Office of Community Police Oversight Complaints Received

March 2020

This report encapsulates the complaints received in the Office of Community Police Oversight (OCPO) for the weeks of March 1 to March 30, 2020.

Since the opening of the office in October of 2019 there have been 172 complaints received. There were 73 complaints received by OCPO in March of 2020. Below are summaries of those complaints. They are broken into two categories:

- Actual complaints against the Dallas Police Department.
- Contacts from individuals received through the complaint system that are not actually complaints against the Dallas Police Department (DPD). In those cases, individuals were directed to the appropriate departments/agencies for services. This section also documents civilians that contacted OCPO to follow-up on a complaint that was already filed against DPD.

Complaints

March 2, 2020	Complainant alleges he was given a citation by an aggressive DPD officer who verbally abused him after legally crossing the street. Complainant feels disrespected and embarrassed. The complainant would like an apology. Complainant would also like the citation to be dismissed.
March 3, 2020	Complainant alleges officers are armed thugs who violated his constitutional rights and for identifying purposes removed his wallet from his person without permission.
March 4, 2020	Complainant alleges officer directing traffic became angry and yelled at complainant when she hesitated to merge.
March 4, 2020	Complainant alleges officer's report of auto accident was false and fraudulent. Complainant request officer's statement be rescinded and removed from accident report. He also would like to get the control number related to the case.
March 5, 2020	Complainant had an issue with the manager at her apartment complex. Complainant contacted DPD and alleges responding officers did not act, nor did she receive proper help which made her feel discriminated against.
March 5, 2020	Complainant alleges DPD officer was selling online merchandise with DPD logo and K-9 displayed prominently as promotional items which is unethical.
March 9, 2020	Complainant alleges he was wrongfully charged with assault with a deadly weapon and received five years probation. Complaint wants to be cleared of the charges.



Office of Community Police Oversight Complaints Received

March 11, 2020	Complainant alleges an issue with three police officers that he believes are doing things that are criminal. Complainant is requesting a meeting in the second week of April with one person from city hall, DPD internal affairs and a judge, in hopes of getting his license back.
March 12, 2020	Complainant alleges sexual and mental harassment by a DPD Lieutenant for over three years.
March 13, 2020	Complainant was involved in an auto accident and DPD officers were flagged down. Complainant alleges DPD officers failed to properly verify the other parties' insurance and released an uninsured motorist. When calling to file a claim complainant learned the policy information given by the DPD officer had been canceled a month ago.
March 13, 2020	Complainant alleges multiple reports of harassment by several parties. Per complainant, her issues were brought to the attention of the Chief of Police, the District Attorney, DPD, several council members, and an assistant City Manager without resolution.
March 16, 2020	Complainant alleges DPD officers are "armed thugs who know nothing about the constitution". In a shared YouTube video, the complainant stated DPD officers searched him and touched his property without his permission.
March 17, 2020	Complainant called DPD officers to a group home in South Dallas where she alleges being attacked by residents. Complainant alleges officers displayed horrible, unprofessional, violent and prejudice attitudes. Also, per complainant, her arm was hurt by arresting officer.
March 17, 2020	Complainant was stopped and arrested for reckless driving on Labor Day weekend. Per complainant, a DPD Detective destroyed the panel area in the back of both seats, leaving the metal exposed.
March 17, 2020	Complainant alleges a dog was shot in the middle of a parking lot. Complainant stated when DPD arrived at the scene, no action was taken. He believes the alleged individual that shot the dog and the police officer are friends.
March 18, 2020	Complainant alleges a police car was driving down Walnut, speeding around people and cutting them off when their lights were not on.
March 18, 2020	Complainant alleges her boyfriend was issued two citations by a DPD officer for: (1) speeding and (2) not having a driver's license. The complainant stated her boyfriend does not speak English; therefore, he did not understand why he was issued the citations and the officers did not understand him when he was trying to explain that he did have a driver's license.
March 18, 2020	Complainant has concerns for his autistic neighbor who stated he is living in unsafe conditions and being treated like a slave by his stepfamily who are police officers. Per complainant, the neighbor has also stated his family smokes marijuana and touch themselves in his presence.



Office of Community Police Oversight Complaints Received

March 19, 2020	Complainant visited Jack Evans DPD headquarters after waiting on hold for approximately forty-five minutes to obtain a police report. Per complainant the report was not ready as stated and she feels someone is not doing their job.
March 19, 2020	Complainant alleges he is being harassed by a DPD officer who stopped him twice in one day and stated, “don’t let me see you tomorrow.” Per complainant, no trespass signs are posted on premises.
March 19, 2020	Complainant was pulled over by a DPD officer for speeding while returning to work. Complainant feels he was not given an opportunity to explain he works in the medical field and was needed at the hospital. For this reason, he asked for a warning but was told the citation had already been entered. Complainant is also concerned the officer’s priorities are misplaced especially with the pandemic occurring.
March 20, 2020	Complainant was given DPD headquarters address to obtain a license. When the complainant arrived at DPD headquarters, she spoke with the DPD officer at the front desk and learned that the information she was given was incorrect. Complainant feels that during the exchange with the DPD officer, the officer ignored her and displayed unprofessional behavior.
March 20, 2020	Complainant alleges having trouble getting through the main phone line at DPD headquarters. Complainant alleges call takers are rude and keep hanging up the phone.
March 20, 2020	Complainant alleges DPD officers sat back and did nothing while a motorcycle gang of approximately 100- 150 people blatantly and intentionally broke the law in front of them.
March 21, 2020	Complainant is reporting homeless individuals setting up camps on private property and cutting locks on the gates to gain entry. Complainant alleges DPD officers are not willing to address the issue.
March 22, 2020	Complainant alleges DPD deposited money into a body shop account belonging to her ex-boyfriend.
March 23, 2020	Complainant alleges while responding to a call at a women’s shelter, DPD officers arrived with weapons drawn, used unnecessary force to gain entry causing destruction of shelter doors, and overreacting to a scene. Also, per complainant, DPD officer’s presence frightened the other residents. Complainant suggest officers should be retrained in social work and not just handling guns.
March 24, 2020	Complainant contacted DPD Central Operations Division to report an incident that occurred at a Verizon store. Complainant alleges the DPD officer who answered the telephone was rude and unwilling to assist with taking his complaint.
March 26, 2020	Complainant feels he was falsely issued a speeding ticket by a DPD officer. Complainant alleges he was discriminated against because he is Asian.



