

SUBJECT Proposed Lease of the Meyerson Symphony Center

On March 25, 2019, the Quality of Life, Arts and Culture Committee was briefed on the proposed 5th Amendment to the Use Agreement for the Morton H. Meyerson Symphony Center ("The Meyerson"), which would amend the agreement to become a 99-year lease of the land and improvements to the Dallas Symphony Association, Inc. (DSA), and shift all operation and maintenance costs of the property to the DSA following a six-year wind-down of the City's financial support for such costs.

Opened in 1989, the Meyerson was built through a public/private partnership with the DSA raising over \$54 million in private support to match the City's bond contribution of \$49.3 million. Presently, the City's Office of Cultural Affairs manages and operates the facility, with considerable support from Building Services, and the DSA is the primary user, providing a year-round season of classical music concerts, outreach and school programs, and other special concerts at the Meyerson. The City funds all operation and maintenance for the facility at a net loss of approximately \$1.6 million annually in recent years.

Under the proposed amendment, the City will spend existing bond funds on voter approved capital projects and provide financial support over a six-year period for the City's other deferred maintenance obligations and to assist with DSA's operation of the facility as they ramp up their earned income. As requested by the Committee, a year-by-year profit-loss summary for the wind-down period is below.

Years one and two will require an additional investment by the City of approximately \$1.4 million annually, and \$937,000 in year three, to address the deferred maintenance issues, but by year four, the City will begin saving money. We propose the utilization of debt repayments from convention center funds in the first three years to offset the temporary cost increase. There will be no budget reductions to existing cultural service programs to cover this expense.

With the City's financial commitment to address deferred maintenance, the DSA will commit to raising \$5 million privately over the next five years and to completing at least \$5 million in capital improvements by 2029.

In addition to the financial terms of the agreement, the DSA has agreed to grandfather OCA-supported arts organizations at current rent and fee rates for 10 years and has agreed to extend a number of other benefits and assurances to these key partners. The briefing to the Quality of Life, Arts and Culture Committee with these details and other deal points can be found online at https://bit.ly/2CXsPaR.

This proposal is consistent with, and furthers the goals of, the *Dallas Cultural Plan 2018* through multiple initiatives of the Sustainable Arts Ecosystem priority, which suggests renegotiating the operating agreements for the city's largest cultural facilities to release resources for more equitable support of cultural organizations and individual artists. The Arts and Culture Advisory Commission unanimously approved a recommendation in support of this proposal on March 21, 2019, and on March 25, 2019 the Quality of Life, Arts and Culture Committee unanimously approved a motion to advance this proposal for full City Council consideration.

New Items

Animal Services - Update and "Innovation Showdown"

Halfway through FY19, Dallas Animal Services (DAS) is on pace to set records from both a lifesaving and public safety perspective. March represented the fourth consecutive month that DAS attained a live release greater than 90%, after first achieving the milestone in December 2018. From a public safety perspective, loose dog intakes are on pace to exceed historic highs, while loose dog bites are trending to the lowest levels in recorded history. Please see the dashboard reviewing DAS' performance halfway through FY19.

In other exciting news, we encourage staff and City Council to cheer for DAS on April 17th, when the department will compete as a finalist for \$450,000 in lifesaving funds during the Petco Foundation's 2019 "Innovation Showdown" in New Orleans at the Humane Society of the United States' Animal Care Expo.

In a format similar to that of the popular television show "Shark Tank", DAS will pitch its lifesaving "Dallas90 Shelter Service System" app, which is designed to improve the customer's experience and increase the shelter's adoption rates. 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Possible Migrant Shelter

The Dallas Morning News recently reported that Dallas is being considered for new migrant shelters. The Office of Emergency Management (OEM) spoke with Dallas County Judge's office April 9, 2019 to better understand statements reported in the Dallas Morning News. Recently, the County Judge's Office received a letter from the US Health and Human Services (HHS) Department providing information that HHS is seeking to expand its capacity to house migrant populations in the country.

The letter conveyed that the HHS is scouting facilities in multiple cities to house migrant populations in the country, however, did not contain a request to house any persons at this time. In response to the letter, the County Judge called HHS to express Dallas County's status as a welcoming community and willingness to support any future needs of the department. The Dallas Office of Emergency Management will maintain contact with the Judge's Office for sharing of information and better understanding of any next steps should they be necessary. April 3, 2019; Maci Smith, WFAA Assignment Editor: Does the city have any information or a statement regarding allegations that city council member Phillip Kingston has missed the deadline to repay the City of Dallas over \$8,000 for missing city council meetings?

City Response: We can confirm Mr. Kingston has not made any payments and is in arrears on his debt of \$8,160.

City Update: He has paid.

