#### SUBJECT

Recommendation to the Dallas City Council to amend Chapters 32 and 41 of the Dallas City Code to prohibit smoking on park grounds, without exceptions – Financing: This action has no cost consideration to the City

## **BACKGROUND**

Chapter 41 of the Dallas City Code generally prohibits smoking (1) in any indoor enclosed area in the City; (2) within 15 feet of any entrance to an indoor or enclosed area in the City and (3) in any area designated as nonsmoking by the owner, operator, or person in control of the area and marked with a no smoking sign complying with Section 41-3. The current code does not prohibit smoking outdoors in parks.

On November 6, 2014, the Park and Recreation Board was briefed on proposed changes to the smoking ordinance that would include a ban on smoking outdoors on park property. The briefing included information on benefits, potential challenges and peer and area city comparisons. Staff was directed by the Park and Recreation Board to continue research and to prepare proposed recommendations, changes, and exceptions for consideration by the Administration and Finance Committee of the Park and Recreation Board.

The Committee has discussed the proposed changes over the past year with input from staff. After discussion with the committee and stakeholders, staff recommended an amendment to Chapter 41 of the Dallas City Code that would make it an offense for anyone to smoke on park property, with the following exceptions:

- 1. Allow partners, Fair Park tenants and special events to designate smoking areas based on criteria developed by the Park and Recreation Department.
- 2. Allow smoking on golf courses.
- 3. Allow smoking on park property by actors during filming or theatrical performances as permitted by the Office of Special Events.

On February 18, 2016, the Administration and Finance Committee discussed the exceptions and voted 4-3 to recommend to the Park and Recreation Board an outright ban on smoking outdoors on park property with no exceptions.

## ARTICLE I. GENERAL PROVISIONS.

#### SEC. 41-1. DEFINITIONS.

In this chapter:

(1) BAR means an establishment principally for the sale and consumption of alcoholic beverages on the premises that derives 75 percent or more of its gross revenue on a quarterly (three-month) basis from the sale or service of alcoholic beverages, as defined in the Texas

Alcoholic Beverage Code, for on-premises consumption. If an establishment is located in a hotel or motel, the gross revenues of the particular establishment, rather than the gross revenues of the entire hotel or motel, will be used in calculating the percentage of revenues derived from the sale or service of alcoholic beverages.

- (2) BILLIARDS means any game played on a cloth-covered table with balls and cue sticks where the balls are struck by the sticks and the balls strike against one another.
  - (3) BILLIARD HALL means an establishment that:
    - (A) holds a valid billiard hall license issued by the city under Chapter 9A of this code;
- (B) has at least 12 billiard tables that are not coin-operated available for rent to persons desiring to play billiards on the premises; and
- (C) derives 70 percent or more of its gross revenue on a quarterly (three-month) basis from the sale or service of alcoholic beverages, as defined in the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Code, for on-premises consumption and from the rental of billiard tables and billiard equipment to persons desiring to play billiards on the premises.
- (4) CIGAR BAR means a bar that derives 15 percent or more of its gross revenue on a quarterly (three-month) basis from the sale or rental of tobacco, tobacco products, smoking implements, or smoking accessories for on-premises consumption.
- (5) DIRECTOR means the director of the department designated by the city manager to enforce and administer this chapter, or the director's designated representative.
- (6) EATING ESTABLISHMENT means any establishment that prepares or serves food or beverages, regardless of whether the establishment provides seating or facilities for on-premises consumption. The term includes, but is not limited to, restaurants, coffee shops, cafeterias, short order cafes, fast food establishments, luncheonettes, lunchrooms, soda fountains, food carts, food vending vehicles, and catering establishments.
- (7) EMPLOYEE means any person who works for hire at an indoor or enclosed area including an independent contractor with an assigned indoor location.
  - (8) EMPLOYER means any person who employs one or more employees.
  - (9) ENCLOSED means an area that:
- (A) is closed in overhead by a roof or other covering of any material, whether permanent or temporary; and
- (B) has 40 percent or more of its perimeter closed in by walls or other coverings of any material, whether permanent or temporary.
- (10) HOSPITAL means any institution that provides medical, surgical, and overnight facilities for patients.
  - (11) MINOR means any individual under 18 years of age.
  - (12) PERSON means an individual, firm, partnership, association, or other legal entity.
- (13) RETAIL OR SERVICE ESTABLISHMENT means any establishment that sells goods or services to the general public, including but not limited to any eating establishment, bar, hotel, motel, department store, grocery store, drug store, shopping mall, laundromat, bingo parlor, bowling center, billiard hall, or hair styling salon.
  - (14) SECOND-HAND SMOKE means ambient smoke resulting from the act of smoking.
- (15) SMOKE OR SMOKING means inhaling, exhaling, possessing, or carrying any lighted or burning cigar or cigarette, or any pipe or other device that contains lighted or burning tobacco or tobacco products.
- (16) TOBACCO SHOP means a retail or service establishment that derives 90 percent or more of its gross revenue on a quarterly (three-month) basis from the sale of tobacco, tobacco products, or smoking implements.
- (17) WORKPLACE means any indoor or enclosed area where an employee works for an employer. (Ord. Nos. 18961; 19648; 25168; 27440)

