more than the amount received during FY 2016-17. We will continue to monitor our sales tax forecast closely and keep you informed.