Office of Community Police Oversight Complaints Received

March 27, 2020	Complainant was stopped and arrested for running a stop sign and possession of drugs. Complainant alleges that upon release the DPD officer intentionally failed to place complainant's identification card in his property bag, which could negatively impact him in the future.
March 27, 2020	Complainant was parked in the parking lot of a Golden Chick for a while because he was locked out of his vehicle. The manager of the Golden Chick called DPD to have the complainant removed from the property. When a DPD officer arrived, he harassed and bullied the complainant by asking him for identification multiple times and denying him assistance without proof of identification. Complainant also stated the officer conducted a non-consensual search and stole his pocketknife during the search.
March 27, 2020	Complainant stated she was physically assaulted while pregnant and she has not heard from the DPD detective who is handling her case. Complainant feels the detective has been neglecting her case and would like to press charges against him.
March 27, 2020 March 27,2020	Complainant was lost on the White Rock Lake trail and contacted 911 for assistance. Although he provided his trail track identification number, complainant alleges the DPD operator stated there was nothing she could do and advised him to call an Uber or a relative, then released the line. Complainant feels his civil rights were violated.
March 29, 2020	Complainant alleges she was assaulted and robbed by three assailants; one of the assailants was apprehended by a witness. Once DPD officers arrived, despite multiple witnesses, the officers released the suspect with no charges or further investigation. Complainant feels the officer knew the person in custody and special treatment was given.
March 31, 2020	Complainant is concerned DPD dispatchers are being paid off to disregard his non-emergency calls.
March 31, 2020	Complainant was issued a speeding citation, but stated she was not speeding. Complainant alleges harassment and suspicious activity by the DPD officer.

Contacts Only

March 3, 2020	Individual alleges threats and intimidation by an Irving Detective. Individual wants to know what proper detective etiquette is. Individual was provided Irving Police Department contact number to file a report.
March 4, 2020	Individual alleges multiple reports of sexual misconduct, harassment, assault, and homicide against several individuals- which did not take place in the City of Dallas. Individual mentioned the acts took place in Minnesota and Boston. Individual was provided Minnesota and Boston Police Department contact numbers to file a report.



Office of Community Police Oversight Complaints Received

March 4, 2020	<i>Follow-up:</i> The complainant contacted OCPO regarding a previously filed complaint. OCPO gave an update on the status of the investigation of the complaint.
March 4, 2020	Individual submitted a UK news article entitled, "A trip to Hell" and wants to promote public awareness. OCPO informed individual the information was received and gave a list of top news stations to raise this issue in the public.
March 5, 2020	Individual wants to report a phone scam on his mother's behalf. Individual was provided DPD contact number and website to file a report.
March 10, 2020	Individual contacted OCPO from India stating residents of Dallas have illegally registered a home out of the country with "black money". Individual was provided DPD contact number and website to file a report.
March 11, 2020	Individual stated the manager of the apartment complex called DPD to have the individual removed from the location, after asking the individual to pick up a deposit of \$349 which was made for move-in. Individual was denied move-in after signing the contract and paying the deposit; she would like to report the manager. Individual was provided DPD contact number and website to file a report.
March 12, 2020	While delivering bus fare the individual's son was arrested by DPD officers for aggravated assault which occurred in Mesquite. Individual's son is out on bond and being mistreated and threatened by an individual working the son's case at Frank Crowley. The individual was denied his requested police report and stated no investigator has come to the home. Also, the individual feels the bond amount is excessive. Individual was provided Mesquite contact number and website to file a report.
March 12, 2020	Individual notified OCPO that she paid for items worth over \$6,000 to be shipped to relatives in Nigeria; yet items have not been received, nor has the shipping company returned the individual's calls for inquiry. Individual was provided DPD contact number and website to file a report.
March 15, 2020	Individual would like to know if anything can be done about drivers in his neighborhood disregarding a stop sign. Individual was given DPD contact information to inquire about resolutions.
March 15, 2020	Individual contacted OCPO to report excessively loud music throughout the day. Individual was provided DPD contact number to file a report.
March 16, 2020	<i>Follow-up:</i> Complainant contacted OCPO to supply supplemental information about a complaint they previously filed. OCPO informed complainant their case has been updated with the additional information.
March 17, 2020	Individual came home and found her son's bedroom window broken; she would like to file a report. OCPO provided her DPD contact information and website to file a report.



Office of Community Police Oversight Complaints Received

March 17, 2020	<i>Follow-up:</i> Complainant request that the Police Monitor contact her regarding a complaint she recently filed with OCPO. The Police Monitor updated the complainant on the status of her case.
March 18, 2020	Individual contacted OCPO to report burglary of his vehicle. OCPO provided individual with DPD contact information to file a complaint.
March 19, 2020	Individual is receiving harassing calls and text messages from “fake numbers”, who he suspects is his ex-boyfriend, and would like to file a complaint. Individual was given DPD contact information and website to file a complaint.
March 19, 2020	Individual contacted OCPO to request a copy of his police report. Individual was referred to DPD to obtain a copy of his police report.
March 19, 2020	Individual has suggestions to deter street racing. OCPO provided individual with DPD contact information to voice his suggestions and/or concerns.
March 19, 2020	Individual would like to report homeless people who are causing clutter at an abandoned property nearby. OCPO provided individual with DPD contact information to report the activity at the abandoned location.
March 19, 2020	Individual’s vehicle was broken into and her paystubs were stolen. Her job is requesting a police report in order to replace the stolen paystubs. OCPO provided individual with DPD contact information to file a report.
March 19, 2020	Several individuals contacted OCPO to report animal cruelty by a specific person. Individuals were provided DPD and animal control center contact information to file a report and voice concerns.
March 20, 2020	Individual mistakenly emailed her completed theft report addressed to DPD, to OCPO. To ensure her police report was investigated, OCPO forwarded the police report to DPD on the individual’s behalf.
March 20, 2020	Individual contacted OCPO to report that she saw a pornographic image of herself being sexual assaulted as child on TV. OCPO provided the individual with DPD contact information and website to file a report.
March 23, 2020	Per individual, her employer is not complying with sanitary precautions and feels if someone gets sick, “they are all doomed”. OCPO provided the individual with the phone number for the Code Enforcement Department.
March 24, 2020	Individual was calling on behalf of someone that is incarcerated to report an incident against a sheriff officer at Lew Sterrett jail. Individual was provided with OCPO website information and mailing address to forward to the incarcerated individual so he may submit a written complaint.
March 24, 2020	Individual contacted OCPO to file a noise complaint against their “noisy neighbor”. OCPO provided individual with DPD contact information to file a complaint.
March 25, 2020	Individual contacted OCPO to report wanted fugitives who are illegally connecting electric and gas at multiple locations. Individual was given DPD contact and website information to report the activity.