## ARTICLE II. SMOKING PROHIBITIONS.

#### SEC. 41-2. SMOKING PROHIBITED IN CERTAIN AREAS.

- (a) A person commits an offense if he smokes:
  - (1) in any indoor or enclosed area in the city;
  - (2) within 15 feet of any entrance to an indoor or enclosed area in the city; or
- (3) in any area designated as nonsmoking by the owner, operator, or person in control of the area and marked with a no smoking sign complying with Section 41-3.
- (b) An owner, operator, or person in control of an indoor or enclosed area in the city commits an offense if he, either personally or through an employee or agent, permits a person to smoke in the indoor or enclosed area.
- (c) For purposes of this chapter, an indoor or enclosed area includes but is not limited to the following:
  - (1) An elevator.
  - (2) A hospital or nursing home.
  - (3) Any facility owned, operated, or managed by the city.
  - (4) Any retail or service establishment.
  - (5) Any workplace.
- (6) Any facility of a public or private primary or secondary school or any enclosed theater, movie house, library, museum, or transit system vehicle.
- (d) It is a defense to prosecution under Subsection (a)(1), (a)(3), or (b) of this section if the person was smoking in a location that was:
- (1) a private residence, except that this defense does not apply when the residence is being used as a child care facility, adult day care facility, or health care facility;
- (2) a stage or set of a production of a television program, a theatrical presentation, or a motion picture or filming event where smoking by an actor or performer is essential to the production;
  - (3) a cigar bar that:
- (A) was lawfully operating as a cigar bar on December 10, 2008 (except that this defense does not apply if the cigar bar is expanded, is relocated, or changes majority ownership after December 10, 2008);
- (B) does not open into any other indoor or enclosed area in which smoking is prohibited under this section;
  - (C) is not generally accessible by a minor; and
- (D) keeps all windows and doors closed at all times except as reasonably necessary for the expeditious entering and exiting of the cigar bar;
  - (4) a tobacco shop that:
- (A) does not open into any other indoor or enclosed area in which smoking is prohibited under this section; and
- (B) keeps all windows and doors closed at all times except as reasonably necessary for the expeditious entering and exiting of the tobacco shop;
- (5) an unenclosed outdoor seating area associated with an indoor or enclosed area, including but not limited to a bar, hotel, motel, or eating establishment, except that this defense does not apply if:
  - (A) the outdoor seating area is adjacent to a playground or play area for children; or

- (B) the location was posted as a nonsmoking area by the owner, operator, or person in control of the establishment or area with a sign complying with Section 41-3; or
- (6) a private, rented guest room in a hotel or motel that has been designated as a smoking room by the owner, operator, or person in control of the hotel or motel.
- (e) It is a defense to prosecution under Subsection (a)(2) of this section if the person was smoking in a location that was an unenclosed outdoor seating area associated with an indoor or enclosed area, including but not limited to a bar, hotel, motel, or eating establishment, except that this defense does not apply if:
  - (1) the outdoor seating area is adjacent to a playground or play area for children; or
- (2) the location was posted as a nonsmoking area by the owner, operator, or person in control of the establishment or area with a sign complying with Section 41-3. (Ord. Nos. 18961; 19648; 21109; 21614; 25168; 27440)

