



- Historians believe that golf originated in the Netherlands
- In 1297, A game referred to as "Kolf" took place in the Netherlands, the Dutch played a game with a stick and a leather ball. The winner was determined by whoever hit the ball into a target within the fewest strokes from several hundred yards away
- Today's version of the game was invented in Scotland in the 14th Century
- The first golf association was established in Europe in the 18th century
- In 1888, the St. Andrews Golf Club of Yonkers,
 New York was established
- Golf gained popularity in the United States in the 1920's



- Golf was introduced by H.L. Edwards and R.E. Potter in 1896
- They created a six-hole golf course at Haskell and Keating, near Turtle Creek
- This venture led to the formation of the Dallas Golf Club in 1900
- In 1912, they sold the land and moved the course three miles north on land they purchased in Highland Park
- This property still exists as Dallas Country Club
- By 1914, there were three private golf courses, but there was nothing that the public could enjoy
- The Dallas Parks Department leased 117 acres along Turtle Creek and built a golf course
- The facility was used from 1922 to 1935 when the land was returned to the Cole Estate



- Tenison Park golf course was established as a golf course in 1924, because of a donation of land from Mr. and Mrs. E.O. Tenison
- The first clubhouse was built in 1924 and was reconstructed in 1941
- Tenison Highlands was fully renovated in 1999





- Stevens Park golf course was opened in 1924 in Oak Cliff as the second municipal course in Dallas.
- L.A. Stemmons was instrumental in developing the Kessler Park/Stevens Park area
- The course was fully renovated in 2010

- Cedar Crest was developed as a private club in 1916
- It hosted the 1927 PGA Championship which was won by Walter Hagan
- It was acquired by the City of Dallas in 1946 from the Schoellkopf estate
- The course was fully renovated in 2004 and underwent a partial renovation in 2016





- Luna Vista, formerly L.B. Houston was purchased by the City of Dallas in 1963
- The course was designed by Donald Kleinschmidt, and opened in 1969
- The course was built entirely by City employees
- The course was fully renovated in 2012

- The land for Keeton Park golf course was acquired in
 1973 from the Pleasant Grove Chamber of Commerce
- The course was designed by Dave Bennett and opened for play in 1979
- It named after a long tenured employee of the Parks Department





Mission and Vision Statements

Mission:

Provide affordable, quality courses for all levels of play for both citizens of Dallas and its visitors, while promoting and growing the game of golf and supporting the longstanding traditional values of the game.

Vision:

Provide quality playing conditions, lessons, public service and concessions at a reasonable price for all ages and socio-economic backgrounds while educating the community to be well informed about City of Dallas golf opportunities.

Current Model

Golf Pro Responsibilities

- Pro shop services were contracted out to golf pros in 1970
- Current contract were approved by the City Council in 2008, 10 year agreements with a 5 year renewal option. Contracts expire in 2023
- Facility is operated by a Class A PGA professional
- Manage day to day operations and provides staffing for a 365 day per year operation
- Provide golf carts, merchandise, food and beverage services, lessons, rental equipment and clinics
- Pay commissions and utility reimbursement based on each pro's concession agreement
- Organize leagues and tournaments
- Operates instructional camps and various youth programs
- Facilitates credit card processing and the fees associated with these transactions

City of Dallas Responsibilities

- Golf course maintenance is responsible for the daily maintenance and upkeep of 700 acres of maintained turf, 364 days per year
- Creates a comprehensive maintenance plan, detailing the chemical and cultural activities for the year
- Efforts to maintain optimal playing conditions of the greens, tees, fairways, rough
- Provides maintenance equipment for each property and the conducts the necessary repairs
- Provides maintenance and repairs to the pro shop and other course structure through the Building Services division and Facility Services
- Assess issues on the course and create long term solutions
- Identifies and implements special projects on the course, such as irrigation installation, drainage projects and minor construction
- Provides a Point of Sale system


Special Services Division

Business Office Staff

- One (1) Business Manager and three (3) Administrative Support staff
- Ensures accurate and responsible financial oversight, budget monitoring and projections, procurement, vendor coordination, invoice processing revenue processing and tracking, internal audits, Human Resources assistance and customer
- Responsible for the administrative support to all golf and tennis stakeholders

- One (1) Manager III over golf operations
- One (1) Senior Superintendent
- Four (4) Superintendents
- Six (6) Assistant Superintendents
- One (1) Senior Mechanic
- One (1) Mechanic II



Technological Advancements in Golf Course Maintenance

In recent years, Golf has researched and implemented various forms of technology to increase the efficiency and efficacy of our operations. Those technologies include:

GPS Spray Rigs

- Allows for applications to only be made in the targeted area
- Has shown a 25% reduction in chemical usage
- Began use in 2016


Advanced Scoreboard

- Allows work instructions to be seen in the field and eliminates back and forth trips to the shop
- Reduces or eliminates down time between an employees 1st and 2nd jobs
- The financial data collected can help justify the need for various projects
- Began use in 2017

POGO


- GPS based moisture monitoring unit
- Reads soil moisture, salinity, electro conductivity and temperature
- Readings can be used to properly time chemical applications
- Data can be used to fine tune the irrigation system
- Began use in 2015






Attendance


General Fund Budget & Expenses






City Revenue






City Revenue & Cost Per Player

Green Fees

- Green Fees are set by the Park Board and have not been increased across all fees, since 2012
 - Smaller specific fee increases in 2015 and 2016
- Golf Pros set all other fees based on their business plan and market pricing, with review and approval by the Park Board

Renovations

2008

Tenison – Bunkers were redesigned. New liner and sand were installed.

Keeton - Greens and Tees were renovated.

2010

Stevens Park – Complete full-scale renovation. The work included the installation of a new irrigation system and several flower beds, greens, tees, fairways, and rough updated.

2011

Tenison – Full scale driving range renovation, including new irrigation, target greens and drainage.

2012

Luna Vista – Complete full-scale renovation. The work included the installation of a two-wire irrigation system, additional drainage and bunkers. Greens, tees, fairways, and roughs updated.

2016

Cedar Crest – Greens were converted from Tif-Dwarf to Mini-Verde. The bunkers were renovated and Better Billy Bunker liners were installed. Excess dirt used to enhance the driving range target greens.

2019

Stevens Park – The greens were converted from Mini-Verde to Champion Bermuda grass. Minimal changes to the tee boxes and drainage added.

Luna Vista – All 1236 sprinkler heads were replaced with the Toro infinity sprinkler head and the decoder system was upgraded.

2021

Tenison – Bunker liners and old sand removed and replaced with Capillary Concrete and a high-quality sand.