Office of Community Police Oversight Complaints Received

March 26, 2020	<i>Follow-up:</i> Complainant recently provided supplemental information to a previously filed complaint. OCPO advised the complainant that their case has been updated and is in the process of being reviewed.
March 27, 2020	Per individual, he paid \$1,200 to have a car shipped out of the country. He would like to file a complaint against the shipping company who failed to render services and is rejecting the individual's calls. Individual was provided with DPD contact number and web address to file a complaint.
March 27, 2020	Individual wants to report her dog was stolen by her sister-in-law while she and her boyfriend were incarcerated. Individual was provided DPD contact information and web address to file a complaint.
March 27, 2020	<i>Follow-up:</i> Complainant submitted a time stamped video related to the review that he filed on 3/24/2020. OCPO informed complainant their case has been updated with the additional information
March 28, 2020	Individual contacted OCPO to file a theft report. Individual was given DPD contact and website information to file the report.
March 29, 2020	Individual reporting cars speeding on Zang Boulevard in Oak Cliff. She is asking that the strict policies for shelter in place during COVID-19 be enforced. Individual was given information for the Mayor's office, Chief Judge Clay Jenkins, and DPD to voice her concerns.
March 30, 2020	Individual reported her car was broken into and her purse was stolen. OCPO provided DPD contact information to file a report.
March 30, 2020	Individual was calling on behalf of someone incarcerated to report a concern about the charges they received from the DPD officer and mistreatment at Lew Sterrett. Per DPD policy, a complainant must file a complaint on his own behalf. Individual was provided with OCPO website information and mailing address so the incarcerated individual may submit a written complaint. Individual was also provided the number to Dallas County Sheriff Internal Affairs to file a complaint.
March 31, 2020	Individual would like to file a harassment report and obtain a restraining order against her oldest son. OCPO provided DPD contact information to file report and inquire about a restraining order.
March 31, 2020	<i>Follow-up:</i> Complainant requested a scheduled appointment between his attorney and OCPO Police Monitor. OCPO contacted the attorney and is awaiting appointment availability confirmation.

April 2020

Enclosed are the complaints received in the Office of Community Police Oversight for the weeks of April 1 to April 30, 2020.

Since the opening of the office there have been 233 complaints received. There were 61 complaints received by the office in April of 2020. Below are summaries of those complaints. They are broken into two categories:

- Actual complaints against the Dallas Police Department
- Contacts from individuals received through the complaint system that are not actually complaints against the Dallas Police Department. In those cases, individuals were directed to the appropriate departments/agencies for services. This section also documents civilians that contacted OCPO to follow-up on a complaint that was already filed against DPD.

Complaints

April 1, 2020	Complainant alleges DPD officer is a “liar” and had no reason to issue him a speeding citation. Complainant feels the officer was on a fishing expedition.
April 1, 2020	Complainant alleges a “rude” DPD officer answered the phone and was too lazy to repeat Internal Affairs phone number. Complainant stated the officer released the line and no one answered when he called back.
April 2, 2020	Complainant alleges DPD officers at the airport contaminated everyone by collecting everyone’s identification cards, touching them all, then handing them back.
April 6, 2020	Complainant would like DPD officer to cancel a report made against her boyfriend.
April 6, 2020	Complainant alleges DPD officer stopped him for a “petty reason”. He is upset that he was stopped, asked to exit the vehicle, patted down, and then released with a warning.
April 7, 2020	Complainant alleges an uncompassionate DPD officer issued him a speeding ticket when returning to the hospital to process a blood sample he had just collected from a patient’s home visit.
April 9, 2020	While working outside near his vehicle at his apartment complex the complainant, who is also a DPD officer alleges a DPD sergeant approached him in an unprofessional and insulting manner.

April 9, 2020	Complainant alleges a possible DPD officer has been stalking and harassing her. She also stated he has molested kids and is still in love with her ex-husband. Per complainant, she has recorded proof as she and the officer were neighbors at a hotel.
April 9, 2020	Complainant alleges DPD officers were “passing the buck” and the online police reporting system is a complete joke. He contacted a DPD substation to file an accident report, who advised him to call 911. The 911 operator directed him to the online reporting system which complainant stated provides a link to a PDF formatted accident report that cannot be submitted online.
April 14, 2020	Complainant was issued a speeding citation and has concerns with DPD officer’s approach to issuing citations during COVID-19 pandemic. Per complainant, the DPD officer was not wearing a mask and was not within the six feet social distancing guidelines.
April 17, 2020	Complainant alleges a DPD officer is violating her code of ethics by using their child as a “pun”; and citing COVID-19 as reason to overrule a signed court order and gain custody.
April 18, 2020	Complaint is a third party who contacted OCPO to report a DPD officer violating a child custody order by preventing her son from seeing his father, claiming the child needed to be quarantined. DPD Internal Affairs addressed the complaint at the weekly OCPO and Internal Affairs meeting. The complaint forwarded to the officer’s division as a Division Referral by Internal Affairs.
April 19, 2020	Complainant was assaulted in a domestic dispute and alleges the DPD detective assigned to her case was not empathetic and made her feel uncomfortable when questioning her. The complainant contacted the Detective’s sergeant to request her case be reassigned.
April 25, 2020	Complainant stated on Saturday morning (4/25) he placed 12 phone calls and spent over an hour and a half attempting to contact Dallas North Central Patrol Division regarding their decision to deliver “Cease and desist letters”. The complainant alleges the DPD sergeant he spoke to was rude and would not answer any of his questions. He also felt the North Central Division was deliberately not assisting citizens on Saturdays.
April 27, 2020	Complainant alleges DPD violated his rights; he has tried to rectify the situation with DPD but was ignored.