## SEC. 41-3. SIGNAGE AND OTHER REQUIREMENTS.

- (a) The owner, operator, or person in control of an establishment or other area in which smoking is prohibited under Section 41-2(a)(1) or (a)(3) shall post a conspicuous sign at the main entrance to the establishment or area. The sign must contain the words "No Smoking, City of Dallas Ordinance," the universal symbol for no smoking, or other language that clearly prohibits smoking.
- (b) The owner, operator, or person in control of an indoor or enclosed area to which the smoking prohibition of Section 41-2(a)(2) applies shall post a conspicuous sign at each entrance to the indoor or enclosed area. The sign must contain the words "No Smoking within 15 Feet of Entrance, City of Dallas Ordinance." The universal symbol for no smoking may be substituted for the words "No Smoking."
- (c) The owner, operator, or person in control of an establishment or area in which smoking is prohibited under Section 41-2 shall remove all ashtrays from the establishment or area.
- (d) It is a defense to prosecution under this section that the establishment or area is a location for which a defense to prosecution is provided under Section 41-2(d). (Ord. 27440)

## ARTICLE IV. ENFORCEMENT.

(a) A person who violates a provision of this chapter, or who fails to perform an act required of the person by this chapter, commits an offense. A person commits a separate offense each day or portion of a day during which a violation is committed, permitted, or continued.

- (b) Unless specifically provided otherwise in this chapter, an offense under this chapter is punishable by a fine of \$200.
- (c) The culpable mental state required for the commission of an offense under this chapter is governed by Section 1-5.1 of this code. (Ord. Nos. 18961; 19648; 21540; 25168; 27440)

## ARTICLE V. TOBACCO-PRODUCT VENDING MACHINES.

#### SEC. 41-10. DEFINITIONS.

In this article:

- (1) TOBACCO-PRODUCT VENDING MACHINE means any self-service device that, upon insertion of any coin, paper currency, token, card, key, or other item, dispenses one or more tobacco products. The term does not include any machine that is in storage, in transit, or otherwise not set up for use and operation, nor does it include any machine that is situated on a train, bus, or other public conveyance.
- (2) RESTAURANT BAR means any area of an eating establishment, excluding the dining area:
- (A) that is primarily devoted to the serving of alcoholic beverages for consumption by guests on the premises; and
- (B) in which food service, if any, is only incidental to the consumption of alcoholic beverages. (Ord. Nos. 21540; 21613; 25168; 27440)

## SEC. 41-11. TOBACCO-PRODUCT VENDING MACHINES PROHIBITED; DEFENSES.

- (a) A person commits an offense if he owns or allows the display or use of any tobacco-product vending machine upon any property within the city.
- (b) It is a defense to prosecution under Subsection (a) that the tobacco- product vending machine was:
  - (1) situated in a premises where entry by a minor is prohibited by law;
  - (2) situated in a hotel, motel, bar, or restaurant bar;
  - (3) located in a workplace with the permission of the employer, provided that:
- (A) the employer usually has no person under 18 years of age employed at the workplace; and
- (B) the tobacco-product vending machine is situated at a location within the workplace to which no person other than an employee of the workplace is usually permitted to have access; or
- (4) located in an eating establishment and equipped with a lock-out device that was installed, maintained, and operated in compliance with Section 41-12. (Ord. Nos. 21540; 21613; 25168; 27440)

#### SEC. 41-12. LOCK-OUT DEVICES.

- (a) A lock-out device on a tobacco-product vending machine located in an eating establishment must be installed, maintained, and operated in compliance with this section.
  - (b) A lock-out device may be electrical or mechanical and must be approved by the director.

- (c) An owner, operator, employee, or other person in charge of an eating establishment who is at least 18 years of age shall:
- (1) install and continuously maintain a lock-out device on a tobacco-product vending machine in good working order;
- (2) require identification from any potential customer of the tobacco-product vending machine who appears to be under 18 years of age;
- (3) physically observe all transactions in which the tobacco-product vending machine is used; and
- (4) physically release the lock-out device before each sale from a tobacco-product vending machine. (Ord. Nos. 21613; 25168; 27440)

#### **BACKGROUND**

On June 5, 2005, Council Resolution No. 05-1740 authorized a ten-year food service contract for concessions at the Cotton Bowl Stadium with the Ed Campbell Company. The term of the contract was ten years, with two one-year renewal periods subject to Director and Park Board approval.

