- Located in Dallas' historic Fair Park, Texas Discovery Gardens is a year-round organically maintained urban oasis filled with natural wonders
- The Gardens are maintained using sustainable methods that conserve water and help to protect the environment
- Texas Discovery Gardens strives to further our mission with every opportunity, from daily butterfly release talks to festivals, classes and programs






### **Mission Statement**

# **History**

- Opened in 1936 as the Hall of Horticulture for the Texas Centennial Exposition, the 7.5-acre campus includes the first public conservatory built in the Southwestern United States
- Chartered in 1941 as a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization, Texas
   Discovery Gardens is the second oldest botanical institution in
   Texas and the first in Dallas to offer botanical education
   programs for children
- In 2003, Texas Discovery Gardens was certified as the first 100% organic public garden in the state




# **Community Impact and Audience**

# People Behind Texas Discovery Gardens

#### **Staff and Volunteers**

- Texas Discovery Gardens employs 16 staff, 6 of whom are part time
- 1,341 volunteers donated time in the greenhouse as docents, inside the Butterfly House and at events in FY 14-15



#### **TDG Board**

- The board of Texas Discovery Gardens is a 12-member volunteer governing and policy-making body, representing a cross-section of the greater Metroplex population
- The board includes professionals and community volunteers, all of whom have genuine and sincere interest in the mission and activities of Texas Discovery Gardens

### The Gardens

The Gardens include native and adapted plants

Several gardens have been renovated or added in

the past two years

 Shakespeare Garden wall repaired and improved (\$5,000 grant)

- Minnie Marcus Garden renovated (\$25,000 in grants and donations)
- Master Gardeners' Garden (continued funding and volunteer upkeep by Dallas County Master Gardeners Association)








### The Gardens

- Native Butterfly Habitat expansion(\$45,000 from private donor and grant)
- Green Mountain Energy Solar Pavilion (\$50,000 grant to build 410 sq. ft. solar array)
- Wildlife Pond renovation (\$8,000 in donations)







### The Gardens

- Welcome Bed planted and metal butterfly art installed at entrance
- Multiple Seasonal Gardens funded and installed
- Multiple connecting ADA-compliant granite pathways installed to connect between gardens
- Commemorative bench donation program has begun



# Natural Learning Center Featuring the Native Snakes of Texas Exhibit

- Built by hand in 2014-2015 using sustainable and reclaimed materials
- Constructed with help from \$30,000 in grants from the Dallas Foundation and the Woodall Foundation
- Will serve as additional classroom, greenhouse and exhibit space
- Will be powered by Green Mountain Energy Solar Pavilion







# Rosine Smith Sammons Butterfly House and Insectarium

- The Rosine Smith Sammons Butterfly House and Insectarium is a yearround tropical butterfly immersion exhibit
- Visitors realize the importance of habitat conservation around the globe and how the local environment relates with tropical environments far away
- New: Honeybee exhibit that connects to the outside gardens allowing visitors to see a working beehive up close (behind glass)
- New: Live, free-range quail that act as pest control and entertain guests









# Life in the Garden Exhibit, Woodall Foundation Discovery Passage

- The hallway transitioning from the Butterfly House to our Gardens features 2D and 3D ecosystems from around the world
- Guests can see tropical insects and animals before moving onto murals of our local ecosystems
- "Life in the Garden" Exhibit features native arthropods and small wildlife that you'll find here in Dallas







# EarthKeepers® Children's Programming

- Texas Discovery Gardens provides many under-served urban youth with their first natural outdoor learning experiences (in FY 14-15, more than 70% of students were considered "economically disadvantaged")
- There are outdoor learning opportunities for students Pre-K, 8th grade, Scouts, science clubs, after school groups and summer day schools






# EarthKeepers® Children's Programming

- Science-based classes allow students to work directly with nature, observing and measuring their environment
- About 10,000 students explore the Butterfly House and engage in programming per year; scholarships bring in low-income schools and nonprofits who couldn't otherwise attend (\$4,000 in 14-15 year; \$10,000 pledged for 15-16 year through North Texas Giving Day)







# Partnership with the City of Dallas Park and Recreation Department

- Texas Discovery Gardens is a nonprofit educational organization funded, in part, by the City of Dallas Park and Recreation Department
- City support is integral to our day-to-day operations and allows us to rely on steady funding while searching for grants and other income opportunities to further our mission
- As we celebrate our 75<sup>th</sup> year in 2016, we are grateful for City support
- Annual funding goes into general operating expenses, supporting everything from Butterfly House maintenance to staffing and education
  - In FY 14-15, the City provided \$95,682
  - In FY 15-16, the City will provide \$145,862
- The City also covers partial utilities and EBS assists with building maintenance