April 22, 2020	Individual contacted OCPO on behalf of his brother who has been incarcerated for over twenty year. The individual feels the attorney assigned to his brother's case did not do a proper job. Individual was provided attorney grievance information from the State Bar of Texas website.

Complainant was informed OCPO and the Dallas Police Department’s Internal Affairs Division (IAD) met to determine how his complaint would be handled. During that meeting it was determined there will be no investigation into the allegations stated in his complaint because he is filing the complaint on behalf of a third party. OCPO provided a complaint form to give his brother.
April 30, 2020	Individual is a small business owner residing in Canada. He contacted OCPO to report an online scam he fell victim to and seek assistance retrieving his \$24,125 that he wired to a bank located in Dallas, Texas. OCPO provided DPD non-emergency number and the financial crimes unit number, as well as, the website information to file a report.
April 30, 2020	Individual is following up on a payment she mailed to DPD headquarters to obtain a soliciting license. OCPO contacted the individual to ensure she did not have a complaint against DPD.
April 30, 2020	<i>Third Follow-up:</i> Individual submitted supplemental information. OCPO added the additional information to individual’s false reports and abuse of power case.

Since the opening of the office there have been 275 complaints received. There were 42 complaints received by the office in May of 2020. Below are summaries of those complaints. They are broken into two categories:

- Actual complaints against the Dallas Police Department
- Contacts from individuals received through the complaint system that are not actually complaints against the Dallas Police Department. In those cases, individuals were directed to the appropriate departments/agencies for services. This section also documents civilians that contacted OCPO to follow-up on a complaint that was already filed against DPD.

Complaints

May 5, 2020	Complainant mailed a licensing payment to DPD headquarters and has not received a follow-up.
May 7, 2020	Complainant alleged Dallas SWAT members were acting inappropriate and unprofessional. The complainant felt the SWAT members should be reminded about Chapter 4 of the Code of Conduct, the Law Enforcement Code of Ethics, and Article 6 and Article 7 in Canons of Police Ethics.
May 8, 2020	Complainant stated her mother was involved in a parking lot automobile accident and begged DPD officers to make an accident report. Complainant alleges the accident report was written incorrectly and asked that it be amended but DPD officers refused.
May 8, 2020	Complainant felt her privacy and protection was compromised when DPD officers arrived at her home at 6a.m., responding to an anonymous welfare 911 call.
May 8, 2020	Complainant was stopped and cited by a DPD officer for making an accidental wrong turn. The complainant felt the DPD officer was not empathic and did not bother to ask why he made the turn. The complainant is also concerned the DPD officer took a photo of him during the stop.

May 10, 2020	After being handcuffed for family violence assault, the complainant alleged a DPD officer consistently groped and rubbed near her breast and hip area while holding her arm to assist her in and out of the police vehicle.
May 13, 2020	Complainant contacted 911 to report an aggressive roommate (who has previous assault charges) for threatening and charging at her and ripping the chandelier from the ceiling. Complainant alleged DPD officers arrived at the location over an hour later after placing the 911 call and failed to act when they arrived at the scene. The officers only stated, "I know things are stressful, but please try to get along".
May 13, 2020	Complainant visited her attorney to view a DPD officer's body camera from a 2019 incident. Complainant alleged DPD officers tampered with and removed conversations from the video.
May 14, 2020	Complainant was recently involved in an automobile accident and went to the Dallas Auto Pound with his father to retrieve belongings from his vehicle, because he required assistance due to the injuries from the accident. The complainant stated after waiting 30 minutes to be taken to his vehicle, he was told by the supervisor only one person could enter the yard at a time. The complainant complied with the one-person rule but asked the officers for assistance lifting a few items which the officers refused. Two days later the complainant and his father revisited the Dallas Auto Pound, and both could enter the yard, capture photos of the vehicle and remove additional belongings from the vehicle. For this reason, the complainant felt there is a discrepancy in the one-person rule.
May 15, 2020	Complainant alleged a DPD officer wrote a false accident report. As a result, he is now being sued by the other party involved. The complainant requested the accident report be amended but his request was denied.
May 20, 2020	Complainant alleges DPD officer is a monster and unprofessional, and she does not want him back at her property. Per the complainant, the DPD officer commented "he would not save any one but the grandson if an incident were to happen at her home".
May 21, 2020	Complainant met with a guy from Facebook at a designated location to sell him some old t-shirts. As he drove back home the complainant was pulled over by DPD officers, patted down and asked to sit on the curb. The complainant gave DPD officers permission to search his vehicle, at which point, complainant alleged DPD officers rampaged through his belongings, tossing everything but his face mask outside the vehicle, removed all his documents from the glove box and tore out the shift. An K9 officer and about nine police officers were on the scene- one officer

	left the scene, stating “it was a waste of his time”. When the complainant asked why he was pulled over, an officer replied “we thought we saw you coming out of a dope house” then added “and you don’t have front plates, get them when it’s safe to go to the DMV”. The DPD officers nor K9 found any narcotics.
May 22, 2020	Complainant alleged DPD officers made improper demands by addressing a civil matter between two parties rather than referring them to their legal counsel.
May 25, 2020	Complainant alleged a DPD detective has developed an inappropriate personal relationship with the suspected person in his investigation and as a result, the complainant felt the relationship has influenced the detective’s decision in properly handling the case.
May 27, 2020	Complainant felt DPD Internal Affairs did not properly review a complainant previously filed with Internal Affairs and is requesting an in-person interview with a member from DPD Internal Affairs.
May 27, 2020	Complainant alleged four (4) DPD officers sprayed pepper spray into his homeless nephew’s tent for no reason.