On September 3, 2014, the Mayor's Fair Park Task Force briefed the City Council and the Park and Recreation Board on their recommendations for Fair Park that included (1) enhance access and connectivity with the community and city; (2) establish a community park on the south side of property, and (3) empower new organization as operational and marketing authority for Fair Park.

On September 18, 2014, the Park and Recreation Board was briefed on "The Future of Fair Park" which identified and addressed a number of issues related to a proposed change in governance. The briefing included an overview of campus members and service provider contracts, to include food and beverage concessions.

#### **BACKGROUND** (Continued)

The agreement with the Ed Campbell Company expired June 7, 2015 and required that the Concessionaire (1) make monthly payments to the City equal to forty and one-tenth percent (40.1%) of its gross proceeds of all concessions operations and ten percent (10%) of gross receipts of catering operations. Gross receipts is defined as all monies paid or payable to the Concessionaire for sales made or services rendered at or from the premises or from any other source, less sales tax and (2) expend \$300,000 towards improvements to the premises during the first three years of the contract and \$50,000 during each option renewal, if exercised.

On March 5, 2015, the Park and Recreation Board approved exercising the first one-year option to renew with the Ed Campbell Company for providing food and beverage services contract at the Cotton Bowl Stadium under the same terms and conditions as the original agreement. The first one-year renewal period began on June 8, 2015 and expires on June 7, 2016. The Concessionaire was required to expend \$50,000 towards improvements to the premises which have been completed.

The Ed Campbell Company has requested that the Park and Recreation Board approve the last remaining one-year option with the Ed Campbell Company for providing food and beverage services contract at the Cotton Bowl Stadium under the same terms and conditions as the original agreement. The second and final one-year renewal if approved would begin on June 8, 2016 and end on June 7, 2017. The Concessionaire will also be required to expend \$50,000 towards improvements to the premises prior to June 7, 2017.

On April 7, 2016, the Park and Recreation Board was briefed on a proposed management agreement with the Fair Park Texas Foundation, a new 501(c) 3 non-profit organization to operate and manage Fair Park. As part of the proposed deal points, the City will assign to the Foundation all contracts applicable to the ongoing operation of Fair Park to include concession contracts.

The City has the right to assign, transfer or convey this Contract, as amended, in whole or in part, to another entity.

The term of the contract was ten years, with two one-year renewal periods subject to Director and Park Board approval. The agreement expires June 7, 2015.

The agreement requires that the Concessionaire make every reasonable effort to cause the restaurant facility to be part of the overall programming effort of Fair Park on a year-round basis. As part of the agreement, the concessionaire agreed to (1) operate the restaurant facility six days a week, unless otherwise agreed in writing and make ever reasonable effort to be open for the public during hours of major events at Fair Park; (2) make monthly payments to the City equal to ten percent (10%) of its gross proceeds defined as all monies paid or payable to the Concessionaire for sales made or services rendered at or from the premises or from any other sources, less sales tax; and (3) expend \$100,000 towards improvements to the premises during the first three years of the contract and \$10,000 during each renewal period, if exercised.

#### **BACKGROUND**

Section 42.041(b)(14) of the Texas Human Resources Code, as amended, allows city-sponsored youth recreation programs to be exempted from the state's day care licensing laws if the city adopts standards of care for those programs and complies with other requirements of that legislation. One requirement is that the City Council hold a public hearing annually on the city's youth program standards of care and adopt an ordinance re-establishing and continuing in effect the standards.

