Serving Dallas since 1982!


- 1982 Founded as the Dallas Parks Foundation
- 1988 Secured donation of a 3.7-mile section of the MKT Rail that was used to form the Katy Trail
- 1994 Pioneer Plaza opened to the public
- 2004 Opened the nations largest Urban Tree Farm with TXU Energy
- 2010 Partnered with Super Bowl XLV and the NLF Environmental to plant over 6,000 trees







- 2010 Completed Dallas' first urban tree canopy study (UTC)
- 2015 Launched the State of the Dallas Urban Forest Report
- 2017 Launched the Dallas Urban Heat Island Mitigation Study
- 2019 Updated the city's urban tree canopy information
- 2020 Ccomplete the first ever Dallas Urban Forestry Master Plan

Dallas officials estimate the city's parks lost more than 600 trees in storm

And they say it could take three to four years before the city can finish playing catch-up.



- Since 2010 TTF has helped to plant over 850 trees in Dallas' park
- 2019 Ramped up in response to the June storm planting 300 trees during the Fall of 2019
 - Kidd Springs
 - Flagpole Hill
 - White Rock Lake
 - JP Hawn
 - Jaycee Zaragoza
 - Fretz
- Spring 2020 planning to plant an additional 300 trees
 - Glendale
 - Holcomb
 - Tommie Allen
 - Lake Cliff
 - Tipton
 - Valley View
- Fall 2020 will be evaluating adding additional parks with a focus in the tornado impact area

Tree Inventories and Assessments





- 2018 completed an inventory of the Dallas Arboretum
- 2019 worked with Groundwork Dallas to begin inventorying City parks for Ash trees
- Have begun a comprehensive inventory of all new trees planted in City Parks
- Have completed internal engagement for the Urban Forestry Master Plan





Cool Schools Community Parks

- WHAT Children are spending more time inside and on electronics than any previous generation, spending the least amount of time outdoors
- GOAL To increase student time outdoors during school hours while increasing park access











SOUTHWESTERN MEDICAL DISTRICT URBAN STREETSCAPE MASTER PLAN GREEN SPINE: HARRY HINES



GREEN SPINE

- Link all primary destinations together through green corridor
- Preserve and enhance existing tree canopy creating a healthy boulevard
- Develop a true complete green street network of mobility
- Slow traffic within the District
- Enhance green space views from hospital rooms

GREEN HEART VISION PURPOSE

- 1. Develop and evaluate options to achieve Master Plan objectives
 - Consider technical challenges and opportunities
 - Vet with partner agencies
 - Solicit stakeholder input
- 2. Establish a design vision that can influence:
 - Overall scheme for Harry Hines under evaluation by NCTCOG
 - Detailed design of Harry Hines through the Medical District
- 3. Develop budget for fundraising for Green Heart and implications on Green Spine