Contacts Only

May 3, 2020	Individual is a boy scout, currently working to obtain his Citizenship in the Community merit badge. He submitted two questions about police brutality: 1: What is being done about the issue? 2) What can young people do to help? OCPO Police Monitor provided answers to the questions.
May 4, 2020	Individual contacted OCPO to file an accident report. OCPO provided DPD non-emergency number and website information to file a report.
May 5, 2020	Individual contacted OCPO to report herself and her five children being abducted. OCPO forwarded the information to DPD on behalf of the individual.
May 6, 2020	Individual contacted OCPO to report his brother for harassment. OCPO provided DPD non-emergency number and website information to file a report.
May 6, 2020	Individual submitted a blank complaint form. OCPO emailed a fillable PDF complaint form and advised individual to type his complaint in the body of the email if he was unable to access the form.

May 9, 2020	Individual submitted a King James Version bible verse. OCPO thanked individual for contacting our office and ensured he did not have a complainant against DPD.

May 17, 2020	Individual contacted OCPO to report persons living in Dallas, Texas who are illegally purchasing property in India. The individual also stated the same persons are threatening him and he request help by the Whistleblower Protection Act of 1989. OCPO advised individual to notify the local police regarding the threats and provided contact information for the Whistleblower Protection Act of 1989 organization.
May 17, 2020	<i>Follow-up:</i> Complainant following up on her complaint filed on May 7, 2020 regarding the police report made on her car accident that took place in the parking lot of Fiesta. OCPO informed complainant that DPD Internal Affairs determined her complainant to be non-investigative according to the 300.00 section of the General Orders, Section 302.00 refers to minor accidents. She was also informed any liable decisions are to be decided in court.
May 18, 2020	Individual would like to know why media or police cannot wait for an autopsy or a ballistic report before releasing information. OCPO explained DPD does not release the names of individuals involved in any death., they instead contact the next of kin. All other requests are submitted via an open records request.
May 19, 2020	Individual would like to file a complaint on Texarkana Texas Police officers, Parkland security and officers at Dallas County jail. OCPO provided individual contact information for all agencies to file a complaint.
May 22, 2020	Individual submitted screenshots of a text conversation they had with DPD. The individual's text referred to an ongoing domestic violence issue between his cousin and her boyfriend. OCPO forwarded the screenshots to DPD.
May 22, 2020	Individual contacted OCPO to report molesters who are posing as kids to conduct sexual relations. OCPO provided DPD Child Abuse Squad contact information and DPD non-emergency contact information to report the suspects.
May 22, 2020	Individual contacted OCPO to report a suspected person who has stalked her since 2001 and has made threats to kidnap and rape her. OCPO

	advised individual to call 9-1-1 for immediate assistance in case of present danger and provided DPD non-emergency phone number and website to report the suspect.

SUBJECT Case Reviews Being Conducted by the Office of Community Police Oversight

Reviews

K. D.	Complainant filed a report with DPD Internal Affairs regarding DPD officers false arrest, racial discrimination, unprofessionalism and unethical behavior during several occurrences at two boarding homes within Oak Cliff and South Dallas areas in 2018. Internal Affairs determined the two cases will not be investigated further by them. One case was determined to be within the policy of DPD to place the complainant under arrest. The other case exceeds the statute of limitations which gives civilians 60 days to file a complaint. The complainant's appeal is currently being reviewed by the Police Monitor.
R. R.	Complainant filed a report with DPD Internal Affairs regarding two of his vehicles being illegally towed and false reports made to justify the towing. Internal Affairs determined investigated and concluded that the officer(s) involved did not violate DPD policy. The complainant's appeal is currently being reviewed by the Police Monitor.
D. G.	Complainant filed a report with DPD Internal Affairs regarding his property being illegally towed, false reports made to justify towing and injuries accrued at the time of the incident. Internal Affairs determined there was no policy violation by the officers involved and ultimately this was a civil matter. The complainant's appeal is currently being reviewed by the Police Monitor.
K. H.	Complainant filed a report with DPD Internal Affairs regarding DPD officers tampering with evidence from 25 years ago. Internal Affairs looked into the matter and determined that the actions of the officers involved did not violate DPD policy. The complainant's appeal is currently being reviewed by the Police Monitor.

SUBJECT Case Updates from Prior Board Meetings

i. Diamond Ross Case Update

At the March 10, 2020 Community Police Oversight Board (CPOB) meeting, Police Monitor Tonya McClary reported to the CPOB that WhitneySmith Company had been hired to conduct an independent review of the Dallas Police Department's investigation of the August 19, 2018 in-custody death case of Diamond Ross. At that time Monitor McClary stated to the Board that she would work closely with WhitneySmith Company during their investigation and review their findings. Monitor McClary also agreed to work with WhitneySmith Company to bring insights, questions, conclusions and recommendations to the Board.

Whitney Smith Company recently completed its investigation of the Diamond Ross case and submitted a preliminary report to Monitor McClary for her review. The report produced by WhitneySmith Company is 71 pages. The scope of their report addressed the following seven questions:

1. Did the action taken by Moody and Ortega from the time Ross was arrested and transported to CDC comply with the DPD Code of Conduct, Chapter VI and DPD General Order (313.00) Arrest Policies?
2. What was Ross' physical and emotional state from the time she was brought into CDC by Moody and Ortega through the time she was removed from CDC and transported to Baylor Scott & White by DFR?
3. Did the actions taken at the CDC by Moody, Ortega, and other personnel follow policies and procedures of the Dallas Police Department?
4. Did it appear that all personnel involved acted within the scope of their duties?
5. Did there appear to be any negligence involved in the handling of Ross?
6. Did the discipline taken against Moody appear to be reasonable for his actions?
7. Did the Dallas Police Department handle the internal investigation objectively and without favoritism?

Ms. McClary will be meeting with WhitneySmith Company later this month to finalize the report, findings and recommendations. Ms. McClary plans to get the report to the members of the CPOB prior to their August 14, 2020. When the Board is ready to have the formal review, Ms. McClary will ensure that members of the WhitneySmith Company

team that conducted the Diamond Ross investigation are in attendance at that meeting to answer questions and give a formal report to the Board of its findings.

Monitor McClary will also provide the CPOB a copy of the findings of the Dallas Police Department's investigation so the Board members can compare both investigations.

ii. Complaint Against Police Chief U. Renee Hall Update

On October 23, 2019 D. P. submitted a complaint to the Dallas Police Department's Internal Affairs Division which contained three allegations of misconduct by DPD Police Chief U. Renee Hall.