#### **BACKGROUND** (continued)

Ordinance No. 23159, adopted by the City Council on June 11, 1997, created Chapter 12 of the Dallas City Code in order to exempt City of Dallas youth programs from State child-care licensing requirements and provide minimum standards by which the City operates youth programs. Chapter 12 was readopted by Ordinance No. 23534 on June 10, 1998, by Ordinance No. 23907 on June 9, 1999, by Ordinance No. 24281 on June 14, 2000, by Ordinance No. 24611 on May 23, 2001, by Ordinance No 24943 on May 22, 2002, by Ordinance No. 25269 on May 28, 2003, by Ordinance No. 26376 on June 9, 2004, by Ordinance No. 26800 on June 13, 2007, by Ordinance No. 27222 on June 11, 2008, by Ordinance No. 27565 on June 10, 2009, by Ordinance No. 27911 on June 9, 2010; by Ordinance No. 28217 on May 25, 2011; by Ordinance No. 28670 on May 23, 2012; by Ordinance No. 29036 on June 12, 2013, and by Ordinance No. 29358 on May 28, 2014. Chapter 12 will expire on June 16, 2016 unless sooner terminated or extended by ordinance of the City Council.

The Director of the Park and Recreation Department implements, administers, and enforces Chapter 12, which applies to youth programs sponsored by the City, whether offered after school, during the summer, or during holidays. A coordinator initiates an inspection report for each program to confirm that standards of care are being met.

The youth program coordinators and leaders must meet certain qualifications pertaining to age, education, and experience and are provided orientation and training relating to working with children.

Each program must operate with a participant to leader ratio of 20:1 and must follow guidelines pertaining to safety, fire, and health as set forth in the standards of care.

## **BACKGROUND**

The electronic video scoreboard at the Fair Park Cotton Bowl is used for collegiate and high school football games, international soccer matches, and other events. The Daktronics electronic video scoreboard was installed in 2007 as part of the Phase I Stadium Improvements approved by City Council on August 9, 2006 (Resolution 06-2070), and at the time was the second largest board in Texas. The video screen capability includes streaming of live video, instant replay, animation, graphics, and other fan related information using full color LED technology.

The computers and controllers (hard drives) needed for operating the video scoreboard are in need of replacement. By replacing the hard drives, it insures board functionality and compatibility and extends the life of the video scoreboard. In the last two years the board has failed on two occasions, and one of two computers is non-operational which leaves no backup to the system. If the second computer goes down the entire system will fail leaving Cotton Bowl Stadium unable to support television broadcasting, fulfill sponsorship and advertising obligations, and will negatively impact the spectator experience.

This transaction will provide turn-key, on-site installation and testing of replacement computers and controllers needed for the operation of the scoreboard. On-site operator training will also be provided. The Texas Association of School Boards (BuyBoard), conforms to the requirements of Texas Statutes that are applicable for competitive bids and proposals, in accordance with the Interlocal Cooperation Act, Chapter 791, Texas Government Code. In addition, BuyBoard receives bids from manufacturers and dealers throughout the United States.



The City of Dallas Public Art Ordinance provides that all appropriations for City capital improvement projects shall include an amount equal to 1.5% (or .75%) of the total capital improvement project appropriation to be used for the design services of artists and for the creation of artworks for new City facilities (Dallas City Code Article X, SEC. 2-103(a).

.On December 9, 2009, by Resolution No. 09-2956, authorized approval of the proposed Park and Recreation Public Art Plan for the 2006 Bond Program in compliance with the City's Public Art Ordinance of the Dallas City Code, Chapter 2, Article X, and as approved by the Cultural Affairs Commission and the Park and Recreation Board.

On April 23, 2014, Resolution No. 14-0664, authorized an amendment to Resolution No. 09-2956, previously approved on December 9, 2009, to the Park and Recreation Public Art Plan for the 2006 Bond Program in compliance with the City's Public Art Ordinance of the Dallas City Code, Chapter 2, Article X.

The artist Casto Solano was selected via competitive selection process as directed by the City of Dallas Cultural Policy, Section I.C: Park and Recreation Public Art Projects Selection of Artists and was approved by the Public Art Committee April 12, 2016 and the Cultural Affairs Commission on April 21, 2016.

On March 27, 2015 a contract between the City of Dallas and the Oak Cliff Foundation authorized the Oak Cliff Foundation to participate in the development of the scope of the public art project- to commission a work of public art to be placed at Kiest Park honoring the contributions of Jimmie Lee Vaughan and Stevie Ray Vaughan, known as the Vaughan Brothers, for the Oak Cliff Foundation to participate in the artist selection process for Park and Recreation public art projects as a member of the selection panel, and to raise \$68,000 in support of the project: \$28,000 to augment the project budget and \$40,000 in support of the maintenance of the project. 