April 1, 2019; Clark Fouraker, NBC News Visual Storyteller; My name is Clark Fouraker and I work for NBC as a national visual storyteller (I'm based in Dallas, but work nationwide!) and I'm looking to connect with someone in sanitation for a story we're doing some research on. We're trying to learn in trash pickup and landfill material had an uptick in 2018/19 that could be connected to the Marie Condo/Spark Joy movement across the country?

Can I connect with someone in the PAO office or with Sanitation today to discuss this story idea?

City Response: A preliminary review of residential disposal and recycling tonnage indicates that Dallas households are throwing away and recycling less materials, not more. In 2016, more than 511,880 tons of residential household waste was disposed at Dallas' McCommas Bluff Landfill. 472,500 tons were disposed in 2018, a 7.68% reduction. Recycling declined 3.14% in the same time period from 55,713 tons in 2016 to 53,961 tons in 2018.



As more people embrace Marie Condo's Spark Joy, zero waste, tiny living, and other reduction lifestyles, it's no surprise that less waste is being generated to be managed either through disposal or recycling. Under Dallas' local solid waste management plan, it's the City's objective to decrease waste disposal to zero waste levels by 2040. Decreased consumption coupled with donations, recycling, and diversion are helpful tools to achieving the objective.

April 2, 2019; **Alyssa Woulfe, WFAA Content Editor**; WFAA TV is seeking confirmation of the location for tomorrow morning's (April 3rd) city council briefing.

The reason we ask is because we have several reports of protestors planning on attending in regards to the recent charges against the deep ellum attack victim, L'Daijohnique Lee.

Will city council relocate to a larger space for the briefing?

City Response: The afternoon hearing will be held in the council chambers. The briefing will be still be in the council briefing room (6ES) as planned.

April 4, 2019; Joanna Molinero-Sample, Telemundo 39; I am trying to reaching out to Animal Control due to an animal attack that occurred today involving a pit bull, this morning on 2111 Melbourne Avenue. According to the victim who is a dog walker this is the second incident were the pit-bull who is owned by, Mrs. Contreras who also lives on Melbourne Avenue has gotten out of his fencing and has attacked someone. Today, the victim says she was walking her dogs when the pit bull bit her and several other dogs she was walking. Arturo Ortiz owns the dog walking company, and employs the victim who was bitten today. According to them, they have reached out to Animal Control about the attack.

Is there a report of animals and a woman being bit today on Melbourne Avenue? Has the owner of the pit-bill been fined before, will she face any repercussion for today's attack? What is the city's response or policy on pit-bull attacks? Is there any further information you can share with us about today's attack?

City Response: This incident is still under investigation, and as such we can't comment at this time.

In regards to your question about City policy, the Dallas City Code states: Section 7-4.14: " (a) A person commits an offense if the person is the owner or keeper of a dog and the person fails to secure the dog and the dog makes an unprovoked bite that causes bodily injury to another person, legally restrained domestic animal, or



livestock, that occurs at a location other than the owner's or keeper's real property or in or on the owner's or keeper's motor vehicle or boat.

(b) An offense under this section is a Class C misdemeanor."

The City does not have any ordinances restricting any breeds.

April 4, 2019; Hannah Everman, NBC 5 Assignment Editor; We have heard that Oak Lawn Park has been renamed Turtle Creek park at the parks board meeting this morning – Could you confirm that? I'm just seeing it posted on the Oak Lawn Facebook community pages. Thank you!

City Response: That is correct, the board approved to change the name to Turtle Creek Park just a few minutes ago.

Dallas Fire-Rescue to "Fill the Boot" for MDA

Wednesday, April 3rd, though Friday, April 5th, DFR will join fire departments across the country to "Fill the Boot". During this time, on-duty firefighters will converge on designated intersections throughout the City in an effort to raise money for the Muscular Dystrophy Association (MDA).

This year marks the 45th year that DFR has participated in the campaign; and to help foster a more competitive spirit, the MDA plans to show their appreciation by awarding different fire stations for a variety of fundraising categories. Among the categories is top overall fire station, which was awarded to Station 43; in 2018 (also defending champ dating back to 2015), for collecting the most money of the departments overall \$391.5K effort, and claiming the inaugural Tracy Beard Memorial Trophy. Though winning the competition comes with its bragging rights, it's only an underlying mechanism of the larger and more important goal of helping those in need.

Ideally, we would like to reach our goal on day one; however, we understand the realities of today's economy, the challenges they can present and the fact that not everyone is in a position to contribute. So, on behalf of the MDA, we respectfully encourage giving only what you can.

Also, as we've encouraged our men and women to <u>exercise the highest levels of</u> <u>caution</u> while stepping out into traffic to "Fill the Boot", we only ask that drivers do the same to help keep the intersections as safe as possible.