The complaint filed by D. P. stated in part the following:

On Tuesday, October 8, 2019, the Community Police Oversight Board held its first meeting after the original ordinance was amended to reflect years of racial justice organizing in the city'. During that historic first meeting, Dallas Police Chief Ulysha Renee Hall violated the code and the communities trust by subjecting members of the public to unprofessional and unnecessary physical violence, abuse, harassment and violation of their civil rights. Dallas Police Chief Ulysha Renee Hall violated Title 5 of the Texas Open Government Code by prohibiting the public to speak on a clearly defined agenda item. Chapter 551, Sec. 551.007(b) requires that "A governmental body shall allow each member of the public who desires to address the body regarding an item on an agenda for an open meeting of the body to address the body regarding the item at the meeting before or during the body's consideration of the item".

After several members of the public attending the meeting with the express purpose of speaking on the agenda item(s) objected, Dallas Police Chief Ulysha Renee Hall requested an "extraction team" to clear the room using physical violence. The physical violence perpetrated by Chief Hall was a direct attempt to deny public speakers the ability to exercise their rights and under Texas state law. Additionally, video showing the physical altercation initiated by Dallas Police Chief Ulysha Renee Hall was edited and deleted from the City of Dallas website directly after it's occurrence. The editing and deleting of a public meeting because they are politically damaging for the Dallas Police Department, and Chief Hall specifically, violate the Internet Broadcast of Open Meetings section of the Texas Government Code § 551.128. Texas state law requires online and internet broadcast of the full meeting, uninterrupted, except for those portions protected by executive session, which this was not. Dallas Ord. No. 31192 places external administrative complaints under the jurisdiction of Dallas Police Internal Affairs, with final disposition determined by Chief of Police. Since the Chief of Police is the subject of my complaint, I respectfully request that she recuse herself from the decision-making process, and instead have this complaint be considered directly by the Dallas Community Oversight Board and/or the Office of Police Oversight. Because D. P. asked that Chief Hall recuse herself and her department from investigating the complaint, Assistant City Manager Jon Fortune asked the Dallas Fire-Rescue Internal Affairs Division to conduct an administrative investigation in the complaint.

D. P. also formally requested that mediation be initiated by the Office of Community Police Oversight. SEC. 37-32.2.2. MEDIATION PROCEDURES state the officer must agree to the mediation. Chief Hall was offered mediation in this matter and declined.

The case was handled by Section Chief D.L. Mullins (IAD) for Dallas Fire-Rescue. Chief D. L. Mullins made the following findings about the three allegations leveraged in the complaint:

Allegations and Classifications:

1. It is alleged that on October 8, 2019 Chief of Police U. Renee Hall, subjected members of the public to unnecessary physical violence, abuse, harassment, and violated their civil rights. *Unfounded*
2. It is alleged that on October 8, 2019, Chief of Police U. Renee Hall, violated Title 5 of the Texas Government Code by prohibiting the public to speak on a clearly defined agenda item. *Unfounded*
3. It is alleged that on October 8, 2019, Chief of Police U. Renee Hall, violated Texas Government Code, Chapter 551.128, Internet Broadcast of Open Meeting, when she caused the video of an open meeting to be edited and deleted from the City of Dallas website. *Unfounded*

Monitor McClary has spoken with Chief Mullins about her findings and reviewed her formal investigation. Monitor McClary will be providing the CPOB with her independent review of the investigation conducted by the Dallas Fire-rescue IAD.

Chief Mullins has recently retired from Dallas Fire-Rescue; however, she briefed her predecessor on the case and indicated that she would be available to present when the CPOB was ready to have a formal review of the case.

Ms. McClary plans to get the report of her findings to the members of the CPOB prior to their August 14, 2020. When the Board is ready to have the formal review, Ms. McClary will ensure that Retired Chief Mullins and/or her predecessor attend that meeting to answer questions and give a formal report to the Board of its findings.

Monitor McClary will also provide the CPOB a copy of the findings of Dallas Fire-Rescue investigation so the Board members can compare both investigations.

SUBJECT Status of Office of Community Police Oversight

Police Monitor/ Director Tonya McClary started on Monday, February 24, 2020 and about three weeks later the City of Dallas started reduced services because of COVID-19. As a result, she has not had a chance to do as much community engagement as she had hoped in her first 90 days. Despite this she has made several accomplishments during her tenure.

Accomplishments:

1. Monitor McClary worked with the City Manager to get a car for the office. Her first trip in the City vehicle was to Austin, Texas for a training sponsored by the National Association of Civilian Oversight of Law enforcement (NACOLE). The training was for new and seasoned oversight directors. Monitor McClary believes that the visibility of the car has helped strengthen the public's trust in OCPO when they see a member of the staff in the community or when she has been at a shooting scene.

2. Monitor McClary made her first community appearance her second week on the job.



3. Monitor McClary attended her first Officer Involved Shooting (OIS) on March 24th. She went out to the scene and observed how DPD processes these types of scenes. She also worked closely with the Shooting Investigation Unit (SIU) team to figure out a system to ensure that some of the items the Ordinance calls for her to do, she can do.
 - For example, the Ordinance states that the Monitor should be able to observe interviews with officers involved in critical incidents. Until, Ms. McClary arrived DPD did not have a practice of recording officer interviews. However, in order for Monitor McClary to see the interviews in real time there needed to be recording devices in a room so she could monitor the interview. The very first day of interviews with the officers involved in the March 24th event there was no set-up, therefore she was not able to observe the officer interview or provide questions to the detective because she did not see or hear what the officer stated.
 - The very next day Monitor McClary got a call from the Lieutenant of SIU stating that they have figured out a way for her to view the interviews scheduled for that day. Ms. McClary was able to view the interviews and submit questions for the detective to ask the officer. (Ms. McClary is very appreciative of the efforts that SIU put into making this happen. It was literally a 24 hour turn-around and was a great start to what Monitor McClary hopes will be a productive working relationship).
 - Ms. McClary has gone to the scene of every OIS since March 24th. She has also gone to the scene for other cases that involve DPD so she can learn how they process and handle lower level cases as well.