Authorize preparation of a Multiple Use Agreement with Texas Department of Transportation for the development and maintenance of a natural surface loop trail in Hines Park located at 9700 Harry Hines Boulevard – Financing: No cost consideration to the City

#### **BACKGROUND**

This action will authorize a Multiple Use Agreement (MUA) with TxDOT for construction of a natural surface loop trail in Hines Park. The trail will be constructed and maintained by Groundwork Dallas, Inc. The Park and Recreation Department authorized a previous agreement with Groundwork Dallas, a non-profit group formed for the purpose of developing and promoting trails and other enhancements in addition to community programming to promote the quality of life in the Trinity River Corridor.

Groundwork Dallas has been removing trash from Hines Park and has constructed natural surfaces trails to provide opportunities to view wildlife in the wetland. It now desires to create a loop trail to circumnavigate the entire wetland in Hines Park. Due to the property boundaries and irregular shape of the wetland it is necessary that the trail enter TxDOT Right-of-Way (ROW). TxDOT is willing to allow such use by means of a Multiple Use Agreement.

The agreement would be subject to the following terms:

- 1. The agreement has no term length; however, the agreement may be terminated upon notice by either party. The site must be restored to a condition satisfactory to TxDOT if the trail abandoned.
- 2. TxDOT retains its use of the land for highway purposes and does not grant any interest in the land to the City.









Hines Park Proposed Unimproved Trail

Authorize an application for a matching grant through the Collin County Parks and Open Space Project Funding Assistance Program in the amount of approximately \$690,000 for development of Moss Glen Park located at 5200 Bentwood Trail – Financing: This action has no cost consideration to the City

#### BACKGROUND

The 4.5-acre Moss Glen Park was acquired in 2000 as part of the President George Bush Turnpike Segment I construction project. The park contains a detention basin and trees otherwise has remained undeveloped since the Park and Recreation Department acquired the property.

A master plan (Exhibit A) for the park was developed in late May 2013 with neighborhood input and support. The master plan calls for a loop trail, berms, preservation of existing trees, stone performance stage with stone seat walls, exercise equipment, tree, shrub, and perennial plantings, native plantings, and enhancement of the detention basin as a natural area planted with riparian and upland native plants. A future connector trail, which will link Timberglen Trail and Preston Ridge Trail, will pass through Moss Glen Park and provide access to additional amenities in other parks.

In November 2007 the voters of Collin County approved a \$17 million bond proposition for Parks and Open Space administered through the Collin County *Project Funding Assistance Program.* In this the seventh series and final call for proposals a total of \$2.3 million is planned to be made available. Funding is allocated on a competitive application basis to projects which are consistent with and further the objectives of the *Collin County Parks and Open Space Strategic Plan* (October 2001). The program requires a dollar for dollar match, funds being provided by the applicant in any combination of cash, materials, in-kind services, or the appraised value of undeveloped parkland. There must be a reasonable expectation that matching funds will be secured by the applicant within six months from the time Commissioners Court approves funding for a project.

Authorize an application for a matching grant through the Collin County Parks and Open Space Project Funding Assistance Program in the amount of approximately \$690,000 for development of Moss Glen Park located at 5200 Bentwood Trail – Financing: This action has no cost consideration to the City – May 19, 2016 – Page 2

#### **BACKGROUND** (Continued)

The scoring criteria for this grant program focuses on projects that: 1) support and advance objectives of the *Collin County Parks and Open Space Strategic Plan*. Such objectives include: acquisition of land, coordinated development of an interconnected system, development of a wide variety of recreational facilities with priority on trails, with an emphasis on trail interconnectedness, active sports, floodplain greenways, and regional prairie parks; 2) Adequacy of funding and level of funding commitment; and 3) Perception of need and benefit to the citizens of Collin County.

Currently available for the grant match are \$30,000 in funds allocated for improvements to Moss Glen Park and approximately \$630,000 in parkland value. An appraisal is forthcoming at which time the exact land value match amount will be determined. Construction of the entire park is estimated at \$750,000.