4. Monitor McClary has also intergrated herself into the DPD complaint review process. Every week she meets with members of the Internal Affairs Division and reviews complaints that have come in. She is part of the decision making process for how complaints will be handled. She will eventually develop a new system for complaint intake and look forward to sharing that with the CPOB and the community.
5. Monitor McClary has developed a good working relatinsip with the staff of DPD Internal Affairs. She even has a work station in their dpearmment so she can review vidoe, audio and case files.
6. Getting to know community partners. Ms. McClary has been able to start foring realtionships wth varuous stakeholders in the community. Sh ehas recently developing several projects with comminuty partners. She looks forward to meeting may more civiaish in Dallas.
7. Monitor McClary has been able to do some public education work and community engagemnt with the community during the Pandemic. Not as much as she would like but she will be unveiling a plan about reinvigorating and raising the profile of the CPOB and OCPO.

8. Monitor McClary has finally settled on a place to have her office inside of City Hall. Ms. McClary explored community spaces for her office outside of City Hall but could not find one that avaaible within the comfimes of the office budget. She eventually hopes to have her office in a community space.

Challenges

Ms. McClary has faced many challenges starting a new office from the ground during a pandemic.

1. Hiring her staff. City Council approved the OCPO to have three full-time staff and that includes the Monitor. Monitor McClary has not been able to hire her other two staff. She is hoping to have one of the positions filled this month and the other position filled sometime in July. With the amount of complaints coming in and the number of OIS predicted to happen this summer it is imperative that the OCPO have all three of its staff as soon as possible.
2. Access to Police Data. Monitor McClary has been requesting independent access to DPD data to ensure that she can get the kind of autonomy needed to do her work. As of the date of this memo Monitor McClary has not been given that access.
3. Confusion and/or lack of knowledge of what the OCPB does. There are many people that think OCPO is a part of DPD. As such, there have been missteps administratively that have slowed some things down internally that the office was trying to get done.
4. The interpretation of the Ordinance in very narrow ways. Monitor McClary has noticed a pattern of the Ordinance being used to determine what she cannot do and to place limitations on her authority and the scope of her work.

SUBJECT Policing Issues During COVID-19

On April 10, 2020 the Dallas Community Police Oversight Coalition and the Leadership Conference Education Fund's Policing Campaign sent a letter to DPD Chief U. Renee Hall regarding concerns and issues they saw since the outbreak of COVID-19.

Below is the opening paragraph of their letter to Chief Hall.¹

“The Dallas Community Police Oversight Coalition, in partnership with the Leadership Conference Education Fund's Policing Campaign, writes to urge you to take immediate action to protect Dallas communities and the officers that are charged with protecting and serving them during the outbreak of COVID-19. The daily spike in confirmed cases - including those of Dallas Police Department officers - makes it imperative that the Department take steps to help halt the spread of coronavirus in Dallas. The DPD can do so by reducing proactive interactions between officers and the public and limiting the number of persons under custodial arrest. Specifically, we ask that DPD stop making arrests for offenses that do not pose an immediate harm to the community and make voluntary compliance the primary objective when enforcing the Dallas County's Stay Home Stay Safe Amended Order (stay-at-home) order”.

The Dallas Community Police Oversight Coalition and the Leadership Conference Education Fund cc'd OCPO on the email it sent to Chief Hall in which they attached their letter. After being included in the cc of the letter, Monitor McClary reached out to Changa Higgins, Chair of the Dallas Community Police Oversight Coalition to ask how OCPO could help. Monitor McClary also asked him to consider including OCPO in these types of discussions in the future, because OCPO would have signed onto the letter with the other organizations.

On May 12, 2020 Chief Hall responded to their letter with a memo entitled, “Policing Practices During COVID-19: Response to the Dallas Community Police Oversight Coalition Letter of Concern²”.

Below are the two opening paragraphs of Chief Hall's letter:

“The Dallas Police Department is steadfast in its commitment to protect both the residents of this community and the members of our Department during this COVID-19 pandemic.

Measures have been put in place to lessen unnecessary exposure to officers, while allowing them to be more effective in their efforts and keep the community safe. For example, the Department encourages residents to use the Dallas Online Reporting System {DORS), which is an alternative to officers appearing in person. Residents can electronically file a report for crimes such as criminal mischief, burglary of a motor vehicle as well as shoplifting, etc. If an individual cannot access DORS, expeditors are standing by to take their call and input the information into the system”.

Since May 12, 2020 Mr. Higgins and Monitor McClary have continued their discussions about the concerns they are still seeing that are related to COVID-19 and brainstormed potential joint work on the issue.

Monitor McClary asked Mr. Higgins to join her at the CPOB's May 12, 2020 meeting which was cancelled because of COVID-19. However, she asked him again to present at the June 9, 2020 CPOB meeting and he graciously agreed.

Monitor McClary and Mr. Higgins will talk with the Board about issues they have been seeing during the pandemic and what some of the potential work is that they want to do together to address what they are seeing in the community.

Monitor McClary will also ask the CPOB members to endorse the letter of the Dallas Community Police Oversight Coalition and the Leadership Conference Education Fund's Policing Campaign.

SUBJECT **Policing Practices During COVID-19**

Response to the Dallas Community Police Oversight Coalition Letter of Concern

The Dallas Police Department is steadfast in its commitment to protect both the residents of this community and the members of our Department during this COVID-19 pandemic.

Measures have been put in place to lessen unnecessary exposure to officers, while allowing them to be more effective in their efforts and keep the community safe. For example, the Department encourages residents to use the Dallas Online Reporting System (DORS), which is an alternative to officers appearing in person. Residents can electronically file a report for crimes such as criminal mischief, burglary of a motor vehicle as well as shoplifting, etc. If an individual cannot access DORS, expeditors are standing by to take their call and input the information into the system.

Officers are not currently issuing citations for violations related to delinquent vehicle registration, parking placards for persons with disabilities, and titling. These measures are taken in conjunction with the State of Disaster Ordinance to aid the state's efforts to combat COVID-19. Additionally, officers responding to calls are now contacting the complainant upon arrival, asking that they meet the individual outside of their dwelling to practice social distancing.

We have examined data that shows fewer citations are being issued during this time. From March 14, 2020 through April 9, 2020, there were 2,035 citations; during this same time period in 2019, there were 4,376 citations, resulting in a 53.5% reduction. The Lew Sterrett Justice Center is also reporting a decrease in the number of book-ins by more than 1,000 through the mid-point of the month of April. This is a result of officers' discretionary arrests.

In conclusion, the Department has taken an approach of education and voluntary compliance to the stay-at-home orders. We operate as support to Code Compliance, who leads the enforcement efforts. There have been no citations issued by DPD officers to date.

The Dallas Police Department remains committed and looks forward to providing public safety to its residents and improving relations with the community for years to come.

I. Cease Arrests for Eligible Offenses

Implementing measures that reduce the number of people arrested, who are then transported in police vehicles, processed in station houses, and held in jail, is a necessary public health precaution for Dallas residents and police officers. Every interaction between a police officer and a civilian increases the risk of contracting the virus to both. Should the people held in jail or the staff working there be exposed, the virus can spread like wildfire.² Those same people will carry COVID-19 into the community when leaving jail. And because people of color are overrepresented at all levels of the criminal-legal system, the continuation of arrests and

SUBJECT CPOB Potential Committee Name Changes

After Chairman Enobakhare, Jr. announced that he was going to add some non-board members to the CPOB committees at the March 10, 2020 CPOB meeting, Monitor McClary started reaching out to community members to help solicit names to present to the Board of potential non-board members for consideration.

In talking with community members about the various CPOB committees, Monitor McClary heard some feedback regarding how some of the committee titles don't accurately describe or encapsulate what the committee is about and/or it's full mandate. Other comments were about what various committees "should/could" be addressing.

Two committees in particular were pointed out by people as not being fully representative of the scope of the work or potential scope work of the committee. Those are: (1) Technology and (2) Community Engagement.

Some of the feedback received by Monitor McClary is that the technology subcommittee should also look at data. Monitor McClary felt that suggestion was great, because she would like some thought partnership with Board members and other civilians figuring out solutions to various issues related to data and policing in the City of Dallas.

Other feedback was regarding what the full scope of the Community Engagement Committee should be. Community members felt this was the committee of the Board that should always ensure that the CPOB is staying true to its roots of representing the civilians of the City of Dallas and addressing their needs whenever possible.

With the above thoughts in mind, Monitor McClary is suggesting the following name changes for the two subcommittees discussed in this memo.

- (1) Technology Committee be changed to: **Technology and Data Committee**
- (2) Community Engagement Committee be changed to: **Community Engagement and Transparency Committee.**

Monitor McClary is bringing these suggestions to the CPOB for consideration, discussion and voting during the June 9, 2020 CPOB meeting.

At the March 10, 2020 CPOB meeting, Chairman Enobakhare, Jr. announced that he was going to be assigning Board members to the various CPOB committees. He also announced that he wanted to add some non-Board members to the various board committees as well.

Chairman Enobakhare, Jr. plans to lead the Board through a discussion at the June 9, 2020 CPOB meeting about how this can be done. He will give his thoughts on recruitment, numbers of non-Board members per committee, etc., and encourage the other CPOB members to give feedback and share their thinking on this issue.

Chairman Enobakhare, Jr. is hoping that the Board can settle on a process to achieve the goal of putting non-Board members on CPOB committees at the June 9th meeting, so recruitment can begin immediately after the Board meeting.

SUBJECT Frequency of CPOB Meetings

Despite the world and the City of Dallas being in a pandemic because of COVID-19, the Office of Community Police Oversight (OCPO) has continued to do the work of its mission. Despite other parts of the City government shutting down, the OCPO has been a steady force in the City because policing does not stop during a pandemic.

SUBJECT Reflections and Updates Regarding George Floyd and Policing Protest in the City of Dallas

Background

When the protests began on Friday, May 29, 2020 members of the CPOB (Chairman Enobakhare, Jr. and Member Olivo) and Monitor McClary were among those in the crowd at DPD Headquarters when the protest was still peaceful. Organizers of the protest announced the CPOB and acknowledged that Chairman Enobakhare, Jr. was in the crowd.

When civil unrest began Friday night and continued throughout the weekend the OCPO and the CPOB were left out of discussions about what needed to happen in the City of Dallas to address the concerns of the protestors and what should be done about the police and how they interacted with protestors. Eventually OCPO and CPOB started being included in some of the formal discussions.

Chairman Enobakhare, Jr. and Monitor McClary went to the protest on Monday, June 1st and spoke to protestors about OCPO and CPOB. They also monitored the protestors as they marched and documented that they were peaceful. The Chairman and the Monitor left as the protestors got near the Margaret Hunt Hill Bridge assuming that they were going to be okay. Within 15 minutes of Monitor McClary leaving the protest, her phone started ringing with reports of protestors being arrested on the bridge. Monitor McClary turned around and started heading back toward the Margaret Hunt Hill Bridge. She also started making phone calls to leadership in the City of Dallas including the City Manager and Police Chief Hall. The Monitor also remained in constant contact with the CPOB Chairman who was also working his contacts to see if he could get some support for the protestors on the bridge.

Bringing Solutions

As the week went on it was very clear to Monitor McClary that the experiences of the protestors needed to be collected to get a clear understanding of what happened to them but also to hopefully have their experiences help influence policy changes within the police department. Monitor McClary reached out to the Dallas Police Community Oversight Coalition to see what the joint projects they could do, that would make an impact at this time. The collaboration produced two powerful projects that have already

been yielding results in the community. They are: (1) reinvigorating a Legal Observer Program in the City of Dallas that would be available to any organizer(s) that are putting together peaceful protest and (2) setting up a hotline that protestors could use to document their experiences with the police. Below is the flyer and social media post that was generated about the hotline and documentation project.



Hundreds of lawyers, law students, paralegals and other legal professionals have volunteered to help with both projects. OCPO and the Oversight Coalition are excited and encouraged by the overwhelming response to our call of support.

Complaints

The OCPO has received close to 150 complaints since the protests began on May 29, 2020. The office is expecting more to come in based on information it is getting from multiple community groups in the city.
